Senator Burrows, of Michigan, who will be Chairman of the Committee on Privileges and Elections, has long been an advocate of the election of Senators by the people. He has a new idea along that line, which he will propose as a constitutional amendment at the coming session of Congress. It provides that when a legislature fails to elect a Senator, the governor shall order an election by the people of the state to fill the vacancy.

We do not believe the Senator's ideas will meet the approval of the masses, who will not be satisfied with anything less than a Constitutional amendment providing for the election of all Senators by a direct vote of the people. The scheme would not remove from State legislatures the scandal and corrupting influences that have in recent years surrounded so many Senatorial elections. It would not prevent wrangling, and pulling and hauling of members, distracting their attention from their duties as lawmakers, but would continue to be a stumbling-block and detriment to the enactment of important and needed legislation.

The people of the United States at the present time are almost a unit for the election of Senators by popular vote, and they will yet bring sufficient pressure to bear to compel Congress to submit the question to their decision.

Salem, June 26.—A little more than four months ago the new law went into effect governing the payment of bounties on the scalps of wild animals, and during that time the state has issued warrants for its two-thirds share of the bounty in the sum of \$9425.25. Should the same average demand continue, it would mean \$25,134.08 for the entire 12 months, or \$134.08 above the amount appropriated by the legislature.

According to a dispatch from Washington to the Herald, the government is not favorable to obliterating China's means of defense, and will not officially sanction the acts of the other powers in destroying Chinese fortifications. The company of American troops now at Pekin is not to be used in razing forts, but is stationed in the Chinese Capital to protect the American Legation, and for no other purpose.

The Republican State Convention of Ohio have placed in nomination the following ticket: For Governor, George K. Nash; for Lieutenant Governor, Carl L. Nippert; Supreme Judge, J. L. Price; Attorney General John M. Sheets; Clerk Supreme Court, Lawson Emerson; State Treasurer, Isaac B. Cameron; Member Board of Public Works, W. G. Johnston.

Maine people have been celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of the enactment of the prohibition law, and everybody who wanted to celebrate by becoming hilarious or inebriated on liquor could do so just as easily as the same could be done in any other state.

The fight to oust Commissioner Evans from the head of the Pension Bureau is being pushed with renewed energy, but the commissioner still holds the fort and appears to be backed by the president, and says he will not resign.

An appeal has been issued for money to buy supplies for the Boer women and children who are held as reconcentrados in the British camps of South Africa.

The smallpox has reached Gardiner, near the mouth of the Umpqua.

The plague still prevails to some degree at Honolulu.

A. B. Hammond Controls Lumber Industry of California.

A. B. Hammond, of the Astoria & Columbia River railroad fame, returned from San Francisco this morning, after having spent about a month with his family there, as he says. However, in the course of conversation said, too, that in a few spare moments he was instrumental in forming what might quite appropriately be termed a lumber trust. He went in with a few friends and formed a combination to be known as the Hammond Lumber company. The capital of this combine will be somewhere between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000, and the magnitude of the company may be realized from the fact that it practically controls all the great redwood counties of the state of California, and also a large portion of the cedar districts in Southern Oregon.

Mr. Hammond in person "has the say" of some 30,000 acres of land in Humboldt county and thereabouts, and close friends of his in Minnesota are credited with 30,000 acres more.

Speaking of the gigantic deal, Mr. Hammond said:

"The Hammond Lumber company practically controls the lumber business of California. It handles the output of the Vance Redwood Lumber company, the Humboldt Sash and Door company, the Carriss Lumber company of Mill City, Or., and all other lumber companies operating in Southern Oregon and Northern California, and will also acquire all new companies that may be started. San Francisco is our headquarters, and Charles R. McCormick, formerly engaged in the lumber business in Portland, has been placed in charge of the main office. He came to the coast from Michigan some time ago, and understands the lumbering industry in every detail.

"The mills of Eureka will be enlarged to a great extent, and the Eureka & Klamath railroad extended far into the heart of the timber districts. We have 20,000 acres of land in that district, and it is estimated that from it will be real something like 3,000,000,000 ft. of lumber. W. A. Doherty, a mill man from Green Bay, Mich., is now in the city on his way to Eureka to superintend the construction of the plant, and work will be pushed as rapidly as possible."—Telegram.

Seals Do Eat Salmon.

