What seems to be a case of smallpox has broken out on Floras creek. Allen Boice was taken down with the disease last week. So far he is getting along very well.

The editor being quite sick, some matters of local interest are crowded out, including two ads for a grand masquerade ball at Dairyville, Feb. 22. Both ads will appear next week unless otherwise ordered.

Ed. Rackleff, the popular merchant of Dairyville, was in Port Orford Saturday and Sunday. On Saturday evening he installed the Woodmen officers, and on Sunday he was installed as an Elder in the Presbyterian Church.

Port Orford has been reaping some benefit from the Bandon quarantine regulations. All public meetings having been prohibited at that place, Rev. Mr. Gillespie transferred his labors to Port Orford, and has been holding regular services here since the first of the year.

The officers-elect of Port Orford Camp, Woodmen of the World were publicly installed by E. L. Rackleff, of Langlois, last Saturday evening. A dance was given after the installation, and a midnight lunch was served in the hall. There was quite a large attendance, and everything passed off very pleasantly.

The Arcata arrived from the Bay on her down trip Sunday evening, and landed 20 tons of hay for the Corbin mill company, besides a large amount of freight for our merchants and others. She took as passengers from here, two men who arrived at Rogue River on the Copper Queen, two from the Corbin mill, and Miss Belle McKenzie, who will make a protracted visit with her sister, Mrs. Eugene Schuyler, at Lompoc, Calif., who is in poor health.

Dick Richards met with a severe and peculiar accident one day last week, in which he had one of his phrenological bumps greatly enlarged and his nose cut bias. He was cutting wood, and probably dreaming that his name was Jim Jefferies, delivered a knock out blow, which caught him in the face raised a large knot on the forehead, and completely severing a portion of the end of the nose. According to the almanacs, there will be five eclipses this year—three of the sun and two of the moon. Only one will be visible in the United States and that will be a total eclipse of the moon, which will occur on October 16-17. The moon will enter the shadow at 10:17 p. m., the eclipse will be total at 11:19 p. m. and ends at 12:48 a. m.

The disease which has been pronounced a mild form of smallpox, is general throughout Oregon, cases being reported from time to time in almost every county, although in a mild form as to hardly bear a semblance to smallpox. Should it really be smallpox it may be the means of saving the lives of hundreds of people in the future, should a more violent type of the disease become epidemic throughout the country. In its present form it has proven no more serious, in fact not so serious as measles, or chickenpox.

Ross Sutton, of Klamath county, Oregon, a nephew of the editor of the TRIBUNE, arrived last week, for a few weeks visit. Ross was a member of Company B, Oregon Volunteers, who distinguished themselves in the Philippines at the outbreak of the insurrection. Card From Mr. Bartol.

EDITOR TRIBUNE:—I understand there was an item in your paper stating that the court took Ruby Bartol's infant child away from her after the trial, Dec 31, 1901, which is a mistake. She has had the child in her possession before and since. There was nothing said about taking it away. Another thing, they cannot show any reasons why it should be taken away. The child is fat and in good health, as it was at the time. Only weighed 23 lbs. at the time. It was 8 months old Jan. 14, 1902. I cannot find the issue of the TRIBUNE that they say the report was in, so I write this to you so you can rectify the mistake. Yours Respectfully,

FRANK E. BARTOL, Husband of Mrs. Ruby Bartol. The item referred to by Mr. Bartol, appeared in the TRIBUNE of Jan. 6th, and was given as the result of the trial of Mrs. Bartol, in brief and without comment, our information being obtained while at Rogue River, from those who claimed to know the facts, the matter at that time being the general talk of the surrounding country. The item was published as our legitimate right to give the news of the courts, and was published with the belief that it was entirely correct. The item read as follows: "Mrs. Bartol, who resides at Bagnell Ferry, on Rogue River, was last week arrested on a charge of gross neglect of her infant child, aged a few months, and on a hearing before Justice Miller, she was held to appear at the Circuit Court, and the child taken from her." Mr. Bartol's statement being presumed to be true, he and Mrs. Bartol are entitled to an apology from the TRIBUNE. And now the question arises, did not the court make a serious error? If there was sufficient evidence to hold the defendant to the Circuit Court there was certainly sufficient evidence to require the removal of the child. Why find her guilty of neglect and abuse of the child and then give her the opportunity to continue on the same lines. If there was not sufficient evidence to justify the removal of the child from her custody, then it seems to us there could be no just grounds for holding her to the Circuit Court. At any rate, we hope the case is not nearly so bad as has been represented, and that the innocent cause of the disturbance is receiving such treatment as a helpless little babe is entitled to from a kind and affectionate mother.

We recently decided to engage moderately in the business of "local news dealer," and feel greatly elated at our success. Smallpox.

The vinegar treatment as a preventive against contagion of smallpox, discovered and introduced by Dr. C. F. Howe, county health officer, Atchison, Kansas, has passed the point of mere theory, and is now an established fact, having been efficient in several hundred cases of exposure in the city of Atchison and county. Many of these exposures have been the nurses, as well as many others that it was impossible to isolate from the original case of smallpox for the want of room. In other words, anyone, vaccinated or not, can nurse a case of smallpox without fear of contracting the disease if, at the same time, they use the vinegar in tablespoonful doses four times daily in half cup of water. It can be taken in less amounts by children or more by adults.

Dr. Howe advises the use of pure cider vinegar as all others contain alcohol. Even after the person exposed has run almost the entire incubation period, the use of vinegar will either abort the disease entirely, or modify to the extent of having all the prodromal symptoms without the disfiguring eruption. To get the immediate control of a smallpox epidemic in a community, every one should take a course of vinegar for a week, whether exposed or not.

Diluted vinegar applied locally will control the itching of smallpox. A slippery elm poultice applied to the face, while in the vesicular stage, will not only abort the puerile, but prevent the pitting. The poultice must not be used until the vesicles have formed.—American Medical Journal.

F. B. Tichenor the Champion Quoit Pitcher.

From the Fresno Republican. World champion athletes do not visit Fresno every day, and it may therefore be of interest to many to learn that Frank B. Tichenor, deputy State Commander of the Knights of the Maccabees who arrived in this city last week to work in the interest of his order, holds the world's amateur championship for pitching quoits. Mr. Tichenor won the Pacific Coast Championship in 1896 and since has succeeded in defeating every man he has met. A year ago he played a game at Vallejo regarding which the San Francisco Bulletin said:

"F. B. Tichenor, Deputy State Commander of the Maccabees is still 'Champ' at quoits having defeated Mr. Harrur of Vallejo in a very exciting game. Mr. Tichenor was compelled to make ringers in order to win. He is now the undisputed champion of the Pacific Coast, having defeated H. B. Scott of Washington, L. C. Dollarhide of Montana, L. D. Hoss of California and C. K. Young of Denver." Mr. Tichenor was to have played H. D. Dean of England for the World's Championship next month, but Dean withdrew from the match immediately after the American had defeated Young of Denver by pitching twelve ringers without missing. As it is necessary for Mr. Tichenor to play a game every year in order to hold the championship, a game has been arranged to be played in this city on the 26th of January between him and "Bill" Traeger, the big Stanford tackle, who has something of a reputation for quoit pitching himself. They will use brass quoits pitching twenty yards for 100 points."

Either smallpox is not the disease it used to be, or else medical science has robbed it of its former terrors. Out of scores of cases of so called smallpox in this city during the past year or two, none has been fatal. Indeed the smallpox of this period and in this climate seems to be one of the most harmless diseases, though it has not yet become really pleasant.—Portland Telegram.
