Washington, Sept. 30.—Senator Mitchell arrived in Washington this morning, after an extended visit to his family abroad. He called at the White House and paid his respects to the President, but did not discuss any matters of public interest. The Senator will remain in Washington several days to attend to matters of local import that have accumulated in his absence.

In a local interview Senator Mitchell declared his desire that Congress at its approaching session may pass a bill providing for an Isthmian canal. He himself expressed confidence that this will be done.

In various cities small-pox cases have developed recently, but the disease no longer produces the nervous furor it once did. Coos Bay News.
Joe Bledsoe, of Coquille, has purchased two lots and a billiard hall at Myrtle Point.

The present trip of the Arcata is her 469th trip to the bay.

The Enterprise mentions that 25 residences and business houses have been built at Myrtle Point this year and that there is not a vacant house in town.

The cannery has 2,000 cases of chinooks put up, and a few cases of silversides.

The number of pupils attending the Marshfield graded and high school is 322. The number has been steadily increasing since school opened, and by the first of next month it will probably reach 350, which was about the number that attended last term.

Geo. A. Brown, who has charge of the hatchery on South Coos river, reports plenty of chinooks at the rack, and will commence taking eggs on October 10th. If freshets do not interfere, he will easily secure 4,000,000 eggs this season, which is the full amount the hatchery can handle.

EDITOR TRIBUNE:—It's raining. The roads are bad.
Five new residences under construction.

Myrtle Point is on the boom. Real estate is on the advance.

Dr. G. D. Elgin arrived in Myrtle Point last week from his ranch on the Sixes. The Dr. is much improved in health, and will remain in Myrtle Point a few weeks and visit friends.

The Guerin hotel is being completed; the building is a great improvement to the city, and its best hotel building on the coast between San Francisco and Portland.

Mr. Geo. Guerin is an up-to-date hotel man, and has built up a good trade in a short time. Every traveling man is at home when he arrives in Myrtle Point.

Jack Sears has his new home under way, and is planning to build another house on the adjoining lot.

L. W. Deyoe our most prominent merchant is building a handsome residence on K. street.

R. Macleay and H. Withington the capitalists who are prospecting for coal near Eckley arrived in the City Tuesday leaving the next morning for Eckley.

All bottom lands near Myrtle Point, where grows the famous myrtle, has doubled in value during the past three weeks. Myrtle timber is in demand, one company has made a bid for over one million feet.

In the past this timber has been burnt and the land cleared for pasture, but from this on it will be the most valuable land in this section. One mill is now sawing myrtle for the dry docks at Mare Island, Calif.

Direct Legislation.
Regarding the initiative and referendum amendments to be voted upon by the citizens of Oregon next year, the following in relation to its workings will be of interest:

"Large economies will result from direct legislation through the stoppings of jobs, extravagant contracts, corrupt legislation of all sorts, cutting down the powers of bosses and rings, simplifying the law, reducing litigation and diminishing even the expenses of legitimate government. A single illustration under the latter head will show the economical tendencies of the referendum. In New Jersey about every year about 100 newspapers receive about \$1200 apiece for printing the acts of the legislature, a performance which costs the publisher less than one-tenth of what he receives; \$75 cost to each newspaper, over \$1200 cost to the taxpayer. More than \$100,000 out of the pockets of the people every year merely to enable the politicians to keep in the good graces of the paper, for if a paper misbehaves, it is easy to strike it from the list of those that are to get the law-money and not a few papers would die if they did not get this help—a consummation devoutly to be wished, since one-third or even one-tenth of the papers in the state could do the whole work of the press, and do it better and cheaper than it is done now, with a paper to each 1,000 inhabitants in some localities, and four of them (the papers) to publish the laws in a single town of 5,000 people. The shrinkage of state legislation under the referendum and the effective auditing of appropriations will probably save the whole of \$100,000 and a large part of the actual present cost. The state could print for itself the laws enacted each year and send a package to every post-office or news delivery, where they could be had free upon application.

This is only one little item, but it shows the drift. The ruler is apt to arrange things to suit his own interest. When the people really make the laws, they will arrange things for their interests. They will banish unnecessary offices, reduce the salaries of lofty officials, abolish robbery and extravagance, get rid of the iniquitous spoils system cut down the power of corporate wealth, rescind all forfeited franchises and take control of misbehaving monopolies. Economy, justice and purity will go hand in hand. Ring-rule and class-legislation will die, and politicians will lose their power, because they can no longer command rewards for their supporters, no jobs, no fat contracts, no rich franchises. The cost of taking the referendum vote will be very slight; not so much as the saving on many a single contract; not a half of the saving on the one item of printing the laws; not a tenth of the value of many a franchise it will keep from being stolen.—Roseburg Review.
