Near East Relief Meeting
J. J. Handsaker of the Near East Relief attended the luncheon at the Portland hotel, Tuesday, March 1. More than 100 representative business men from all parts of the state were there, representing civic, commercial organizations and the churches. Gov. Ben Olcott presided. Local Boy Scouts had gathered roots, herbs, grasses and leaves, which formed the first item on the menu. Such is the substance on which the Chinese live at present--those things growing on a species of mud, which, used with water, is made into cake or bread. Of the famine sufferers, 10,000,000 are children. As an added object lesson, the "eats" of the banquet were composed of the surplus foods of our state, such as wheat, flour, canned salmon, prunes, etc. A statewide drive will soon be made to secure these various articles for shipment to the Orient. Co-operation was pledged by state-wide Sunday school and church associations and women's organizations.
