**Doughnuts**  
3 tablespoons shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 teaspoon salt  
3 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; stir in milk; add nutmeg, salt, flour and baking powder which have been sifted together and enough additional flour to make dough stiff enough to roll. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick; cut out. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 30 seconds. Drain on unglazed paper and sprinkle with powdered sugar.

**Crullers**  
4 tablespoons shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
3 cups flour  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 cup milk

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually and beat on eggs; sift together flour, cinnamon, salt and baking powder; add one-half and mix well; add milk and remainder of dry ingredients to make soft dough. Roll out on floured board to about 1/4-inch thick and cut into strips about 4 inches long and 1/4-inch wide; roll in hands and twist each strip and bring ends together. Fry in deep hot fat. Drain and roll in powdered sugar.
