LESSON FOR TYPEWRITERS.

There are Many Offenders Who Will Do Well to Read This Truthful Little Story.

"It was several years ago," said the woman at the typewriter to a New York Times writer, "and I was young, but I knew my work. I had been very anxious to get a position in a certain law office, because the head of the firm was an old friend of my father, and it would not be quite like going among strangers to be there. There was a vacancy. I applied for the position and obtained it. My first day's work was along the regular lines of routine work in a law office, and it was not until toward night that I was called into my employer's private office to take dictation. He dictated clearly and distinctly. I took the notes easily, copied them on the machine and was told that the work was satisfactory when I took it in."

"There had been only one thing that I noticed particularly while I was taking the dictation. My employer seemed to be in the first stages of the grip, to judge by the frequent 'sniffs' that he gave. 'Poor man,' I thought to myself. 'I am afraid he is going to die.' In his private office I had noticed a placard bearing the words: 'No Smoking,' but I had not given it thought until the next morning, when I went again to take dictation, and there I saw an addendum to the sign. EGGS BY THE QUART.

That is the Way They Will Soon Be Sold in Kansas City Markets.

"Give me a quart of yolks," "What are whites worth to-day?" "Send me up a gallon of mixed." Such expressions as these will be familiar terms in grocery stores and butcher shops in Kansas City before long, says the Kansas City Journal. Housewives will make them so, for eggs will be sold by the pint, quart and gallon, instead of by the dozen. In fact, the big confectionery establishment of the city buy them by the gallon now. Kitchen economy suggested the scheme and local packers immediately took it up.

How often it is that a cook will break a dozen or more eggs just in order to get the yolks to make a cake. The whites will be thrown away. Or vice versa. Why not make a saving of the whites or yolks, as the case may be, was suggested. The packers put the question to the confectioners, and the latter saw the point. Now when a confectioner wants to make stuff with the yolks he sends to a packing house and buys yolks by the gallon; if he wants to use the whites for something he sends for them; if he wants to use both he sends and gets a mixed can. It is predicted that housewives will soon adopt the same method.

With this new system of handling "hen fruit" there is absolutely no loss. The eggshells are even used. They are ground up and sold for chicken feed.

"I saw a reference the other day to the great Arizona diamond field swindle," said an old jeweler to a New Orleans Times-Democrat man. "It was sprung on the public just 30 years ago, and I remember the excitement it created. The originator of the scheme came from New Orleans. He was a brilliant man, a chemist, geologist and natural diplomat, but he lacked moral counterpoise. He and his associates procured a number of uncut stones from Holland, and 'salted' a canyon in the mountain south of the Gila river. Then followed the 'discovery' and the organization of a company and in a few months nearly \$200,000 worth of stock was sold. It was several years before the exact character of the swindle was developed, and by that time the affairs of the company were so confused that nobody cared to undertake a prosecution."

"I saw the 'professor,' as he was called, at Ogden, Utah, in 1884, and he described the whole affair with great glee. Afterward he was mixed up in two other shady enterprises. One was a scheme for aging whiskey and the other was a device for refining sugar by electricity. Both were fakes, but he made a lot of money out of them, and as usual escaped punishment. It was the old story, however; he went broke in the end and died a few years ago in the charity ward of a Chicago hospital. A good deal of the diamond mine stock was taken in New Orleans, and I dare say some of it is kicking around here to this day."
