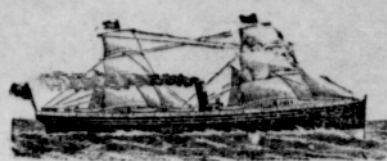

The Oregonian publishes a very good portrait of the late Patrick Hughes, of this county, together with the following brief biographical sketch:

"Patrick Hughes, one of the best known and most influential residents of Curry county, who recently met with a serious accident that terminated fatally, June 23, arrived in Oregon in 1857. He was born in Castle Cawfield, County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1830, and came to America at the age of 19. Forty-three years of his life were spent in Curry county, near Cape Blanco, where he acquired large and valuable property. Mr. Hughes was a staunch Roman Catholic, a patriotic citizen, a man of marked ability, and universally respected and beloved. A wife and seven children survive him. The children are: Mrs. P. J. Masterson, of Port Orford; Mrs. Frank McMullen, of Denmark, Or.; J. S. Hughes, of Cape Blanco lighthouse; Rev. J. C. Hughes, rector of St. Laurence church, of Portland, and E. A., T. P. and F. J. Hughes, of Curry county.

A few weeks ago we clipped an item from the Port Orford Tribune in which was mentioned the length of the wool of some sheep belonging to F. M. Langlois, and some of our readers thought it more of a yarn than a true description of Mr. Langlois' wool crop, whereupon we wrote to Mr. L. for a sample of the wool, which has arrived and is to be found in the Herald office for inspection by those who were a little skeptical in regard to the truthfulness of the assertion. Mr. Langlois has sent us three samples, one of which is 21 inches and the other two from 18 to 20 inches in length. Taking into consideration the healthfulness of sheep in this part of our state and the prolific increase of the herds, with the heavy growth of wool, certainly makes this an ideal wool-growing section and Mr. Langlois has doubtless obtained the long woolled kind. However, there are many other kinds which might prove equally as profitable, as finer wool brings better prices, and even though the clip is not so weighty, would be, perhaps, none the less valuable per head.—Herald.

Rogue River Hatchery.

Medford, July 7.—About two years ago the United States Fish Commission established a station or hatchery on Rogue river, about 33 miles above Medford, for the purpose of restocking the river and its tributaries with salmon and other food fishes. The work from the beginning has been under the management of J. W. Berrian a fish culturist who has seen several years' service with the Fish Commission, and whose intelligent labors have conclusively developed the superiority of the salmon and the waters of Rogue river for hatchery purposes.

Since this station was established it has taken about 10,000,000 salmon eggs, the product from which has been mainly placed in Rogue river and its tributaries. During the past year, which was rather unfavorable, low water causing a smaller run of salmon than usual in the upper river, about 4,000,000 eggs were taken. Of these, about 2,500,000 salmon eggs were retained and hatched at the station, where the young salmon were fed until they were three or four inches in length before being planted in the river. A half million of the eggs taken were silver salmon and steelhead trout. All of the silver salmon were planted in Rogue river, as were also about one-half of the steelheads. The other half were shipped to various points in the east, one shipment being made to Tuxedo Park, the famous resort near New York city. Another year's work will begin at the hatchery this month.

The state department has received the amount of the American indemnity for the claims against Turkey, \$95,000, through the American legation at Constantinople. The money was paid by the Turkish government to Mr. Leishman, our minister at Constantinople, and was by him placed in the Ottoman Imperial bank and drafts remitted for the amount. These drafts have just reached Washington. As is always the case, the claims in the aggregate considerably exceed the amount of the indemnity actually paid, but our government has expressed itself satisfied with the payment. It assumes full responsibility for the distribution, the Turkish government paying down a lump sum of \$95,000 and leaving it to the state department to distribute it among the claimants at its discretion and after its own fashion. It is stated that as soon as the department officials can prepare their list they will communicate directly with the claimants.

Money Uselessly Spent.

There is not much question in the minds of a great many people that the action of the government in so assiduously protecting the forest reserves from fire is a case of misapplied philanthropy. The present method is only laying up a store of dead underbrush that will get on fire some of these summer days and there will be no putting it out. The largest trees will be burned, and the hoarding of timber will all be a loss, while if the mountain ranges were burned every year or two, this danger would be averted and there would be plenty of young trees that would escape from the effects of the light fires to keep up the stock of timber. Mountain ranges that were once a paradise for stock are now overgrown with a tangle of underbrush, which is of no value whatever, to man or beast. Had the forest rangers time been employed in intelligently directing forest fires during the years they have been extinguishing every little blaze that has started, they would have been of infinitely more value to the state than they are now, working under a method that is simply laying fire traps for the future.—Grant's Pass Observer.

