Strahan Bros. gasoline boat had a narrow escape from serious damage one day last week. The boys had brought a pile driver hammer, weighing over a ton, up from Frankport, and were hoisting it onto the wharf. When near the top it suddenly fell back into the boat and was only prevented from going entirely through the boat by striking on a box of furs.

John Sutton, who was working on the grade at Frankport, had his hand severely hurt one day last week. A large rock was being removed, and he was using a crowbar, when Asher Cook, by accident, struck his hand with a pick, which passed through one side of his hand. While the wound is quite severe it would have been much more serious had it struck the hand a little deeper.

On May 1, the Secretary of State apportioned to the several counties, according to acreage, the sum of \$11,763.45, being 5 per cent of the net proceeds of the sale of public lands in the state for the year. Of this sum Curry county, with 949,120 acres, receives \$185.16, while Coos, whose acreage is 1,004,480, receives \$193.84. Harney is the largest, with 6,780,160 acres, receiving \$1,308.42, while Multnomah, is the smallest, having but 281,920 acres, and receiving \$54.40.

"Mountaineer" furnishes the Recorder the following items:

J. C. Clark and Lib Haines each took a horse load of bedding, etc., over to the South fork of Sixes last week for Searls and Thompson, the gentlemen from Washington, who propose to mine the bed of the South fork the coming season. Messrs. Searls, Thompson and Allen Collier of Coquille, are on the South fork at the present time making preparation for the summer's run. I understand Mr. Collier will superintend the work for Searls and Thompson.

George Guerin, Jr., who took a contract for Searls and Thompson, last fall, to build a flume 1800 feet in length, has been busy the past two months, with the aid of two men, sawing and floating down to the mine, finished floating the lumber down last week, and is hurrying the flume to completion as fast as possible.

Last Saturday while George Thornton and Will Dryden were fishing for cod near Steamboat Rock they had a strike on their lines that made them think they had caught a whale. And it was almost as nearly being a whale as a thing could be and then besomething else. He took the line out at a merry rate and finally came to the surface. The boys then shot it with a rifle they had in the boat and when they drew the boat close to it they dispatched it with a hatchet. When towed to the beach it proved to be a shark of the man eating variety. It measured six and a half feet long.—Del Norte Record.

The Weather For April.

The records of the Weather Bureau of the U. S. Department of Agriculture for Portland, Oregon, kept for a period of 29 years, show that the normal temperature for the month is 57 degrees. The warmest May was that of 1888, with a temperature of 62 degrees. The coldest May was that of 1899, with a temperature of 51 degrees. The highest temperature recorded in the month was 99 degrees, on May 29, 1887. The coldest temperature in the month was 32 degrees, on May 9, 1894.

The average rainfall for the month is 2.39 inches. The greatest rainfall for the month was 6.60 inches, in 1879, and the least, 0.63 of an inch, in 1888.

The Oregon State Board of Agriculture has appropriated \$707.50 for a new creamery building for the state fair. It will be located near the main office building.

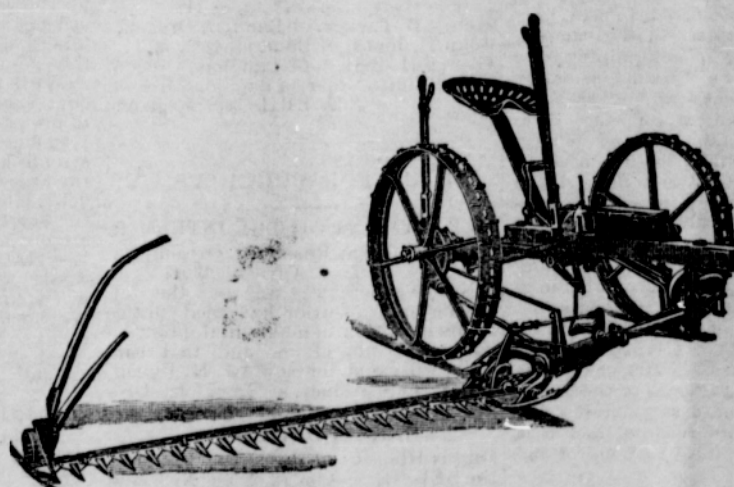

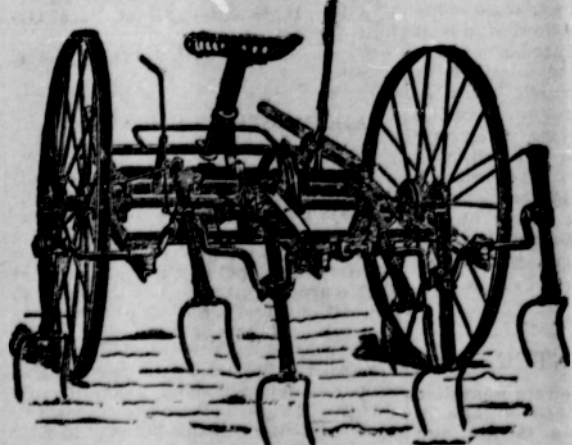
