Rev. W. S. Holt, Presbyterian minister, of Portland, preached a very interesting sermon last Sunday to one of the largest congregations ever assembled in the Church in Port Orford. In the evening he delivered a lecture on the subject of China and the Chinese, and the causes which led up to the recent disturbances in the Flowery Kingdom. Mr. Holt was for many years a Missionary in China, is familiar with the Chinese character, and thoroughly versed in the language. He is a fluent and entertaining talker, and he was listened to with marked attention by a crowded audience of interested listeners.
The effects of the strike in the city is beginning to be seriously felt throughout this county. Creameries that have been shipping their butter in boxes are forced to pack and hold the same, and there is a large amount of wool and other produce held up for want of transportation. Mills and other work is shutting down, owing to shortage of supplies. But the most serious thing about the strike at present is that it is about to strike our stomachs. There is complaint all along the coast of a shortage of the necessities of life, such as flour, sugar, lard, etc. We are all right in Port Orford up to date, there still being a fair supply of tobacco. The TRIBUNE has a standing order for white paper in the city to be forwarded at first opportunity, and although we have a few weeks supply on hand, we will be forced to begin the publication of a half sheet unless we receive assurance that the paper will arrive in the near future.

Communicated.
EDITOR TRIBUNE:—I see in the last TRIBUNE a call for a few county warrants to be redeemed. To my knowledge it is the first time the amount of a warrant called in has been published. It is an improvement that gives the people a chance to look a little closer into the system of managing our county affairs. These warrants when coming back to the treasury, call for ten years interest at 8 per cent, which will amount to something like \$964.76 above their face value. From this any that have time and interest in our county business can find out what can be the debt on the county in ten years if it is so that it already amounts to between fifty and sixty thousand.
But that is not all, as I understand every bill against the county is paid in warrants, or a note on the county, and that means the same as lengthening and increasing the debt, and so it will have to be until all bills are paid in cash. If that can be adopted then the debt on the county will not be augmented by new debts, but interest on the old debt, only. But this it is that makes the business so complicated, and hard for those who deal with it. It is so many warrants given out every year. Part of them come back as taxes and part do not. But if all taxes were paid in cash, as well as school and state taxes then the warrant and renewed debt would end also. Then there would be some hope for the county to revive, but not under the rule as it is now. How can we think of paying our county debt so long as we are increasing the same almost every day? Ten years ago there were a few bills against the county amounting to \$1245.56 which were not paid, and notes on the county were given, and now they come back with fine feathers to the holders, that is not much short of \$1000. If the bills had been paid in due time there would have been so much saving to the county, not to speak of the vain work of the county officers in searching the records to find the interest for every quarter in the year, and cannot come to a sure point of it.
NOTE—Mr. Hanseth is in error in concluding that the treasurer's last call for county warrants was the first time the amount of each warrant was ever given. During the six years service of the editor of this paper as treasurer he always published date of issue, to whom issued and amount of each warrant, and it was at his suggestion that the present treasurer adopted that policy.
On Tuesday last while working on the catamaran at the Lake Earl Mill, the lever reversed and struck I. B. Edgerton Jr., on the head. Mr. Edgerton was carried to his home near the mill and medical aid was summoned. He recovered consciousness in about two hours and on Wednesday was much better. The blood that had been oozing from his ear stopped and he continued to improve till Thursday forenoon when he complained of a pain in his temple. He began to writhe with the pain and the blood again started from his ears. At twelve o'clock he was unconscious and he gradually grew worse until six o'clock in the afternoon when the breath of life departed and his spirit took its flight to its God.—Del Norte Record.

Coast Mail: It is learned from a source of unimpeachable reliability that the late visit here of Mr. Samuels, representing Spreckles & Co., will have results big with importance to Coos Bay.
The plans of Spreckles & Co., which have been fully decided upon, and which are only temporarily interfered with by the strike, include the placing of two large steamers to run between here and San Francisco and the operation of the Beaver Hill mine on a scale not before attempted.
The Czarina is now making her last trip to the sound and will be placed on the run at once. As soon as the strike situation improves sufficiently the keel will be laid in the Marshall yard for the finest steamer ever on this run, for the Spreckles. She will be of large size, splendidly fitted up for passenger accommodations, and will have a speed of 17 knots an hour.
These steamers and perhaps others, will carry coal from the Beaver Hill mine, which will be worked up to a production of about 500 tons per day.
The fact that the Spreckles, are turning their energies in this direction to the extent indicated means a great deal more for Coos than appears on the surface, and the next year will show changes of great importance.

Mrs. Harry Renstrom is preparing to make trouble for the great American steel trust, says a Tacoma dispatch to the Seattle Times. This comes in the way of the discovery of one of the lost arts, the process of hardening copper, which has been the stalking ghost of the steel industry for a hundred years. Mrs. Renstrom is no theorist or dreamer, but a clearheaded, practical woman, who has quietly worked away until now she has produced edged tools of copper that will cut the hardest of wood and hold their edge as well as the best steel. She feels confident that she solved the problem of hardening copper and thus making edged tools that will drive the steel article out of the market. She has already through an attorney made application to the department at Washington for a patent to protect her rights and will carefully guard her secret until that is gained. Overtures have been made to her from a number of capitalists, among them being J. Piermont Morgan, negotiating for the purchase of the invention when completed.

San Francisco, Aug. 17.—Twenty-nine deep-water ships, all chartered to carry grain out of this port for European markets, are tied up in the harbor unable to take in their cargoes because of the strike. These vessels aggregate 54,746 registered tons displacement, and they have a carrying capacity of about 100,000 tons of grain. Besides this fleet of chartered grain ships, there are four other grain-carrying vessels in the harbor with an aggregate tonnage of 8429 tons, that have not accepted charters. Four other vessels are chartered to carry away cargoes of California products but they cannot get away for want of men to load them. In addition to the grain fleet there are 15 vessels under charter to sail for Hawaiian Island ports and return with sugar cargoes.
