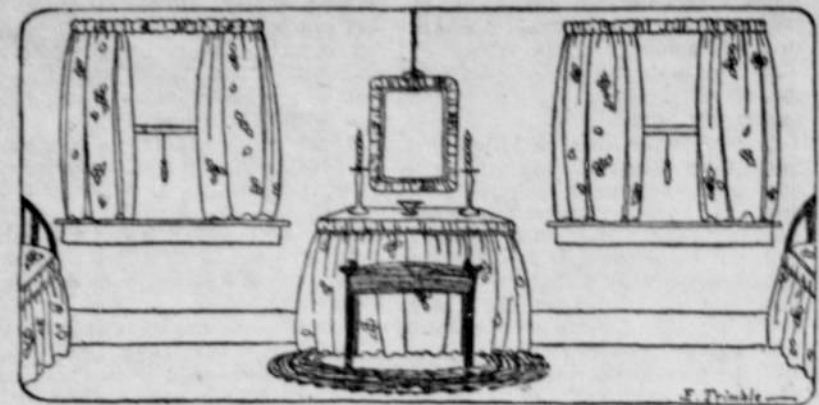

THIS DAINY BEDROOM AT LITTLE EXPENSE



The dainty bedroom pictured here may be duplicated at little expense by any housewife who is clever with her needle. Pale green chintz scattered with apple blossoms drapes the packing-box dressing table, the black enamel bow-foot bed, and forms the window draperies. The black bench which may be bought secondhand, is upholstered with the chintz; the beds may also be bought secondhand and enameled. A shirring two inches wide with a cord in each edge is used across the tops of the windows, around the edge of the beds and the dressing table, and to cover the mirror frame. The dressing table top is covered with a piece of the chintz, over which ordinary window glass is fitted. The hand-braided rug is made of the scraps of the chintz with a deep border of black. The candlesticks and powder dish are of rose-colored glass and the candles and mirror cord are also rose.

LUTHERANS MAKE PROTEST

More than a thousand Lutherans of the Missouri synod, attended a meeting at La Porte, Ind., to voice protest against the Oregon law recently adopted, prohibiting parents from sending their children to parochial schools. Dr. Duemling of Fort Wayne, made the principal address.

The meeting voiced the protest that it was an abridgement of personal liberty to take from parents the right to send their children to schools of their choice.

Similar meetings of protest will be held by all the Lutheran churches in the Missouri synod, the largest body of Lutheran churchmen in the United States.

Priest-Slayer Sentenced

Rev. Charles Dillon, assistant pastor of St. Augustine's parish, Kalamazoo, Mich., who shot and killed his pastor, Rev. Henry O'Neill April 12, has been sentenced to life imprisonment. Though believed to be mentally deranged he refused to let his attorney plead insanity.

Fish a la Cream

Boil a fish. Pick out all the bones and mince well. Mix a pint of cream, one tablespoon flour, one onion, chopped fine. Salt; add half pound of butter. Set on the fire. Stir until it thickens. Put in a deep dish, alternating fish, cracker crumbs and cream. Bake in a moderate oven until brown.

Bread Pudding

Two cups stale bread crumbs, one quart of milk, one-third cup sugar, one-fourth cup of melted butter, two eggs, one-half teaspoon salt, one teaspoon vanilla. Bake one hour in a slow oven. Serve with hard sauce or whipped cream.

Hard Sauce

One-third cup butter, one cup powdered sugar, one-third teaspoon lemon, and one-third teaspoon vanilla. Beat together until creamy.

Graham Pudding

One egg, one cup milk, one cup molasses, two cups graham flour, one teaspoon soda, one cup raisins, chopped fine. Steam three hours.

Sauce

One cup sugar, one heaping teaspoon flour, dissolved in cold water. Stir over fire till thick. Add half cup butter, beat one egg and turn the liquor over it, heating slowly.

Meat Rolls

Remove all the fat and gristle from some cooked meat. Put through food chopper. Season well. Add your left-over gravy. Now make a good rich biscuit dough. Roll thin and cut in five squares. Spread each square with this meat mixture. Roll up tightly. Place close together in a greased pan. Brush with milk. Bake in quick oven. Serve with a good gravy.

Celery Toast

Scrape, clean and cut the stalks into inch pieces. Cook in boiling salted water one-half hour or until tender. Drain and mix with a white

sauce. Prepare rounds of toast for each individual and put a tablespoon of the creamed celery on each piece.

Potato Candy

Bake ordinary sized potatoes. Scrape out the inside. Mash fine. Add quickly as much powdered sugar when beaten to make it white and fluffy. Have walnut meats ready to stir in. Any flavor desired. Make into small balls or cut into squares.
