preme council sent 400,000 Americans to Italy to re-inforce the Italians in May, 1918.

Twenty-seven divorce decrees were granted by Circuit Judge Gatens on Wednesday in the heaviest "default divorce day" the local circuit court has enjoyed in many months. Causes ran the gamut of infidelity, drunkenness, cruelty and desertion. Apparently the words of Supreme Court Justice Brown, in the celebrated Hawley suit for legal separation, anent the sanctity of the marriage relation and its relation to the welfare of the state, were not taken seriously by the circuit court. Ninety per cent of the applicants are women.

John Clark, chief of detectives of the Portland police bureau, will receive full pay during the period he is incapacitated for duty up to October 1, 1921. The payment was authorized in an emergency ordinance passed on Wednesday by the city council. Chief Clark was stricken with paralysis last March. He has been recovering slowly since that time, but has not been able to resume his full duties. Mayor Baker explained that during the eight years Chief Clark has been on the force he has worked unceasingly whenever occasion demanded and has never accepted overtime pay authorized by law. He has repeatedly foregone vacations and shown other acts of devotion to duty, and it was held he should be rewarded at a time when he is incapacitated by illness.

Conditional upon the approval of the city council, Portland's automobile bus terminal will be located on the quarter block at the southeast corner of Yamhill and Park streets. A modern depot building to cost approximately \$25,000 will be erected and by November 15 the terminal will be ready for use, with more than 100 automobiles departing daily to points in all directions from the city. The Oregon Auto Stage Terminal corporation on Wednesday closed a tentative lease for the property with the Corbett estate, the owners.
