OUST THE JAPS AND THE HYPHENATES!

While on world war service in Japan, the present editor of The Western American was astonished to find that sanitation, as Americans have it, is non-existent there; that the country is an hundred years behind the United States in everything that makes a civilized nation, but everywhere, among all classes, the people were dreaming of a successful war with America, thus to win helf plate forthe pun.

The Nipponese have a strong army and navy, but lacking coordination and adequate support. They could not hope to survive six months of war with America Prepared. The warning is obvieus. They have no good roads, no motor transport. They lack steel and other industrial essentials. They need horses, badly, but have only a million and a half, against America's scores of millions. They have only a few motor trucks and passenger cars, while the United States has a half million commercial cars, increasing at the rate of 100,000 a year. They have no farm tractors, everything being done by coolie labor.

The area of Japan is about equal to that of California, with only fifteen million acres, or 15 per cent, in cultivation. The United States has 500 million acres in cultivation. In Japan there is one acre of tilled hand to every four inhabitants; in the United States, six acres. The American farmers have 61 million cattle. Japan has 1,390,000 cattle; 2700 sheep; 332,000 hogs. The Yankees have 50 million sheep and 70 million hogs.

These figures were obtained from Dr. Issa Tanamura, imperial director of the Japanese agricultural department, who admitted that the dream of conquest in America was militarism

America needs to be prepared for a clash with Japan, for it is coming, but has nothing to fear from such a struggle. It will be brief and decisive. It will teach the mongrel yellow races a lesson that will last them for another thousand years. They suffer just now from an awful case of big head, of which a whipping is the only cure.