The California naturalists, who are making a vigorous effort to protect sea lions, claim that the food of the lions consist wholly of squids, cuttlefish, etc., and that food fishes are not destroyed at all, says the Coos Bay News. If those naturalists would spend a vacation on the coast, visiting the mouths of the rivers and bays during the salmon season they would soon be convinced that their claims are erroneous. A good many years ago, when sea lions were very numerous at the mouth of the Coquille we have frequently watched a school of lions fishing on the bar, and the number of salmon they would kill was something astonishing. The river then entered the ocean quite a distance south of where it does now. It passed close by the Tupper Rock, and a person sitting on the bluff had an excellent view of the mouth of the river. The sea lions not only destroyed salmon for food, but in many instances seemed to kill them for the mere sport of doing so. They would often take a bite out of a salmon and then let the fish go, to fall a prey to the eagles, ospreys, seagulls and shags that always congregated for a square meal when the salmon season commenced, and after it is over, the sea lions feed on red groupers, snappers, ling, etc. Large herds of sea lions can be seen any day between Cape Arago and Port Orford and parties who are outside after sea fish have frequently reported seeing lions come to the surface with a red fish or grouper in their mouths. Fish is the natural food of the sea lion. He may occasionally, for various reasons, be driven to eating squids, etc., but this diet is only temporary.

Endless Chain of Scalps.

Hank Jones, an old trapper who passed through Portland some months ago, on his way from Idaho to the Klamath country to engage in the business of extirpating coyotes for the sake of the bounty paid for the scalps of these pestiferous animals, arrived here Saturday on his way back to Idaho a very much disgusted man. He said from what he had seen in the Oregonian in regard to the number of coyote scalps that had been turned in and bounties paid on, he had imagined that he could make a fortune in the Klamath region in one season. The number of coyotes he saw running over the cattle ranges when he got into Klamath county encouraged him in his idea, and he set all his traps. The first night he caught several coyotes, but was astonished to find that only one of them had a scalp. The others were baldheaded—that is, like Uncle Ned, they had no hair on the top of the head in the place where the hair ought to grow. He could not understand this, but said nothing and went on with his trapping. While he was in Klamath county he caught dozens of coyotes, about 75 per cent of which were baldheaded, and some had a new scalp partially grown. He finally began to inquire what was the matter with the coyotes in that section. He found that while the sheep men were anxious to have the coyotes killed off, and had secured the passage of the bounty law, the cattlemen wished the coyotes preserved in order that they might kill off the sheep and leave the range grass for the cattle. The cowboys employed by the cattlemen had worked to this end by running down and lassoing coyotes and ripping their scalps off and allowing them to go at large. The coyotes suffered but little from the loss of their scalps, and finding that after they had yielded them up they were allowed to frequent the cattle ranges without being molested, and to grow fat on mutton, they soon grasped the situation and began to come in and be scalped when hot weather set in. A new scalp grows on the bald heads in one season, and they all come in once a year to be scalped, and the cowboys are getting rich on bounties, while the number of coyotes keeps increasing. Mr. Jones says that unless the bounty law is repealed every cowboy in that region will be a millionaire and the state will be bankrupt in a few years. If anyone doubts this statement, he is assured that Mr. Jones is an honest man—in fact, he has long been known in that part of Idaho where he resided as "Honest John."—Telegram.

Now that the powers have fixed the amount of indemnity that China must pay, the Chinese Government is beginning to file its claims for damages on account of looting, the first claim made being against the United States for 400,000 taels, alleged to be the amount of loot appropriated by American soldiers at Tien Tsin. If this be approximately correct, and China makes proportionate demands of the other powers, not only for the looting done at Tien Tsin, but at Pekin and in that vicinity, she is likely to make out an aggregate claim that will go far to offset the indemnity demanded by the powers. And then if China should put in a claim for noncombatants wantonly killed during marauding expeditions, at even one-tenth the rate Germany, for example, would charge for her citizens murdered in like manner. China might bring the powers out in debt to her. But the trouble about China's claims is, how is she going to enforce their allowance by the powers whose soldiers did the looting? This, indeed she cannot do, but she may make these claims a plausible and indeed a valid excuse for non payment of the indemnity, though this course could scarcely result otherwise than in partition of the Empire.

The Boxers of China are still active and are reported to be preparing to again make trouble for foreigners and foreign sympathisers in China.
