**Lieu Land Law Bad.**  
Washington, July 26.—In a letter to the Secretary of the Interior today, the Commissioner of the General Land Office says that he will recommend the creation of no more forest reservations until the law governing lieu land selections has been materially amended so as to provide that lands taken in lieu of tracts within reserves so selected shall be of the same area and approximately of the same value as the relinquished tracts. This action grew out of the proposed reserve for Southwestern Oregon, in which case the Commissioner declined to make any recommendation whatever. The Secretary entertains similar views on this general proposition. There is therefore, little probability that any more reserves will be created until Congress acts. This means that not only will this Southwest Oregon reserve be held up indefinitely, but the suggested reserve in the Blue Mountains and many others in Western States as well. The Secretary today endorsed the action of the Commissioner, saying applications were pending for the creation of reserves aggregating 40,000,000 acres in August, which under the present law he would not undertake.

**Southern Oregon Reserve.**  
If Commissioner Binger Hermann shall be the means of blocking that proposed forest reserve scheme in Southern Oregon, he will do not only that particular region, and not only Oregon, but the whole country a very valuable service. The matter is not in his hands for final determination; he can only report and recommend; but his official opinion, given due publicity, may serve to give the department pause, and make it wary of carrying out so nefarious a scheme. Forest reserves, in proper places and within reasonable limits, are good and necessary things; but in some instances they have been shamefully overdone, in the interest of corporations, speculators, grafters and sooner, and to the detriment of tens of thousands of innocent, industrious people of small means. It is doubtful if there is much need of a big forest reserve in Southern Oregon at all, but if one is created, it should certainly not be done until the raspy lieu-land law is repealed or radically changed.—Telegram.

Astoria, July 30.—Fishermen and packers, who expected a falling off in the supply of salmon, have been disappointed, for the present record-breaking run increases every day. In past years there have been great runs for a few days, but never before has such a run been reported in the Columbia. Gill-netters drift for half an hour and catch more fish than the canneries will take from them, while the seines and traps are actually giving away under the weight of the salmon caught. It is an unprecedented situation, and will live in the history of the salmon industry as a remarkable one.  
Dr. Koch's claim that tuberculosis in animals cannot be communicated to human beings would be more convincing if it were not so vigorously opposed by other eminent scientists in all parts of the world.

Secretary Long has issued an order, which should have been issued long ago, forbidding officers of the Navy to publicly discuss and express opinion upon the Sampson-Schley matter.

**The Proposed Forest Reserve.**  
Through the Oregonian's Washington correspondent it is learned that the proposed forest reserve, embracing parts of Douglas, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties, has been before the department for two or three years, and was originally suggested and urged by E. Bender formerly of Myrtle Point, but who has for some time been connected with the land department. The original recommendation was for about a dozen townships in Southwestern Oregon. The correspondent further says: On general principles, there is a strong probability that the Secretary of the Interior will not take up the establishment of this reserve unless he is forced to do so by members of the Oregon delegation or by representative bodies of citizens of Oregon, who have no personal interests at stake. Just now the Secretary is aiming to reduce reserves—that is, eliminate therefrom lands which were improperly included in the beginning, and does not care to take up the question of enlarging reserves or creating new ones unless he is absolutely compelled to do so. In the case of the Olympic reduction, the Secretary was compelled to act.

In the present instance, it is the opinion of The Oregonian correspondent that the original recommendations for the establishment of this reserve were made in good faith, namely, the recommendations of Special Agent Bender and the Director of the Geological Survey. Whether or not other parties have become interested and are urging the establishment of this reserve for the advancement of their personal interests cannot be stated, for Commissioner Hermann says the records in this case are not public property and cannot be disclosed. Without consulting his files, he says no other recommendations have been made, but will not give out the letters and papers that are on record. The letter of Director Walcott was procured at the Geological Survey, where the matter is not treated with secrecy. Certain it is that Commissioner Hermann, while he evidently would like to see a reserve created, dares not take the responsibility of recommending its establishment. The Director of the Geological Survey cannot act further, looking to a more thorough examination, until ordered by the Secretary, and it is safe to say that Secretary Hitchcock will block the game by refusing to order such an examination, unless, as stated above, he is forced to act.

Canton, China, Aug. 1.—Violent anti-foreign placards emanating from the Boxers have been posted in the vicinity of the Christian churches. The placards protest against the imposition of the house tax, saying it is only exacted in order to meet the indemnity to be paid to the powers, and proceeds: "If money can be obtained, why not make war on the foreigners? China is not yet defeated. It is only the government's eyes which are blinded by disloyal ministers. If we refuse to fight, then it is a case of being greedy to live, yet fearing death. How can the carefully studied military arts be used except against foreigners? How can we otherwise employ our regiments? During 1501 much money will be collected through lotteries, gambling and general taxes. But they were not satisfied. Therefore, should the house tax be collected we will demolish the chapel and drive out the Christians. If the Emperor is unable to pay, we, Boxers, have an excellent plan to gain a victory over the foreigners. Unless this policy is adopted a great rebellion is certain."

**The Impending Struggle.**  
San Francisco, Cal., July 29, 1901.  
EDITOR TRIBUNE:—Just now the signs appear written upon the wall indicating a struggle on the chess-board of human existence that is without a parallel in the history of the United States or the world. Labor and capital are drawing the line. How will the fight terminate, and what will be the consequences? The layman in the world of thought would be presumptuous were he to predict a result, yet there is no one to gainsay that the beginning is not auspicious for a peaceful ending. In the light of the present situation, when trusts are being formed for the centralization of labor, who is there, away from the constitution of the land, to care for the consequences, and what, in the meantime, if lives are lost and property destroyed? Is it too early to contemplate these things? And where are the master minds to prevent such a result? The daily history of occurrences in San Francisco show an aggression that is at variance with the laws. In this land of freedom, where the power of the people is invincible, and liberty of thought and action is made sacred by that same power, there should not be an overt act of any kind. It is the manifest duty of the leaders on both sides to guard against injury to person or property, and it is as well their duty to right wrongs, not by unrighteous force, but by the might and power of political action. The seat of all law is in the people; if it is wrong, yet until it is revoked it must be obeyed. If the majority of the people desire a socialism not to be reached under the present constitution of the land, they can by their voices and votes, and energy and determination, obtain those things that will restrict the impositions of capital, and give to labor a better consideration than it now gets. It will take time, perhaps a long time, but no matter how long, it is better to go right than to go wrong.

In the meantime the incipient struggles which portend greater ones are useful if from them the people are educated to know their rights, and knowing them, to maintain them. The world is growing greater, the genius of invention is filling the earth and the heavens with new forces; it would be singular indeed if a constitution that was competent for the wants of the people one hundred years ago would be equally so in this day of new ideas and advanced civilization. Perhaps it is, but it is not in the constitution and to the constitution that the people should look for guidance, and if the constitution is wrong the people have the power to right it.
