Enrollment Increases UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Euene, Oct. 6-(Special)-An enrollnent of 2034 had been reached in the University of Oregon at the close of the fifth day of the fall term, which pened September 26. This includes 150 students in the medical school in Portland, which is a regular department of the university proper. On the Eugene campus alone 1884 students have registered and late en trants are expected to swell the total 1950 This of more than 20 per cent over last year's enrollment, according to Carlton E. Spencer, registrar.
