New York, Aug.—A dispatch to the Journal and Advertiser from Paris says:

Germany certainly, and probably France also, are striving to upset the Monroe doctrine by trying to purchase Cayo Romano and Cayo Cruz, two of the islands of the Greater Antilles, just off the northern coast of Cuba. Both islands are very fruitful. They are the property of Prudencio Ebansey Gaya, a rich Spaniard living here. Neither country seeks to buy the islands directly. Germany seeks to gain control through a German syndicate, the chief of which is Baron Adolf Oppenheim, of Paris. Cayo Romano is the third largest Spanish island of the Greater Antilles, and both islands being near to the United States coast, would give foreigners power through a commanding position. The French Jesuits, who are compelled to leave France, are bidding for the islands. The French Government prefers that the Jesuits get them rather than the German syndicate, because, notwithstanding the practical expulsion of the former Frenchmen, their interests in the islands could be arranged in exchange for other concessions. Ambassador Porter, though not in Paris, has cabled the State Department concerning the purchase. It is understood that he believes France is satisfied with Martinique, but that Germany is working tooth and nail to get control of the islands.

The following questions were propounded to the Oregonian, and the answers given are from that Journal:

Will you kindly inform me through the Oregonian if a marriage is legal which occurs in Oregon six months after a divorce has been granted to one of the parties concerned?

Second—Is a marriage legal which occurs in another state a few days before the expiration of six months after a divorce has been granted in Oregon?

First—Yes, six months is the statutory time after which marriage is legal, unless an appeal from the divorce proceedings is pending and undecided.

Second—This is a question that would have to be settled by the courts. The general principle of law is that contracts which are legal in one state are legal in another. There is another principle of law, however, directly in conflict, to the effect that when persons leave one state to avoid the effects of its laws, their actions, even if legal in other states, are not recognized as legal in the one whose laws are indirectly transgressed. If parties, one or both of whom were divorced in Oregon, remarried in another state before the expiration of six months, and then returned to Oregon, it is certain that the marriage is not valid in Oregon, as it is contrary to the statutes. Such a case has not been decided in Oregon, but the opinion of legal talent is to the effect that the courts would undoubtedly hold to this view of the case.

The Teachers' Annual Institute.

The Annual Institute of Curry County was called to order at 9 o'clock A. M. at the school house in Port Orford by Supt. Guerin.

The following teachers were reported present: Misses Pearl Walker, Letta Cooper, Helen Cope, Camilla Lorentzen, Dora Taggart, Messrs Hardy Stewart, A. G. Thrift, Guy Merriman, W. R. Gardner, Ames S. Johnston, J. S. Capps.

Absent: Misses Clara Merriman, Maud Walker.

After the song "America" by the choir, Supt. Guerin began his address and said that, though few in number yet we are here for a common good and that each should devote his individual attention to all discussions that tend to increase our knowledge of a teacher's duty, and should take part in all discussions to make our gathering both instructive and interesting. We must not think that because we are teaching in the rural districts that we have but little responsibility, for, from the rural districts in times past and to the present day came and come the minds which have been and will be the potent factors in the world's history. Therefore it is our duty to do our utmost to start the child aright, that he cannot look back in the years to come and lay the blame at the early teacher's negligence.

The subject of Mental Arithmetic was taken up and Miss Cope introduced the subject by a carefully prepared paper. Proceed from the known to the unknown and be not discouraged if the result is not easily attained.

Give a lesson in length according to the time allowed and mental capacity of the students.

Much time can be gained by allowing the pupil to retain the book during a recitation.

Mental work is necessary to Written Arithmetic and is also a help in Grammar.

Mr. Stewart also entertained the teachers with a paper urging the necessity of mental arithmetical training.

The objects are first concrete and do not need a text book.

Question the pupils in regard to different principles. Make the analysis as simple and clear as possible. When possible do away with Rules and appeal to reason for your solution.

Mr. Guerin maintained that as soon as the scholar enters school Mental work in a simple form should be taken up.

Mr. Thrift believes in giving full solution and paying attention to language. Illustrate your examples by diagram on blackboard as much as practicable.

Mr. Merriman believes Mental Work to be a necessity in the Written work.

After a song, Reading was taken up.

Mr. Thrift favored the word method as a beginning and combine it with the phonic at a later period.

The afternoon session was called at 1:30 by the Supt. After a song the subject of Reading was again taken up. Supt. Guerin claimed that we are teaching reading in reality the same as Aristotle Plato and the old instructors taught it.

Teachers should be careful not to crowd the pupil too rapidly to advancement, lest damage rather than benefit be the result.

Train the child to read with force, give proper inflection and proper emphasis to words.

Parents do not encourage their children enough to educational advantages and the child is too apt to begin school impregnated with the idea that an education is not necessary.

Miss Merriman not being present, the subject of Theory and Practice was taken up by the Institute. Theory being only an opinion as to how certain things are to be done, the discussion of the other studies in reality are an argument upon Theory.

Physiology was next introduced by Prof. Capps in a well prepared paper.

