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Has Appealed to the President.

Washington, Jan. 7.—The object of Admiral Schley's visit to the White House yesterday was to request the President to entertain and consider an appeal for the reversal of the action of Secretary Long and the disapproval of the majority judgment of the court of inquiry. The interview was satisfactory, the President granting the Admiral's request. Messrs. Raynor and Teague will today assist Admiral Schley in the preparation of the appeal.

The interview with the President was arranged in advance, and at its conclusion Admiral Schley left the White House in a satisfied state of mind. He had been given a full opportunity to present the case from his standpoint, and to acquaint the President with many details with which the latter could not have any knowledge. While Admiral Schley would not make any statement regarding the matters discussed, holding that any interview between any naval officer and the Commander-in-Chief should be regarded as confidential, it is understood that he brought to the President's attention many of the alleged injustices and discrepancies of the majority report of the court of inquiry.

Admiral Schley's interview with the President was the result of his determination to exhaust every means in his power to overturn the judgment which has been rendered against him. His new appeal will be different from that submitted to the department, bringing out some new facts which have an important bearing upon the controversy.

Senator Teller is one of those who believe that the Cubans will succeed in maintaining their independence after they get it. He was the author of the amendments to the war resolutions, which officially assured the world that the United States had no desire to assume sovereignty, jurisdiction or control over Cuba, and he still thinks that this government was wise in giving that assurance. Mr. Teller expresses pleasure at a public statement made by President-elect Palma, resending the assertions that his candidacy and election had been secured by the influence and assistance of the United States government and expressing his independence in this plain language: "No one will control me. I am free to act without fear or favor. I have made no pledges for the purpose of gaining office." Senator Teller does not go so far as to say that he does not believe in the ultimate annexation of Cuba, but he is very positive in saying that the first steps toward annexation cannot honorably be taken in the United States, but must come from Cuba. He thinks there will be more or less talk in Congress about commercial reciprocity with Cuba, but that the administration will fail in its efforts to get legislation authorizing it.

M., the 2d day of January, 1902, and days following unto the end of the term, at which were present, Hon. M. Riley, Judge, F. H. Blake, and P. J. Lindberg, Commissioners; C. V. Woodruff, Clerk; James G. Walker, Sheriff.

The following proceedings were had, viz:

In the matter of the county printing and publishing: Now comes on for consideration the application of Walter Sutton, proprietor, editor and publisher of the Port Orford Tribune, published weekly at Port Orford, Oregon, and of general circulation throughout the county, and he having filed his application for said printing and publishing, and there being no application for said printing and publishing, and the court being fully advised in the premises; It is ordered by the court that said Port Orford Tribune be, and the same is hereby selected as the official newspaper of this county for the year ending December 31, 1902.
