Supplicating for Cash. The Shrine committee set out to raise a half million dollars to entertain the visitors. At the outset, it linked up with the Knights of Columbus and sent speakers to address the "Kaseys" in their conclaves and to supplicate for aid.

This angered many loyal Shriners who resent mixing the affairs of the two elements that can never become reconciled. The "Kaseys" welcomed the opportunity to put their fingers in the Shrine pie so that they could broadcast to the world their "broad-mindedness" which they lost no time in doing.

Many Shriners Disgusted. Many Shriners here have refused to have anything to do with the committee on account of these moves and are withdrawing their support. At least one western Temple has written the Shrine committee that it will not attend the convention because of the affiliations with the Catholics. There may have been others to take the same step.

The Washington Post, official organ of the Catholics here, is planning a "special Shrine edition" while the convention is here. They are soliciting advertising from everybody. Even the visiting temples themselves are being solicited.

Here's the Worst of All! To make his bad circumstance infinitely worse, the solicitation by the Post is backed up by an official letter on Shrine stationery, asking the full and complete "co-operation" of the Temple solicited. The communication was signed by Charles D. Warner, 33d degree, publicity director of the Shrine committee. One Temple, Heljas, of Greenville, S. C., took the letter seriously and sent to Washington to find out the inclinations of the paper here. The illustrious Potentate was advised of the Catholic tendencies of the Post and as a result he has advised all Shriners of the temple to "lay off" and "blow in" their money in Washington rather than spend it with the Catholic organ.

Making Desperate Appeals. The committee is up against it for funds. They are making a last desperate appeal to elements in the city to "lay off the Catholic stuff" so that they can get Catholic money with which to entertain the Shriners. Knights of the Ku Klux Klan have offered their services to the Shriners in any capacity deemed expedient by the Shriners, but thus far they have been turned down entirely. Their offer has been ignored. There are many Shriners among the Klan here and they are bitterly sore over the ignoring of them as Klansmen.
