## MUCK CANDIDATE FOR RENOMINATION FOR CO. COMMISSIONER

A. A. Muck has announced his candidacy for renomination as county commissioner on the Republican ticket. He has served one term as a member of the board of county commissioners, having been elected in 1916. Basing his candidacy for renomination on the claim that he has given all his time and attention to his official duties. Mr. Muck points to the fact that he attended every meeting of the board but one during his term of office.

"I aim to co-operate with all county officials who are sincerely interested in furnishing efficient service under economical management. All county affairs should be conducted in the open, so that the taxpayers can see how their money is being spent. Publicity is the best preventative of expensive government. In making purchases, the county board should always be the strongest supporter of the movement in favor of buying Oregon-made goods in preference to those manufactured elsewhere.