This study is neglected in our public school; that a scholar should be instructed as to the care of his body and his health. The subject could be taken up at an early age. Be sure to inculcate the dangers of liquor and tobacco upon the system. Show them the uselessness of attempting to follow the rules of health if, at the same time they practice those vices which are injurious.

Teachers should instruct their scholars as to necessity of cleanliness and the evil results attained by setting in draught, or upon damp grounds while in a heated condition.

After a song by the choir the subject of English Grammar by Miss Camilla Lorentzen was begun. Grammar has two forms, 1st, the parts into which the language is divided, and 2nd, the combining correctly of these parts.

Letter writing is an important subject to be taken up. The teacher should be correct in the use of language as scholars are great imitators. The diagram system is of some value in showing the relation of words to each other.

Mr. Thrift favored the diagram system.

Grammar is closely related to Orthography and Reading.

School law was taken up by the Supt. who gave such knowledge and explanations in regard to the law which have direct bearing upon the teachers duties.

Adjourned until evening at 7 o'clock.

The Evening session was begun at 7 o'clock by the Supt.

After a song Mr. Hardy Stewart gave a recitation which was very interesting.

Next on the program was a recitation by Miss Letta Cooper.

Mr. Merriman delivered an address upon "Success." No person can secure an education for the purpose of avoiding work, for sluggards are not wanted in this world.

Moral Greatness should be preferable to great riches.

The Supt. then began an address to the Institute.

The teacher must be alive to his work and must be well posted and familiar with the subjects to be taught.

Adjourned till 9 o'clock Tuesday, Tuesday Aug. 13.

The Institute was called to order at nine o'clock by Supt. Guerin.

After a song by the choir Mr. Thrift was called to introduce the subject of History. Take History as a reading lesson in the 7th and 8th grades.

The outlines of the lesson should be written upon the blackboard.

The Supt. discussed history and geography together since they are analogous.

After a short recess the subject of history was again taken up.

Mr. Merriman favors a more thorough study of Physical Geography and more time should be devoted to its study.

Civil Government was then taken up and Mr. Johnston read a paper upon the subject.

Mr. Thrift's idea is to teach the subject with history. Considerable discussion was indulged in by the members of the Institute upon it.

Simple talks by the teacher to the school upon the different branches of our government and how they are divided and controlled is beneficial.

Adjourned until 1:30 P. M.

The Institute was called to order at 1:30 by the Supt. After a song by the choir the subject of Arithmetic was taken up and introduced by Mr. Guy Merriman.

Best to teach the characters with objects. Use concrete forms and avoid the abstract.

Mr. Thrift believes in explaining the process by diagram as near as possible and deduct the rule. Mr. Guerin then discussed the subject. Arithmetic is the science of figures and at an early period there was a time when figures were unknown.

We should thoroughly drill the scholar on the fundamental principles. A facility for accuracy and dispatch in figures is the best means for securing a successful position in life. The subject was continued after a short recess during which very instructive methods in handling fractions were given.

Next on the program came Orthography by Miss Pearl Walker.

"Method kills while Spirit keeps alive," is a true saying in regard to spelling. All work in every branch should embrace a spelling lesson.

"Variety is the Spice of Life." This is a favorite maxim in regard to spelling and a variety of changes should be employed in the school room.

The time allowed by the state course of study is entirely to limited.

The Supt. explained why words differed in their endings, such as "cious," "tious" etc by showing their Latin or Greek origin.

After a very pretty solo by Miss Camilla Lorentzen the session adjourned until 7 o'clock P. M.

The Institute was called to order at 7:30. After a short address by the Supt. the following program was carried out.

Song by the choir. Recitation, Miss Camilla Lorentzen. Recitation, Miss Carrie Guerin. Solo, Ames S. Johnston. Character Song, Miss Verna Champlin. Recitation, Miss Letta Cooper. Solo, Mrs. E. Jensen. Address, Miss Rose Long. Recitation, F. C. Champlin. Recitation, Miss Anna Dean. Select Reading, Supt. Guerin. Recitation, Miss Dora Taggart. All of which won hearty applause from the audience.

Adjourned until Wed. Eve. Wed. Eve. Aug. 14 1901.

The evening session was called to order at 7:30 P. M. by the Supt.

After a short address by Mr. Guerin the following program was carried out.

Song by the choir. Prayer, Rev. Gillespie. Address, J. S. Capps. Recitation, Miss Helen Cope. Recitation, Miss Taggart. Solo, Ames Johnston. Recitation, Miss Rosea Neygren. Recitation, Miss Carrie Guerin. Song, Star Spangled Banner. Recitation, Guy Merriman. Chinese Song, Rev. Holt. Recitation, Miss Mary Bossen. French Song, W. S. Guerin. Recitation, Mr. Champlin. Select Reading, W. S. Guerin. Solo, "The Holy City," Mrs. E. Jensen. The last two features of which were illustrated by stereoptical views and deserved the well merited applause which they received. Each feature of the evening's entertainment received the most hearty approval of the audience and taken as a whole it proved a fitting and an enjoyable close to the Institute of 1901.
