**Whitney Boys' Chorus**  
Not many are familiar with the fact that the Whitney Boys' Chorus is closely allied with this district. Here are some interesting facts regarding it. The first three members of the Portland chorus of Whitney boys were boys from this district: Frank Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Smith of 4329 47th street; Richard Averill, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Averill, 5304 39th avenue, and David Richards. From that small group in less than four months the chorus has grown to 250, 45 of whom are our neighbor boys, so to speak, and whose names are given below. It is also of interest to know that when the first sextet was formed, four of the boys were "our boys", Frank Smith, Frank Mixsell, Richard Averill and David Richards. Clarke Walsh, who is a son of the music

director of Franklin high, gives many pleasing violin solos, besides singing in the chorus. Chas. Welch is secretary of the troupe and Frank Smith is treasurer. Mr. Mixsell of Anabel Presbyterian church, leads and drills the boys every Tuesday night.  
Two much cannot be said of the quality and tone of Richard Averill's voice. He sings a clear, sweet soprano and bids fair to have a wide reputation before many years. David Richards is a humorist of rare ability and one week-day nights delights his audiences with his impersonations and readings. Surely this district has talent in it.  
Frank Smith's sister, Mildred, is a faithful and efficient pianist for the boys and besides is general secretary for the entire city. At the present time about fifteen of the boys are taking private lessons from leading vocal teachers, whose time and instruction are donated.  
Mr. Whitney's aim for the boys is high. He is not only trying for right and joyous singing, but for right and joyous living. The financial end of it, as far as the boys are concerned, is of little worry. Fifty cents pays your admission to the chorus and makes you a member for life, while ten cents per week is the dues. It is the aim of Mr. Whitney to take about 500 boys east next year, in 1922. In 1921 he wants a smaller number to go to Europe and in 1922 another bunch of equal size to tour the Orient. Then, as a result of these various trips, a tremendous chorus of 20,000 voices at our 1925 World Fair in Portland. It may look impossible at this distance, but no one who listens to the boys and hears the fine things they do and study the plans laid out for them can doubt or a minute the ultimate success of the great undertaking.

**WIRELESS TELEPHONE FOR EASTERN OREGON**  
The public service commission has been apprised of a movement on foot to establish a wireless telephone system covering Grant and other adjacent eastern Oregon counties. A letter received by the commission from A. M. F. Kirchheimer, an attorney of Prairie City, representing persons contemplating the venture, asks if the commission's jurisdiction extends to wireless operations and if there are rules and regulations governing this system of public service.  
The public utility law specifies the commission shall have jurisdiction over all telegraph and telephone systems whether operated with or without wires. However, because the wireless systems have not yet been put into practical use in the state, no rules and regulations have yet been formulated to cover utilities of this kind. As rapidly as they are installed it is presumed such regulations will be made.  
It is understood the wireless system of telephone service would be particularly suitable for the Grant county district, and if the system is worked successfully there, doubtless the wireless will come into common use in the state.
