OFFICIAL REPORTS

of the Proceedings of the County Court. January Term, 1902.

Be it remembered, that at a regular term of the county court of the State of Oregon, in and for the county of Curry, sitting for the transaction of county business, at the court house in the town of Gold Beach, Thursday, at 10 o'clock A. M., the 21 day of January, 1902, and days following until the end of the term, at which were present, Hon. M. Riley, Judge, F. H. Blake, and P. J. Lindberg, Commissioners; C. V. Woodruff, Clerk; James G. Walker, Sheriff.

The following proceedings were had, viz: In the matter of the county printing and publishing: Now comes on for consideration the application of Walter Sutton, proprietor, editor and publisher of the Port Orford Tribune, published weekly at Port Orford, Oregon, and of general circulation throughout the county, and he having filed his application for said printing and publishing, and there being no application for said printing and publishing, and the court being fully advised in the premises; It is ordered by the court that said Port Orford Tribune be, and the same is hereby selected as the official newspaper of this county for the year ending December 31, 1902.

Ordered by the court that the following bills be paid: Walter Sutton, publishing, \$14.70; Walter Sutton, printing, stat. fund, 5.25; Walter Sutton, hauling, for court house, 1.50; C. V. Woodruff, expressage and postage paid on papers in cases of R. D. Hume vs Jesse Turner et al McGraw vs Curry Co, and Mathers vs Divilbiss, stat. fund, 6.65; Jas G. Walker, stamps and stationery, stat. fund, 7.15; C. V. Woodruff, stamps and stationery fund, 5.40; Glass & Prudhomme, pens for clerk's office, 3.00.

Ordered by the court that the bill in the case of State of Oregon vs Ruby Bartol be allowed as follows: Geo B Miller, Justice fees, \$ 8.30; James Miller, constable fees, 11.50; Witness fees: Pearl Clark, 2 days, 5.00; Liddie Hayes, 2 days, 3.00; Frank Miller, 2 days, 3.00; Elvin Miller, 1 day and mileage, 2.30; Jurors: W. T. White, 1 day and mileage, 1.70; G. W. Miller, 1 day and mileage, 1.60; A. E. Hastings, 1 day and mileage, 1.70; Lawrence Miller, 1 day and mile, 1.60; James Powell, 1 day and mileage, 1.70; J. H. Armpriest, 1 day and mile, 1.90.

Ordered by the court that the following named persons be paid the amounts set opposite their respective names for labor in repairing the Euche creek bridge, out of 5 per cent bridge fund: Fred Wakeman, 4 days, \$6.00; Fred Stewart, 4 days, 6.00; George Curry, 1 day, 1.50; Arthur Goodwin, 5 days, 7.00; Frank Miller, 5 days, 7.00; Walter Miller, 1 day, 1.50; James Curry, 1 day with team, 4.50; James Curry, 1 day, 1.50; F. G. Goodwin, 2 days, 3.00; W. W. Miller, 1/2 day with team, 1.50.

In the matter of examining and accepting the reports of road supervisors for the year ending Dec. 31, 1901: The above matter coming on regularly for consideration, and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that the reports of the following named supervisors for said year be, and they are hereby approved; and that they be paid the amounts set opposite their respective names, as follows: T. J. Cook, 13 days, \$26.00; W. E. Burrow, 30 days, 60.00; Frank Miller, 23 days, 46.00; E. B. Sypher, 32 days, 64.00.

Ordered by the court that George Lawrence's bill for bridge timbers and covering furnished road district No. 3, be allowed. Amount, \$27.70. Ordered by the court that D. Cunningham's bill for restoring and recording corners, be allowed. Amt \$7.50. In the matter of granting a Ferry License: Now comes on to be heard the petition of James McCutchen for a license to keep a ferry across Chetco River, between a point on the northerly side of said river, located 300 yards easterly from the Miller House, and a

point on the southerly side of said river located about 100 yards northerly from the Hughes house; and the court being fully advised in the premises, and being satisfied that a ferry is necessary at the point applied for, and proof being furnished that notice as by law required have been posted by said James McCutchen, it is ordered by the court that said license be granted, as prayed for in said petition, and that the term of said license be for the period of fifteen years from the 30th day of June, 1901. License to be issued by the clerk of this court, upon the petitioner, Jas. McCutchen, filing with the county clerk, his bond, as required by law, and the county treasurer's receipt, showing that the fee for said license has been paid; the amount of said license to be set at \$5 per year, payable annually in advance.

It is further ordered that the bond to be furnished by said James McCutchen be placed at \$200, and that the rates of ferrage be as follows: Four horses and wagon, 75; for each additional span, 25; two horses and wagon, 50; saddle horse and rider, 25; one horse rig, cart, buggy or wagon, 35; footman, 15; loose horses and cattle, 10; sheep and swine, 10.

In the matter of a county trail from the Devil's Backbone to the county line at Nine Mile Water: This matter coming on to be heard upon the petition of G. W. Billings and others, being a majority of the freeholders within the road district that said proposed trail intersects, and asks the court to re-establish the county trail described in said petition, which petition is referred to for a more particular description; and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that said petition be accepted and approved, and G. W. Billings, Claud Hall and M. Dorstler be, and they are hereby appointed as viewers, and it is ordered by the court that they meet at Mule creek on Monday, February 3, 1902, and proceed to view out and locate said trail, and make their report in writing to this court on or before the first day of the next regular term of this court.

