WHAT SAWYER DID NOT TELL

IMPERIAL SECRETARY PUBLISHES INSIDER'S VIEW OF CLARKE, ACTING EMPEROR

PERSONAL GAIN OBJECT

LEADERS HAVE CONVERTED MEMBERSHIP INTO TRIBUTE PAYERS IS CHARGE

Sensational disclosures regarding the management of the Ku Klux Klan have been made at Atlanta, Ga., by L. D. Wade, imperial kligrapp, in reply to an application for a restraining order sought by Edward Young Clarke, imperial kleagle and emperor pro-tem of the clan, to prevent Wade from telling of the clan's affairs.

Clarke and Mrs. Elizabeth Tyler, who were once fined in the Atlanta police court for disorderly conduct, are accused of having seized supreme power in the clan and to be using the society "for their personal aggrandizement" and "being in control of the funds have become suddenly and enormously wealthy from ill-gotten gains collected from the ranks of the klansmen." Clarke is also accused of keeping the imperial wizard drunk in order to secure control of the society.

Pointing out that good moral character is a requisite for membership in the clan, Wade says in his sworn statement:

"Repeatedly since that time said Clarke and Mrs. Tyler and each of them were guilty of debasing acts of

such a nature as unfits them to be members of the clan, and especially its imperial officers, that is to say, that both the said Clarke and Mrs. Tyler have been convicted in the police court of Atlanta of disorderly conduct, that is to say, lewdness, and notwithstanding the fact that at said time the said Clarke was a married man and the father of children. Furthermore the said Clarke has been sued in the city court of Atlanta by the Roosevelt Memorial association for defalcations of its funds, which suit is now pending against him.

Defendant as a loyal member of said clan in common with thousands of others, feels outraged that such people so notorious as Clarke and Mrs. Tyler should be in absolute control of the organization and destinies of the order, when there are in its ranks so many pure, upright and noble men, whose character and integrity are above reproach.

Defendant charges that the said Clarke and Mrs. Tyler are using said order for their personal aggrandizement, and being in control of its funds have become suddenly and enormously wealthy from ill-gotten gains collected from the ranks of the klansmen.

The said Clarke has gained complete control over the chief executive officer of the organization, and has either kept him drunk or has taken advantage of his drunken condition, and thereby procured himself (Clarke) to be appointed imperial wizard, pro tem, and exercising supreme control over the entire clan by virtue of this office and by virtue of the office of imperial klaliff and imperial kleagle.

In this manner, he controls the selection of the other officers of the imperial klansmen, which is the supreme council of the order, whose tenure of office is solely dependent on the will and whim of the said Clarke and he thereby controls their vote and influence, punishing with immediate dismissal any officer who opposes his will.

He has thereby converted a great and benevolent organization into a vast body of tribute payers, whose money enriches his coffers, so that he has reduced the other members of the clan to practical serfdom.

The said Clarke is collecting from every officer and agent of the clan handling money, a money premium, when in truth and in fact no such funds are in existence.

Defendant states on information and belief that all uniforms and regalia which each member of the clan is required to own are manufactured at cost not exceeding \$1.90 each, but are sold by a manufacturer to the clan for the sum of \$4 a piece, and said Clarke and Mrs. Tyler own a large, if not controlling interest, in the firm manufacturing such regalia.

Perfume and Microbes

The odor of cloves has been known to destroy microbes in 35 minutes, cinnamon will kill some species in 12 minutes, thyme in 35 minutes. In 45 minutes common wild verbena is found effective, while the odor of some geranium flowers has destroyed various forms of microbes in 50 minutes.
