## ZINSER HOME NEAR Mt. SCOTT BURNS

About noon last Thursday, the residence of C. F. Zinser, on Route 3, was totally destroyed by fire, including considerable furniture and other household effects. Some effects were saved, and while attempting to push a trunk through one of the windows, one of the Zinser boys, aged about 14, cut his right arm deeply from the elbow almost to the wrist, on a piece of broken glass, necessitating the services of a physician. The dwelling was a good one, and could not be duplicated for less than \$3,000 at the present time. There was partial insurance only. Mr. Zinser already is at work gathering material for a new dwelling. The fire is believed to have had its origin in a defective flue.
