Change in Public School Fiscal Year.

Salem, April 30.—The next fiscal year in public school affairs will be 16 months long. This is a break in the usual course of school events, and one that will occasion many misunderstandings and some minor difficulties. The last legislature changed the end of the first fiscal year from the first Monday in March to the third Monday in June, and the change will take effect next year. This year the school election took place in March, and all school statistics were computed to that time. School statistics showing population, receipts, expenditures, etc., will not be computed again until the third Monday in June, 1902. They will therefore cover the period beginning in March, 1901, and ending in June, 1902. The statistics for next year will consequently form no basis for comparison with former years. In city districts, the change will probably occasion no trouble, but in the country communities it will probably be different. District clerks will be sending in their reports in March, or will send them in June with statistics for the year ending in March, or will cover a period beginning in June. But the change is one that meets a general demand that the fiscal year should correspond with the school year. The great majority of schools close by the third Monday in June, and under the new law the annual reports will cover one complete school year, rather than parts of two school years.

New York, April 29.—A special to the Herald from Washington says:

In agreeing to insert in the proposed isthmian canal treaty a provision establishing the projected waterway, Secretary Hay has taken action which meets with the full approval of Admiral Dewey and the majority of the Naval officers. When told that the President will pledge the United States to observe the principle of neutrality in the convention under negotiation, the Admiral ejaculated:

"Splendid. More than a year ago I said that the canal should be neutral. I am more convinced today of the necessity of such action. Erection of fortifications would make the canal one of the prime objectives of our enemy's operations in time of war. Besides their construction would entail enormous expense and necessitate constant expenditure to keep them manned and in proper condition. I see no necessity for them. The neutrality of the canal can be guaranteed by our fleet. The canal is to be a commercial waterway, and neutralization therefore will mean its preservation.

Though a Democrat of the Southern type, Senator McLaurin, of South Carolina, is a thorough expansionist, supports the Administration in its expansion policy throughout. He is roundly denounced as a party traitor by some of his Democratic brethren, but this does not change his course or frighten him. He sees as Senator Morgan does, that expansion, and Asiatic trade, will benefit the South more than any other portion of the country. The Asiatic will buy an unlimited amount of cotton goods.

There will be state elections this year in Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Iowa, and Governors will be chosen in all those states except Maryland.

Del Norte Record.

The people of this place and Chetco have no faith in the Isaac Minor timber deal being a benefit to these localities in the near future, but there is an enterprise now on a sound footing, and which is quite liberally supported and encouraged by the residents, to put in a landing at Chetco harbor and to inaugurate and maintain a lively business in that vicinity.

The McVay Bros., of Chetco are milking about 60 choice cows on their dairy and turning out a fair quantity of excellent butter. This is a beautiful little dairy-farm capable of maintaining about 75 cows. After having run this dairy successfully for a number of years they now desire to rent, and offer to lease it for \$1100 per annum for a period of five years. This is an excellent opportunity for some dairyman.

A J. Cooley's creamery is running in good shape. Mr. Cooley is all right and dairymen can rest assured that this little creamery will handle their milk to the best possible advantage.

Chetco is becoming quite a dairy county. Fred Blake and Wm. Cooley are each running nice dairies.

Messrs Morrison, Heyne, Gardner, Jackson, Steine, Moore and others, living up Chetco river, are putting in fine gardens. We think from the present appearance of their watermelon and tomato plants they will be abundantly able to supply the Del Norte market with these luxuries. From present appearance fruit will be abundant this season throughout Del Norte and Curry counties.

The purchase by Isaac Minor of Del Norte timber lands and the harbor at Chetco give rise to many hopes that the work of developing this section of the country will be undertaken.

Some view with alarm the fact that Chetco is to be built up for the reason that they believe much of the traffic which now finds its way to the sea coast here will be diverted to the more northern point. This would do no harm to Crescent City. This port will always retain that portion of the traffic that is and always will be peculiarly her own. The coast line is such that it will admit of no rival that can take the bulk of her trade from her. But to those who live outside of Crescent City and who constitute its support, it will be a cause of rejoicing that there will be another port to which they can resort should rates be too high or the service be poor. Mr. Minor is quoted in the last issue of the Blue Lake Advocate as saying that he intends to put in one new mill if not two in this county and construct about 10 miles of railroad to Chetco harbor.

Mr. Minor's advent in Del Norte will be heartily welcomed. Investors who develop the county and build it up are to be encouraged in preference to those who withhold their resources from development until they grow fat with the wealth of the surrounding populace and then dispose of it to industrious people burdened with the charge they have placed upon it.

