Andrew W. Powers, a pioneer resident of Portland, residing at 7625 59th avenue for the past 20 years, passed away at his home in this city Wednesday Sept. 22 1920 at the age of 79 years. Mr. Powers was born in Sullivan county, Mo., Dec. 26, 1841, later moved to Iowa and in 1862 crossed the plains with his parents in an ox cart, settling in Portland in that year.

In 1864 he enlisted in Co. D 1st Oregon Infantry and was honorably discharged by the war department in 1866. He was a member of Reuben Wilson Post No. 38.

For many years Mr. Powers was a building contractor in this city, but some years ago retired from active business.

In 1873 he was married to Miss Melissa Brown, a daughter of G. W. Brown, a pioneer of 1854.

Mr. Powers is survived by his widow Melissa B. Powers, a daughter, Minnie M. Golden and two sons, Geo. C. and Roy O. Powers all residing in this city.
