KK ENTERTAINMENT A BRILLIANT AFFAIR FOR SWEET CHARITY

Enchanting Music and Fun Galore Enjoyed by Throng at Portland Auditorium.

Unlike some benefit entertainments, the one given last Saturday night at the Portland auditorium under the auspices of the Klan was of a very high standard of talent.

The sermon given in Swedish dialect by Forrest Boole was a great delight to the audience. It was rich in wit and humor.

A sketch given by Henderson and Henderson also was well received.

Mrs. Harvey Blakeslee's solos are well worthy of special mention. Mrs. Blakeslee has a good clear voice, which is well shown in her high sustained tones. The number, "Pale Moon," by Logan was very well done. But the real treat in her selection was in her enunciation. It was a joy to hear this noted soprano speak her words so that the audience could share them.

Miss Boole gave a group of dances of her own creation. Her butterfly

A group of pleasing violin numbers was given by Miss Jordan. This little lady, who though slight in stature is great in artistry and power, has mastered the technique of the violin. After her principal numbers she played "Believe Me, If All Those Endearing Young Charms," which sent the memory of all hearers winging back to other days.

Lieutenant R. L. Crane, who is a great favorite with Portland audiences, combined his vocal solos with two piano solos by Mrs. McCall. Lieutenant Crane has a powerful and pleasing baritone voice. His wide range and especially his resonance in the lower register made his last number, "The Sea Makes a Man a Man," a splendid success.

Mrs. McCall played two numbers, the first being a Scherzo by Mendelssohn, in which her magic fingers seemed fairly to fly through a maze of staccato notes. Her second number, of a more sombre character, demonstrated her splendid musicianship and her rare power of sympathetic interpretation.

ROMAN DUKE QUEER CATHOLIC SPECIMEN

At a recent dedication of a Protestant Church in England a Catholic Duke performed the ceremony of laying the corner stone. The London Times, commenting on the occurrence, said:

The first stone of a new Church has been laid at Attercliffe. The Duke of Norfolk presided at this ceremony, attended by Earls Surrey and Fitzwilliam, Lord Milton, several Lodges of Freemasonry, Odd Fellows, etc. The singularity of a Catholic Duke performing the ceremony of laying the first stone to a Protestant Church, elicited the following remarks from his Grace. "That he felt no scruples at what he had done; that in many respects he felt himself as much a Protestant as any of his fellow-subjects; that he had taken the oath of allegiance to a Protestant King, and if that King were ever to become a Catholic, he should consider himself absolved from his oath."

Benjamin Franklin, while Grand Master of Pennsylvania, edited and published an edition of Anderson's "constitution," which was probably the first Masonic work published in America. This was in 1734.

A Masonic Home Association has been formed at Green Springs, Ohio, and has already paid \$1000 on a site of land. This is the first step in the preparation for the building of a Masonic Temple, on which work will begin in the spring.

The petitioner in Missouri for Masonic degrees must pay \$20 for the benefit of the Home.

First came the noted priest, Dominic, from Ireland—father confessor to McSwiney the "martyr." Now come Peter Collins of Boston and a whole carload of "KC" organizers and speakers.

At the Union depot stands a palace car in which another "bunch" of KC's are traveling. The car is placarded: "The Catholic Church Extension Society of the United States of America." (Oh, they are active in the Pope's campaign to make America tributary to Rome.)

On one end of the car hangs this sign: "Saint Peter's Chapel."

The car came through from Chicago, and is in charge of one George Hennessy, K. C. Arrangements are being made for the car to leave Portland Saturday. Its movement will be watched with increasing interest.

So slick and efficient are these Roman workers that they are holding some of their meetings in Methodist and other Protestant churches—notably in Pasco, Wash., where "Father" Eaton, Methodist preacher, arranged their meeting in his church. Isn't this the limit?
