THE RECOUNT

The attempt of Mr. Hall, late Klux candidate for the republican nomination for governor, to overturn the official results of the primary election have ended in failure; failure in the sense that Senator Hall's ambition has received a setback, but a success in view of the vindication of the honesty of the ordinary American citizen. Right up to the last moment of the recount a review of 20,000 ballots in several score precincts in three counties failed to show the least evidence of fraud on the part of the election officials.

The only stain on the good name of Oregon citizenship came with the counting of the ballots in a Portland precinct when it became known that 16 votes had been wrongfully counted for Hall and 18 had been taken away from Governor Olcott and that approximately 40 votes cast for John B. Coffey, candidate for the legislative nomination, had not been counted for him. The double miscount has led to a grand jury investigation and, no doubt, it will be known in a few days whether fraud has been perpetrated or not. In spite of the serious nature of the charge a humorous touch has been given the investigation because the man who is chiefly under investigation was president of "the law and order league."

NOTES AND NEWS

There is a good deal of talk going on about the cancellation of the debts owed to the United States by various European governments. On this matter Senator Borah says a word which will appeal to the average American as sound. "The people of the United States," says the Idaho senator, "could never be greatly interested in any proposition for the cancellation of the debt to the United States unless the proposition is accompanied by a definite and specific plan supported by certain guarantees for practical disarmament both by land and sea." That's the line of talk. What is the use of cancelling debts in order that Europe may begin once more senseless competition in armaments which must soon lead to other wars?

Most persons knew of the late Alexander Graham Bell only as the inventor of the telephone. He was an energetic promoter of the teaching of deaf mutes in whose behalf he founded a society to which he gave a quarter of a million dollars. He was a very successful teacher of deaf mutes.

Arthur Griffith, the Sinn Fein leader who died a few days ago, apparently was never greatly attached to republican ideas. Twenty years ago he set up as his goal an Anglo-Irish arrangement similar to that which (at that time) united Austria and Hungary. He had in mind a dual monarchy in which each state would have financial independence, but would be joined to the other by the personality of the sovereign. From all accounts Griffith became a republican with reluctance along in 1917.
