Manila is to have trolley cars. American progress certainly follows the flag!

Anarchy is not showing its head very much these days. It is sane enough to know when it is in danger.

More sorrow was expressed over the death of William McKinley than of any other man that ever lived.

It is to be hoped that Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock will continue to be II throughout the international yacht races. We have become greatly attached to the America's cup.

There is manifest a practically unanimous opinion that the laws should be so amended as to make any attempt, though unsuccessful, on the life of a President or Vice President high treason, punishable by death.

Manila dispatches announce that the Filipino leaders continue to surrender and take the oath of allegiance to the American Government. They likewise state that an army of 25,000 will be required in the Philippines for some time to come.

It is interesting to note that Russia, Germany and France are considering measures for dealing with the Sultan of Turkey. But the notoriously sick man of Europe has so persistently eluded the punishment due him that it is feared he will once more escape justice on the plea of continued and serious indisposition.

The people believe that Congress will deal with persons of the Emma Goldman and Herr Most stripe very soon after it convenes for the winter session. While the right of free speech is a sacred legacy from the forefathers, there is not the slightest doubt that the framers of the Constitution, were they living, would be among the first to denounce the vile and criminal harangues of the typical Anarchists. To the criminal the Constitution guarantees only a fair trial, and the penalty having been paid, an opportunity to reform.

The Cubans are slowly preparing to try the experiment of self-government. In a comparatively short time, they will launch their own Ship of State and, from the present outlook, Senor Tomas Estrada Palma will be the grst skipper. Since affairs in the island have been gravitating toward self control, there have been evidences of thoughtlessness, an apparent failure to appreciate the gravity of the step about to be taken. Fortunately the American Government has made haste slowly in completing the emancipation of this youth among nations from the bonds of guardianship. The growing appreciation of the masses in Cuba has to an extent neutralized the influence of the dangerously ambitious. The preparations for the exercise of suffrage and discussions of problems, diplomatic and commercial, are having excellent results.

Wireless telegraphy has proved a great boon during the international yacht races. With the old system, when the boats were hidden by mist or swallowed up in the distance, the newspaper correspondents were practically helpless. The Maerconi system is enabling thousands of eager individuals to secure early and accurate reports of the progress of the rival sloops and the result of their spirited competition.

It is a peculiar coincidence that the final re-interment of Lincoln, the first martyred President, at Springfield, Ill., is being completed at a time when the nation is mourning its third victim of the assassin's bullet.

## The Strike Ended.

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—The teamsters' and longshoremen's strike was settled late yesterday, the employers conceding recognition of the union. The industrial inactivity which has prevailed in this city for so many months on account of the labor troubles has been dispelled, and to day the manufacturing and wholesale districts are assuming their normal condition.

The agreement entered into by the Employer's Association and the strikers late yesterday afternoon will be followed by a general resumption of business throughout the state. Crops will commence to move, the shipping interests will again become active, and the manufacturing will take up the thread of their business where it was broken off at the outset of the strike.

In this city trucks are moving in every direction in ever-increasing number, unaccompanied by the special police guard sworn in to protect the drivers who took the places of strikers. It is expected that before another fortnight has passed the business of the state will have recovered in a great measure from the tieup caused by the strike.

Washington, Sept. 30.—A most unusual case reported to the War Department is that of Private Peter J. Devine, of Troop H, Eleventh Cavalry, who was tried by a general court-martial at Fort Ethan Allen, Vt., on the charge of "using disrespectful words against the President of the United States, in violation of the 14th article of war." It appears from the evidence that when the news of the shooting of President McKinley was received at Fort Ethan Allen Devine expressed great satisfaction over the crime, and applied an uncomplimentary epithet to the late President. His comrades handled him roughly before he could be secured in the guardhouse. He was found guilty by the court, and sentenced to be dishonorably discharged from the service of the United States, forfeiting all pay and allowance due him, and to be confined at hard labor for one year. The record of the case having been referred to Major-General Brooke at New York, commanding the Department of the East, he indorsed it and said:

"It is not within the power of the reviewing authority to increase the punishment, but in order that the prisoner may not wholly escape punishment, the sentence is approved, and will be duly executed at Fort Columbus, N. J., to which place the prisoner will be sent under proper guard."

General Brooke's action in the case is final, and the record simply has been sent to the War Department for filing.

Despite threatening proclamations, grim visaged war continues to monopolize the field in South Africa to the exclusion of peaceful pursuits. General Kitchener, apparently, has not been much more successful than Lord Roberts in the effort to re-establish normal conditions, and there are reports in London that the present commander-in-chief will be withdrawn from the field, because of a misunderstanding with the officials of the War Office. Even in conservative circles there is a strong belief that the war with the Boers will only be brought to a conclusion by compromise. Both sides, it would seem, could well afford to yield a few points in order to close a conflict that has caused great pain and suffering.

Havana, Oct. 1.—The constitutional convention has addressed a letter to Governor-General Wood, informing him that the changes which he suggested yesterday have been made, and that the convention, deeming its work completed, is ready to dissolve. General Wood advised the appointment of a committee of five members to have charge of the forthcoming elections, and also advised that two elections be held instead of one.

