Bryan's New Paper.

Lincoln, Neb., Jan. 23.—The first number of the Commoner, the weekly paper published by William J. Bryan, was issued this afternoon. It is a neat-looking sheet, typographically.

The salutatory says: "Webster defines a commoner as 'one of the common people.' The name has been selected for this paper because the Commoner will endeavor to aid the common people in the protection of their rights, the advancement of their interests and the realization of their aspirations. It is not necessary for the use of a term which distinguishes the great body of the population from a comparatively few who, for one reason or another, withdraw themselves from sympathetic connection with their fellows. * * * The common people do not constitute an exclusive society—they are not of the four hundred; any one can become a member if he is willing to contribute by brain or muscle to the Nation's strength and greatness. Only those are barred—and they are barred by their own choice—who imagine themselves made of a superior kind of clay, and who deny the equality of all before the law. A rich man who has honestly acquired his wealth, and who is not afraid to intrust his care to the laws made by his fellows, can count himself among the common people, while a poor man is really not one of them if he fawns before a plutocrat and has no higher ambition than to be a courtier or a sycophant. The Commoner will be satisfied if, by fidelity to the common people, it proves its right to the name which it has chosen."

No cases have been argued before the United States Supreme Court for years that have attracted such general attention as has been given to those involving the constitutionality of the colonial policy of the present administration. In addition to the importance of the cases themselves, which would have necessarily attracted attention, is the gossip attributing a personal interest on the part of an ex-President in securing a decision a decision against the administration. Lawyers say that counsel on both sides made about every possible point in favor of their contention. How soon the court will reach and hand down its decision no one knows, but the importance of the case makes it unlikely that there will be any unnecessary delay.

A bill for the better protection from reckless hunters has been introduced in the legislature as follows:

"Section 1. If any person while hunting for game, mistakes a human being for any kind of game or any inanimate object, and shoots at said human being and kills the same, such person shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment not less than one year nor more than 10 years.

"Sec. 2. If any persons, while hunting for any kind of game, mistakes any human being for any inanimate object and shoots at said human being and wounds the same but not fatally, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than three months nor more than one year, or by fine not less than \$100 nor more than \$500."

Port Townsend, Wash., Jan. 21.—The steamship Al-Ki arrived today, five days overdue from Skagway. Her officers report that Alaska has been visited by one of the severest storms known for years, and that considerable damage has resulted. High winds have prevailed, accompanied by snow, and the cold has been intense. On the run from Juneau to Taku Inlet, a distance of 16 miles, two men on the lookout were almost frozen to death at their posts, and the vessel had to return to Juneau, where the men were placed in hospital for medical treatment. After starting back to Juneau, the wind swept down Gastineux Channel with such force that it took the Al-Ki four hours to make the run of 16 miles.

The Al-Ki reports that the tug Pioneer, sent north to tow the City of Topeka down, was windbound in Taku Inlet. The passenger steamer Dolphin is several days overdue from the north, and is reported stormbound. Many stamps at the Treadwell mine, on Douglas Island, are hung up on account of the water supply being frozen. The cold and the storm are the worst known in Alaska, and grave fears are entertained that when reports come from outlying sections the loss of life and suffering will be large.

Havana, Jan. 22.—The central committee of the Cuban constitutional convention reported at the session of the convention the proposed constitution. The document contains some modifications of the original draft. The convention adjourned until Thursday.

The proposed constitution does not contain any propositions regarding the future relations between the United States and Cuba. In the project submitted there is a clause, in addition to the original draft, providing that 90 days after the adoption of the electoral law the constitution shall go into effect. The electoral law will be drawn up as soon as the constitution is completed.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, Jan. 24.—It has been decided that the funeral of the Queen will take place at Windsor Castle Feb. 2. The body of the late Queen will be removed from Osborne House February 1. It was the expressed desire of the Queen that the funeral should be military in character. Several officers arrived from Windsor this morning, bringing the state regalia. It was carried in a biaz bag. A naval salute of 21 guns was fired at noon today, in honor of King Edward VII.

The body of Queen Victoria was embalmed and will probably be taken to Windsor Saturday. The coffin arrived last evening from London. An incident characteristic of the Queen's solicitude for others occurred two days ago, when, in one of the intervals of consciousness, she found strength to suggest to her dressers, who had been acting as nurses, to take the opportunity to get some fresh air. Monday she asked that her little pomeranian spaniel be brought to her bedroom.

It was thought that the Queen was dying about 9 o'clock in the evening, and carriages were sent to Osborne cottage and the rectory to bring all the Princes and Princesses and the Bishop of Winchester to her bedside. It seemed then very near the end, but when things looked the worst, the Queen had one of the rallies due to her wonderful constitution, opened her eyes and recognized the presence of Wales, the Princesses and Emperor William. She asked to see one of her faithful servants, a member of the household. He hastened to the room, but before he got there the Queen had passed into a fitful sleep.

Queen is Dead.

Cowes, Isle of Wight, Jan. 23.—Queen Victoria is dead and Edward VII reigns.

The greatest event in the memory of this generation, the most stupendous change in existing conditions that could possibly be imagined, has taken place quietly, upon the anniversary of the death of Queen Victoria's father, the Duke of Kent. The end of this career, never equaled by any woman in the world's history, came in a simply furnished room in Osborne House. This most respected of women, living or dead, lay in a great four-posted bed and made a shrunken atom whose aged face and figure were a cruel mockery of the fair girl who, in 1837, began to rule over England. Around her were gathered almost every descendant of her line. Well within view of her dying eyes there hung a portrait of the Prince Consort. It was he who designed the room and every part of the castle.

In scarcely audible words, the white-haired Bishop of Winchester prayed beside her, as he had often prayed, for he was her chaplain at Windsor. With bowed heads the imperious ruler of the German Empire and the man who is now King of England, the woman who has succeeded to the title of Queen, the Princes and Princesses, and those of less than royal designation, listened to the bishop's ceaseless praying.

Six o'clock passed. The Bishop continued his intercession. One of the younger children asked a question in shrill, childish treble and was immediately silenced. The women of the royal family sobbed faintly and the men shuffled uneasily.

At exactly half past 6, Sir James Ried held up his hand, and the people then knew that England had lost her Queen. The Bishop pronounced the benediction. The Queen passed away quite peacefully. She suffered no pain. The most of the mourners went to their rooms. A few minutes later the inevitable element of materialism stepped into this pathetic chapter of international history, for the court ladies went busily to work ordering their mourning from London. The wheels of the world were jarred when the announcement came, but in this palace at Osborne everything pursued the usual course. Down in the kitchen they were cooking a huge dinner for an assemblage, the like of which has seldom been known in England, and the dinner preparations proceeded just as if nothing had happened.
