Admiral Sampson will be retired by age limit, Feb. 9, 1902.

Mr. Roosevelt not only has the distinction of being the youngest President, but he has a larger family of children than any former President.

Richard W. Montague, of Portland has been appointed secretary of the Democratic State Central Committee, by Chairman Samuel White of Baker City.

The Chicago anarchists who were held on a charge of conspiracy to murder President McKinley, have been discharged, there being no evidence against them.

One of the appointments which may be made by the new President in the near future is that of Dr. Rixey, President and Mrs. McKinley's physician, to the post of surgeon-general of the Navy Department, a position now held by Dr. Van Ryepp. Mr. McKinley had planned to make this appointment, and his successor will carry out his wishes in this and several other matters.

In an address at Lincoln, Neb., on occasion of the late President McKinley's funeral, Mr. W. J. Bryan said: "Let us hope that this nation, in a common sorrow, will result in a broader charity and a more liberal spirit among those who, by different policies and through different parties, seek to promote the welfare and increase the glory of our common country."

Richmond Dispatch: It is the greatest glory of this country that all political and sectional strife and discord can be so buried and temporarily obliterated by a great National calamity. It is but natural that those who by political affiliation and geographical location are most closely allied to the dead President should unite in reverential tributes to the man; it is little short of remarkable that those who come from a different geographical subdivision of the country and are unalterably opposed to the policies of the party with which the late Chief Magistrate was allied should with equal reverence unite in the universal mourning.

A matter in which President Roosevelt is thoroughly in accord with the policy of the late President is in the effort to wipe out sectional lines. He told two or three prominent Southern Congressmen the other day that he intended to be President of the whole country and not of any particular section of it. Among other things he said that during the Spanish-American war he had the chance to recommend four men for promotion, and three of the men whom he chose were Southerners. A little more of this sort of talk will increase the balance of the atmosphere which makes old stagers in politics declare that there has been a return of the "era of good feeling."

A father of nine children, residing down the Suslaw, who has been and is still in the valley picking hops, thus denouncing the change of school books law passed by the last legislature. He said: "Yesterday my family picked hops all afternoon in the rain—and what for? Merely to buy school books at \$25 to \$30 to fill the pockets of a millionaire book concern. Daly and Scott ought to be ashamed of their robbing law. My family will either have to do without the necessities of life this winter or else they will be compelled to remain out of school." This man states the case fairly and clearly.—Eugene Guard.

Two Noteworthy Tributes.
Henry Waterson in the Louisville Courier-Journal:
The notion that he was not his own master, and the master of all about him, was singularly at fault. Nothing could the better prove this than his fidelity to his friends. It is the weak man who kicks away the ladder when he has climbed to the top. McKinley showed him self grateful to every round of the ladder. In his heart he feared no man's rivalry, not even the accusation and appearance of a division of power. He knew as few men have known how to say "No," as if conferring a favor and to send the suitor away at least half satisfied. Critics seeking to deny him the higher virtues of statesmanship called him a clever politician. And so he was. But was it only clever politics that was able to hold the Government well in hand and keep it out of a premature declaration of war until the moral basis of that war should be clearly laid and the people be thoroughly united? Was it only clever politics to pilot the ship of state through the breakers which succeed all wars and to bring her back into port intact and with so little strain that thus far we can scarce see any sign of danger, or even of stress of weather?

What may betide, what may be hid in the womb of the future, we know not. We can only judge the sailing as far as we have gone. The elements may thicken and grow dark. The skies may be overcast. Perils may gather on every hand. But the sailing has been too smooth over seas that were so strange for anybody to deny the actual statesmanship, however he may dispute the doctrinal statesmanship of William McKinley.

Ex-President Cleveland, at Princeton:
The man who is universally mourned today achieved the highest distinction which his country can confer on any man; and he lived a useful life. He was not deficient in education, but with all you can hear of his grand career and his services to his country and his fellow men, he reached or what he accomplished was due entirely to his education. You will instead constantly hear as accounting for his great success that he was obedient and affectionate as a son, honest and upright as a citizen, tender and devoted as a husband, and truthful, generous, unselfish, moral and clean in every relation of life.

He never thought any of those things too weak for his manliness. Make no mistake. Here was a most distinguished man—a great man—a useful man—who became distinguished, great and useful because he had and retained unimpaired qualities of heart which I fear university students sometimes feel like keeping in the background or abandoning.

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—Agitation has begun for the re-enactment of the Geary Chinese exclusion act, which expires during the next session of congress. The local board of supervisors are considering the gravity of the emergency and adopted resolutions calling for a convention of the various bodies and organizations interested in the matter to take action and to memorialize congress for a re-enactment of the act.