Additional details received by the War Department indicate that the disaster sustained by the American troops in the Philippines was much worse than at first reported. One company of the Ninth Infantry was almost wiped out. The troops, who occupied a one company post on the Island of Samar, were surprised at breakfast. A force of four hundred bolo men rushed the American camp while the troops were preparing for breakfast. The surprise was complete, and many of the soldiers were butchered in their tents. Captain Connell and the other two commissioned officers, who were reported in the earlier dispatches to have escaped, were among the slain. Only twenty-four men, thirteen of whom were wounded, managed to escape. The insurgents captured the entire equipment with the exception of three rifles. This disaster has come as a sudden shock to the American authorities, as it was thought that the Island of Samar was entirely pacified. The outbreak is entirely attributed to the assassination of President McKinley, which it is claimed the Philippine leaders have distorted and explained as the result of a popular uprising in this country against the Government.

Socialists are now kept busy explaining the difference between socialism and anarchy. They should have the benefit of the doubt; there is a difference. While socialism, in one light, is a primary department for graduates which enter the school of anarchy, in another sense it possesses no relative part of anarchy. Socialism, it must be admitted, has a tendency to make its advocates, as Czolgosz states he became, "morose and envious," and in this frame of mind one is very liable, especially if his brain softens somewhat under the influence of surroundings and deep cogitation, to be converted to a full-fledged anarchist. Then 'tis but a step; otherwise, it is a much longer stride. There are many who believe in socialist ideas as presented by the orators of that party of the present day, but they keep up courage and have faith in gaining their ends. They believe in government—in fact too much government—and only those who are made despondent with their condition in life from pursuing socialist paths are in danger of seeking a state of lawless confusion. Hence we find not a few socialists becoming anarchists, but not vice versa.—Aurora Borealis.

In all probability, the Postoffice department at Washington will throw down the gauntlet to publications of an anarchistic character by excluding them from the mails. If the Postmaster-General can discover no clause in the regulations authorizing such action, he will, it is believed, proceed on general principles and on the ground that those who advocate the destruction of Government have no right to enjoy its privileges. Anarchists who disseminate their teachings in print will by this method be at least driven to making a test case and thus settle an important point. If it shall ultimately develop that there is no law under which the spread of such indefensible doctrine can be stopped, so far as the Post Office is concerned, then it will be high time to enact one—respecting, of course, the rights of decent publications and framing the new statute in such fashion that it will work no hardship to the guiltless.

## Columbia Wins.

New York, Oct. 3.—The fourth trial in the series of international yacht races was made today. The breeze was strong and the sea smooth, making an ideal day for racing. Shamrock II crossed the starting line first, but was closely followed by the Columbia. In the run for the first mark the Columbia decreased the Shamrock's lead, but at the end of ten miles both yachts were going at a terrific speed. At the turn the Shamrock was well ahead, turning the stake boat at 11:50:55. The Columbia followed at 11:52:50.

Toward the second mark the rush was then made, but the positions of the boats were not materially changed, the Shamrock making the turn at 1:00:13, the Columbia at 1:01:47. On the home run the wind continued good and the interest was intense. The boats fairly flew over the last ten miles, the Columbia gradually wiping out the visitor's lead and crossed the finish line several lengths in advance at 2:15:03. The Shamrock finished at 2:16:23, a bare one minute and 20 seconds in the rear, amid the greatest demonstration yet seen in the history of yacht racing.

Another race will be run tomorrow.

New York, Oct. 4.—In the most thrilling race of the series, Shamrock today beat Columbia to the finish mark by two seconds, but lost the race on the time allowance of 43 seconds in Columbia's favor. This allowance is made Columbia on account of the 400 square feet greater spread of canvass which Shamrock carries. The course was a run of 15 miles before the wind, and recame. Shamrock had distinctly the better of it in the first half, beating the cup defender to the mark by very nearly a minute. On the beat home Columbia gained all she lost, and passed the challenger when about half the distance had been covered. From here the race was closely contested, neck and neck, but with Shamrock in the lead most of the time. The boats crossed almost together in a heart-breaking finish, but Shamrock had a little the better of it.

New York, Oct. 2.—The Hudson county, New Jersey, Bar Association at a meeting called to hear the report of its committee appointed to recommend legislation for repression of anarchism, ordered the report referred to a special committee. The first section of the proposed act specifies that "anarchism shall be made a capital felony both as to the principals and accessories, as well before as after the fact. The term anarchism, for the purposes of this section shall be taken to include every act done or word uttered with intent to cause or to incite others to cause the assassination of a President of the United States or any person in the line of succession, the Governor of a state or any person in the gubernatorial succession or the chief of any foreign state or any person in the line of succession thereof."

The second section provides that every person who without intent to cause or to incite others to cause the assassination of the persons referred to in the first section, shall say or do anything with a view of maintaining or promulgating anarchist doctrines shall be guilty of a high misdemeanor.
