WHITE PROTESTANTS

The head of the Ku Klux Klan in Oregon, in his apology for the order of chivalry which he adorns, remarks that the United States was founded by Protestants of the white race, mainly Anglo-Saxons.

But the white Protestants who founded this government would not have subscribed to the intolerant teachings and practices of the Ku Klux Klan. It is impossible to conceive of Washington, or Franklin, or Jefferson as voicing the views of these present defenders of Protestant civilization.

There was one, however, who figured for a time among the founders who would have found himself at home among the Kluxers. Benedict Arnold, shortly after his treason, addressed a letter to the officers and soldiers of the Continental army in which he said: "Do you know that the eye which guides this pen lately saw your mean and profligate congress at Mass for the soul of a Roman Catholic in purgatory and participating in the rites of a church against whose anti-Christian corruptions your pious ancestors would have witnessed with their blood." The language and the sentiments alike show that the Kluxers are in the direct line of descent from Benedict.

Congress also went to Mass on other occasions because they wanted to cultivate the goodwill of the French and Spaniards who were neither Protestant nor Anglo-Saxon, but whose assistance was essential to American liberty at the time. It is well known that the larger portion of the army which won the decisive victory at Yorktown was made up of French and Spanish troops and that the fleet which prevented Cornwallis' escape by sea was French. Moreover it was Rochambeau's money which permitted Washington to hold his own troops together for the decisive moment.

Charles Carroll of Carrollton, who would be disbarred from the Ku Klux because of his religion, was the richest signer of the Declaration of Independence; from a financial viewpoint he risked more than any other signer. In a letter to Washington P. Curtis in his old age Carroll wrote: "When I signed the Declaration of Independence I had in view not only our independence of England, but the toleration of all sects professing the Christian religion and communicating to them all equal rights. Happily this wise and salutary measure has taken place for eradicating religious feuds and persecution and becoming a useful lesson to all governments. Reflecting on the disabilities, I may truly say the proscription of the Roman Catholics of Maryland, you will not be surprised that I had much at heart this grand design founded on mutual charity, the basis of our holy religion."

The Oregon Ku Klux would turn back the hand of time and return to the days of anti-Catholic proscription which the Declaration of Independence, in the view of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, had happily brought to an end.

Secrets of GOOD ADVERTISING

FREQUENT CHANGE OF ADVERTISEMENTS.

Most of the successful retail advertising men in the country make it a rule never to run the same newspaper advertisement two days in succession. They contend that advertising is news the first time it appears and a waste of money after that.

This is an excellent rule to follow. Daily changes of advertisements give the readers something new to think about—awaken some new interest every day.

Those people who read a certain advertisement on first appearance are not likely to read it the second time it is printed. And the percentage of those who did not see it when first published is so small that it does not pay to repeat it for their benefit.

If it is advisable or necessary to advertise the same thing more than one day, the advertisement can be changed sufficiently each day to make it look and read like a new one.

In this way much better results can be obtained. Oftentimes new selling points can be featured from day to day. When possible this should be done.