Astoria, Oregon, July 11.—Judge McBride, of the circuit court, has handed down some decisions in connection with tax matters that are of especial interest to every county in the state. They were in the case of C. W. Shiveley vs. Clatsop county, a suit brought to set aside the tax on certain property on the grounds that it had been erroneously assessed. Several days ago the case was decided in favor of the defendant, the court holding that the county was not responsible for an alleged error of the assessor, but later a re-hearing was granted on certain points. Among the questions brought up at the re-hearing was the constitutionality of the act under which the special tax levy for the construction of the Young's Bay bridge was made, and whether the warrants drawn in payment for the construction of this bridge must and should be considered in the county's indebtedness as fixed by law. The court held that the act under which the levy was made was constitutional and that the limit of indebtedness did not apply to the warrant drawn on this special fund. The judge, however, modified his former decree in the case at issue by ruling that the 3 per cent. penalty, which the county has been collecting on delinquent taxes and the \$1.50 heretofore charged for levying, were illegal and could not be collected.

Textbook Trust Broken.

Salem, July 10.—The result of the textbooks' adoptions at the hands of the new Oregon Textbook Commission is a complete knockout for the old contractors, the American Book Co., and their manager said today that he had expected nothing else, and would make no further contest, but to stay and see the corpse decently buried.

The other publishers who get little or nothing say that the commission has made a record in disposing of business that is of national importance, and the effect will be far-reaching to the school book publishing business of the entire United States. The contention of the American Book Co. that the adoptions should all be from one house had the effect of concentrating more business in the hands of Ginn & Co., Boston, than they were expecting, and more than the commission had intended to give to any one firm. But the array of facts and figures presented by Capt. Edwards and Mr. Green acted as a boomerang so far as the house they represented was concerned.

All the publisher's agents agree in saying that there was never a commission organized that was of higher character and greater ability in its personal composition than the present Oregon textbook commission.

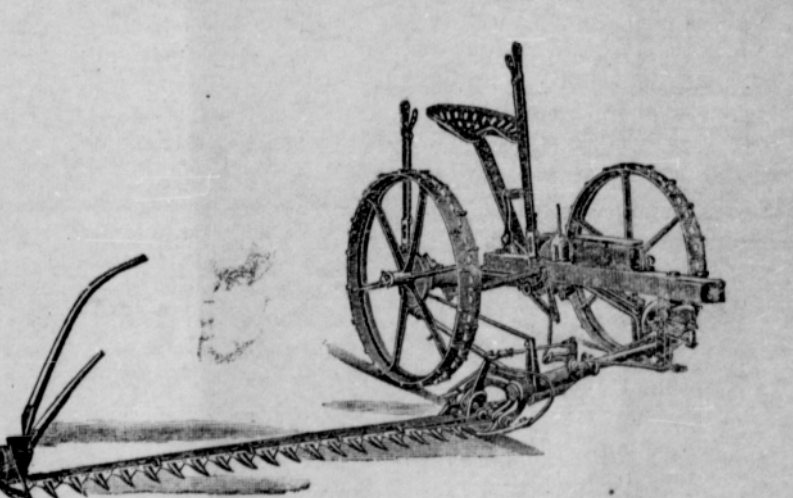

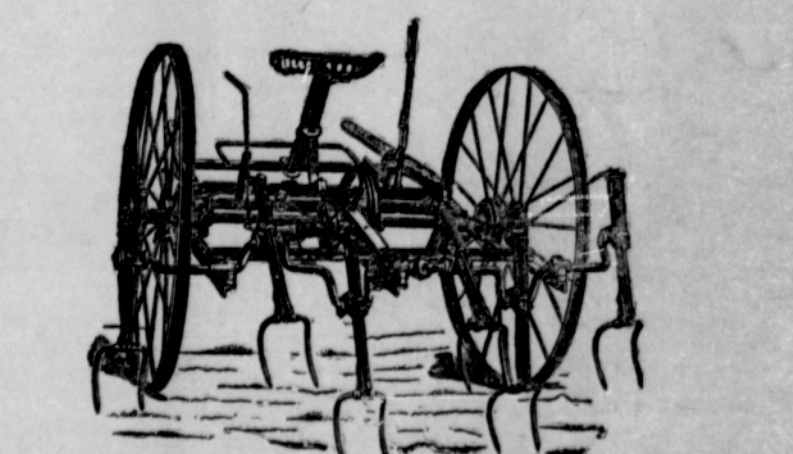
