**MARIE MORRISEY**  
 Announcement is made to Lents music lovers that Miss Marie Morrisey will give a concert in the Yeager theatre Monday evening March 8.

Marie Morrisey is one of our real American singers. Her family has been in this country as long as anybody else's; and she has had a strictly American education. She is a pupil of Dudley Buck under whom she studied for four years. She proves in convincing fashion that a singer can reach a high degree of development under

American tutelage.

Miss Morrisey has made a specialty of songs sung in English. And that meant studying English diction with special care, for one of the reasons English is not so melodious as some other languages, in Miss Morrisey's opinion, is because we are careless in our speech. Mr. Dudley Buck did more than teach Miss Morrisey how to use her voice correctly. He also taught her to treat her own language "respectfully," as she herself puts it.

"The English language may not be so soft and melodious as some other languages," declares Miss Morrisey, "but it suits me" and she says this with the pride befitting a true Daughter of the American Revolution, which she is.

Residents of Lents will agree with Miss Morrisey when they hear her sing some of the American songs. She is particularly enthusiastic about songs by American composers, and no recital of hers is complete without some of them.

March 8th concert promises to be a splendid addition to the list of treats the music "fans" of Lents have enjoyed in the past. Miss Morrisey's voice is finer than ever—a rich, sweet contralto. And the long and arduous training it has received in the concerts Miss Morrisey has given to the soldiers in hospitals and camps, has added a new power to her voice.

Monday's concert will be an invitation affair, but musically inclined Lents is sure to be fully represented. Pd. adv.

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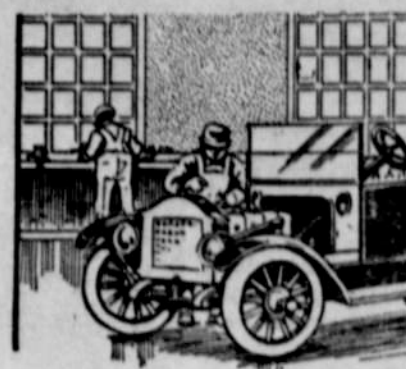
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
