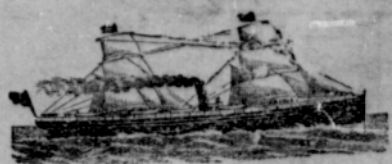

The Sixes Coal Fields.

An Eckley correspondent of the

Myrtle Point Enterprise writes as

follows: "The coal interests of this

section is the paramount issue here

at present. Although thirty years

have elapsed since the first pros-

pecting was done on coal discover-

ies here, which developed veins of

sufficient size to make it profitable

as to quantity, and by analysis the

quality was proven to be equal if

not superior to any on the coast,

yet owing to remoteness and lack of

capital, together with a lack of con-

certed action on the part of owners,

its development has been neglected

until about three years ago, when a

Mr. Holmes, a coal expert from San

Francisco took hold of the matter

and has prosecuted the same until

now he is prepared with machinery

and boring apparatus to fully as-

certain the extent of the coal fields,

which indications show to be from

one to two miles in width and eight

miles in length. They have been

operating their machinery for the

past few days and have attained a

depth of 140 feet, and while the in-

dications at that depth are encour-

aging, the results of their borings

will not be made known until sim-

ilar operations have been carried

out in various parts of the coal

fields."