Whereupon court adjourned for the day. Friday morning, court met at 10 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment. Present, same officers as yesterday. In the matter of selecting a jury list for the year 1902: The court now proceeds to select from the names on the preceding assessment roll of this county, the names of 200 parties having the qualifications of jurors, from which names trial and grand jurors shall be drawn to serve for the year 1902. In the matter of appointing a road supervisor in and for district No. 12: It appearing to the court that Antoine Walker, heretofore elected supervisor of said district has not qualified, and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that F. A. Rath be, and he is hereby appointed road supervisor to fill said vacancy.

In the matter of keeping the county indigent: This matter coming on for consideration upon the representation of Chas VanPelt, and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered by the court that F. H. Blake, county commissioner, be and he is hereby authorized to make all necessary arrangements for boarding and caring for Richard Savage, said indigent. Ordered by the court that C. V. Woodruff, county clerk's statement of warrants issued for scalp bounties, for the period commencing September 16, 1901, and ending January 3, 1902, be, and the same is hereby accepted and approved.

Ordered by the court that the following bills be paid: W. Doyle & Co., sundries for county jail, \$ 3.90; W. A. Root, 2 tiers wood for court house, 2.50. Whereupon court adjourned until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. Saturday morning January 4, court met pursuant to adjournment. Ordered by the court that the following bills be paid: Dr. J. J. Caldwell, to med. attend eyes on D. W. Humphries, indigent, \$12.00; Dr. T. C. Green, attendance on Humphries during illness, 20.00; O. P. Haegson, coffin for Humphries indigent, 10.00; G. H. Harris, 513 feet of bridge planks, dist No. 1, 5.43; R. D. Hume, spikes, etc., road dist No. 3, 5.43; R. D. Hume, same, for dist 6, 2.70; A. H. Crook, blasting powder and fuse, dist 3, 5 per cent fund, 7.59; Geo Lawrence, spikes, dist No. 3, 5 per cent fund, 2.00; Wm Moore, labor with team and without team and for 2400 feet of bridge plank, dist No. 1, 68.00; F. A. Guerin, 26 days services as supervisor, dist No. 1, 52.00; W. S. Guerin, stamps and stationery from July 1, 1901 to Jan. 1, 1902, stationery fund, 16.10.

In the matter of the sheriff's bond as tax collector: Now at this time comes James G. It is ordered by the court that the petition for the reorganization of school district No. 21, of Coos and Curry counties be continued until the next term of this court, for proof of posting notices, as required by law. It is ordered by the court that the North boundary of Port Orford road district No. 7, be changed so as to read as follows: Beginning at the section corner, sections 32 and 33, Tp 31 S, R 15 W, section 4 a 5, Tp 32 S, R 15 W, thence west to corner of section 32 and 31, Tp 31 S, R 15 W, and sections 5 and 6, Tp 32 S, R 15 W; thence north on section line to corner of sections 30, 31, 32 and 29; thence west to the meander corner on ocean beach, in fractional sections 25 and 36, Tp 31 S, R 16 W. And on the south boundary as follows: Beginning at meander corner on ocean beach, corner to fractional sections 19 and 20, thence east along sea line to corner; thence east along sea line to corner of sections 22, 23, 26, and 27, Tp 34 S, R 14 W. Ordered by the court that the clerk of this court enter in the proper column of the assessment roll of Curry county for the year 1901, the amount of delinquent taxes for the year 1900, which appears upon the delinquent roll as not having been collected by the sheriff. It is ordered by the court that the county clerk be authorized to procure copies of Tps 36 and 37, S. R. 14 W. Whereupon court adjourned for the day. Monday morning, January 6, 1902, court met pursuant to adjournment. Present same officers as Saturday. It is ordered by the court that Wm. Burdett's bill of expense for money paid sheriff for land erroneously assessed and brought in at sheriff's delinquent tax sale, be allowed as follows, except \$1.50 paid to Notary for filling out deed. Amount of costs and taxes, \$25.70; sheriff's fees for deed, \$1.00; clerk's fees for recording deed, \$3.50; total \$30.20. It is ordered by the court that the petition of 10 legal voters of road district No. 11, petitioning this court that no change be made in the mail trail up Rogue River and across the mountains to Dothan, or West Fork, be disallowed. In the matter of examining the records of the county clerk: This being the term at which the clerk is required to examine the various county records, the court now proceeds to examine the clerk's records, and finds that all records pertaining to his office are correct and regular, so far as this court has determined.

Whereupon court adjourned for the day. Tuesday morning January 7, court met pursuant to adjournment. Present same officers as yesterday. The court now proceeds to examine the sheriff's books, and the hour of adjournment having arrived, court adjourned until tomorrow morning. Wednesday morning, court met pursuant to adjournment. Present same officers as yesterday. In the matter of examining county records: The court now proceeds to examine the records of the sheriff and treasurer, and finds upon said examination, that said records are correct and kept according to law, so far as this court has determined. Ordered by the court that the following bills be paid: James Caughell, making precinct jury list for 1902, \$3.00; J. Huntley, assisting, same, 2.00; W. H. Caughell, same, 2.00; George B. In the matter of dividing road district No. 13: Now at this time comes for consideration the petition of 7 legal voters of Quosaten road district, petitioning this court to set off in a separate district all that portion of said district lying south of Rogue River, and appoint a supervisor for same. And the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered by the court that said petition be granted, and it is further ordered that said district shall be known as district No. 15, and that Elisha Meservey be, and he is hereby appointed supervisor of said district No. 15. Ordered by the court that the county commissioners be paid per diem, and mileage as follows: F. H. Blake, 6 days, 84 miles, \$32.40; P. J. Lindberg, 6 days, 64 miles, 30.40.