London, Sept. 24.—The Daily Telegraph publishes the following from its Copenhagen correspondent:
"The anarchist question was discussed by Count Lamsdorff and Count von Bulow at Dantzig and by M. Delcasse and Count Lamsdorff in France. They agreed that the anarchist press must be suppressed and that concerted action must be taken by all civilized countries."

New York, Sept. 25.—The World says: Spain is at present placing extensive contracts for railroad material and machinery in the United States. Close to 1000 cars have been ordered from an American car and foundry company, which are to be used by the Compañia del Norte, the principal Spanish trunk line, and the Bilbao-Santander Railroad. The government gun factory at Trubia is to be equipped largely with Yankee machines, tools, etc. Large electrical orders are also being placed in this country.

New York, Sept. 24.—William C. Champ, private secretary of Mr. Zeigler, who reached New York on the steamship Cymric, brings an account of the first stage of the Baldwin Zeigler polar expedition. Mr. Champ accompanied Mr. Baldwin in charge of the supply ship as far as Franz Josef Land to assist in establishing the headquarters of the expedition there. Everything was more favorable for the dash to the pole than Mr. Baldwin had dared to expect, Mr. Champ said. The America had difficulty with ice before reaching that point, and was delayed ten days. Fog and heavy weather were also encountered. Mr. Baldwin has taken 420 dogs for the dash. Some of them are expected to serve as food for the men, as well as for the other dogs.

Courthouse, Buffalo, Sept. 24.—The jury, at 4:26, found Czolgosz guilty of murder in the first degree. Judge White said previously that he would not pass sentence today. The law allows him two days to do so.

Buffalo, Sept. 25.—Czolgosz was sentenced to be electrocuted in the week beginning October 28, 1901. According to the law of this state, October 28 is the earliest date that could be fixed for the execution.

Washington, Sept. 14.—A special issue of stamps commemorative of the life of President McKinley is under contemplation at the Post-office Department.

New York, Sept. 26.—A dispatch to the Herald from London says: It is reported on most excellent authority that all the details in connection with the creation of the Duke of Cornwall and York as Prince of Wales are completed and that the dignity will be conferred immediately on his return.

Washington, Sept. 24.—Judge Wilson, senior counsel for Admiral Schley in the court of inquiry in session in this city, died suddenly at 11 o'clock a. m. today. The inquiry is suspended on account of this tragic occurrence.

San Francisco, Sept. 24.—Though not admitted by the unions, the action of the police in arresting all union pickets along the waterfront, followed by Mayor Phelan's interference, has practically broken up the teamsters' and water front strike. The men are gradually returning to their old places.

The machinists are still holding firm and two small foundries this morning conceded the nine hour day to their employees. It is now believed that only a few days will suffice to see the end of the strike, with the strikers in the main defeated.

Cleveland, Sept. 26.—"President Roosevelt is a different man than he was a few weeks ago," said Senator Hanna to a reporter. "He has always been honest in purpose, strong in action and true to his own and to republican principles. The have been so suddenly thrust upon his shoulders have given him equanimity and conservatism. These responsibilities have rounded out his character. I believe that he will live up to the expectations of his dearest friends."

Cable to the Philippines.
Albany, N. Y., Sept. 23.—The Commercial Pacific Cable Company, with a capital of \$100,000, was incorporated here today by the following men: John W. Mackay, Clarence H. Mackay, Edward C. Platt, Albert Beck, George G. Ward, Albert B. Chandler and William W. Cook.

Respecting the purpose and the prospects of the new company, Mr. Mackay said today that the Commercial Pacific Cable Company had been organized for the purpose of laying a submarine cable from California to the Philippine Islands by way of Honolulu. The length of the cable will be about 8500 miles, the part to be first laid being from California to the Hawaiian Islands. This portion, Mr. Mackay expects will be in operation within 9 months. The time required for the laying of the remainder of the cable from the Hawaiian Islands to the Philippines will depend upon how quickly the cable can be made, but Mr. Mackay believes the whole cable will be completed within two years from this date.

On August 23, Mr. Mackay made application to the United States Government for landing rights in California, the Hawaiian Islands and the Philippine Islands. The new company, Mr. Mackay announces, is willing to lay the cables on the same terms and conditions at San Francisco, Honolulu and Manila, so far as landing rights are concerned, as were imposed by the United States Government on the cable lines which have been landed on the Atlantic Coast of the United States. The new company does not ask any subsidy or any guarantee, which is Mr. Mackay's reason for believing there will be no trouble on agreeing with the Government on the terms and conditions upon which the cable will be landed.

The new cable, when it reaches the Philippines, will connect at that point with the submarine cable running from the Philippines to Japan, and also the cable running from the Philippines to China. A direct cable route from China and Japan to the United States will thereby be established. At present cablegrams from China to the United States have to be sent by way of Europe. Mr. Mackay said that the present cable rates from the United States to the Philippines, and to China and Japan, would be reduced when the new cable is laid from 30 to 60 per cent.