The revised legal weights of a bushel of different agricultural products as amended by the last Oregon legislature are as follows: Sixty pounds for a bushel of wheat or clover seed; 56 pounds for a bushel of rye or Indian corn; 32 pounds for a bushel of oats; 46 pounds for a bushel of barley; 42 pounds for a bushel of buckwheat; 33 pounds for a bushel of dried apples or peaches; 60 pounds for a bushel of potatoes; 45 pounds for a bushel of apples or pears.

At the public sale of cattle belonging to the Wm. Penland estate, which took place recently at Lexington, Oregon, the dry cows sold at \$22.50 per head; cows with calves at \$26 per head; two-year-old steers, \$27.50 per head; yearling steers, \$16 per head, and yearling and two-year-old heifers, \$16 per head.

From Dutch Harbor, Alaska.

As the people of Curry will be pleased to hear from their old friend Will Gauntlett, Deputy Collector at Unalaska, we copy the following from a private letter to the editor, dated March 18:

Yesterday in the States was St. Patrick's day; up here it was March 17—that's all—as the natives here don't know St. Patrick or any of his folks; so it passed off like any other day. But it was the finest day we have had during the winter—calm, clear and freezing, and I am inclined to think the old fellow had some interest in this country, for there is not a toad, frog or snake on the island, and in the summer time the whole country hereabout looks as though it was covered with a green velvet carpet—no place can out-green this island. So taking all things into consideration, it looks as though St. Pat or his deputy had been around here.

This has been a very dull winter. I suppose we feel it more for the reason that there was so much business and life during last summer. A great many people were here all the time, going and coming from Nome. 354 vessels of all kinds entered and departed during the season, and at times from six to eight thousand people were on shore. But few remain in winter, and there is nothing doing.

Last November the steamer Tillamook started to carry our winter mail, and on her way to Juneau ran on a reef and became a total wreck. Then came the Aloha, and last December she ran on a rock, and went to Seattle for repairs, and did not get back until the 25th, of last month, so we have had only three mails in five months, and when you imagine yourself away out here to the westward on an island, cut off from civilization, you are liable to get the blues.

Although the winter for this place has been rather mild, 15 above being the coldest day, it has been disagreeable owing to so much rain, sleet, snow and S. E. wind. Such weather causes considerable sickness among the natives, as they are all more or less consumptive, and as the measles got among them last June many of them are still suffering from the effects. The priest of the Russian Church informs me that one third of the natives have died from the effects of the measles, and they are still suffering with something like the whooping cough. I can't tell you anything about Nome at this time of the year. I don't look for the rush this year that there was last year, but still there will be a great number of people go, but it will be a different class of people—those who have some knowledge of mining, and not so many cranks—people with theories and no practice. There were thousands of them last year who put their last dollar in some crazy machine that wouldn't catch a \$20 piece if you drove it in with a pile-driver. I can't imagine why so many people escape the insane asylum. This year I look for more miners and fewer cranks.

Several good prospects were struck late last fall. The highest north, as I was told by a man who made the discoveries, was in the Arctic ocean, between Point Hope and Cape Lisbon. He showed me \$80 that he said he rocked out in an hour and a half. He was on one of the last vessels that left here last fall.

There is also some excitement, and parties have left here to prospect along the peninsula, so there is no telling at this time where will be the next rush; but I look for several new places.

I received several copies of the Tribune by last mail, and they looked like old familiar friends. The paper is to me a letter from home, and through it I am able to keep posted as to what my friends are doing in Curry. I notice many new names, and several of my old friends have passed away; others have left the county, while several are running in the same old groove. There are many changes, and I have only been gone three years, the 3d of next month. The greatest improvement is the telephone to Gold Beach. I hope some day to see you all. Give my kind regards to all old friends. WM. GAUNTLETT.

Creamery butter is now quoted at 16 1/2 to 18 1/2 cents at San Francisco.

Buyers are paying from 12 to 14 cents for choice wool in Northern California.

The Times reports the local price of wool at Corvallis, Oregon, at 12 1/2 cents per pound.

Eighteen hundred sheared yearling sheep were sold at Arlington, Oregon, a few days ago at \$2.25 per head.

The last Missouri legislature appropriated \$40,000 for the erection of a dairy building for their agricultural college.

This year's clip of mohair in Oregon has probably amounted to about 275,000 pounds. Most of it has already been sold. For the greater part of the clip 20 cents per pound was paid by local buyers.

Bidwell Cram, of Cross Keys, Oregon, recently delivered 25 head of beef cattle to Charles Butler, at Shaniko, Or., for which he received \$50 per head for steers, and \$43 per head for cows.
