Call for a Meeting of the Republican County Committee.

A meeting of the Republican Central Committee for Curry county will be held at Langlois, in said county, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Saturday, February 23d, 1902, for the purpose of organizing, fixing date for precinct primaries, holding time and place for holding the Republican county convention, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. It is desired that all members be present, either in person or by proxy. Members of the committee, as named by the last Republican County Convention are as follows:

About the luckiest man in the senate today is Senator Mason. He has raised an issue out of which he can have a lot of fun and make a reputation for himself that will be popular from ocean to ocean.

The other day he introduced resolutions to recognize Admiral Schley as the real commander in the battle of Santiago, to present him with a sword and to strike medals in honor of the victory to be presented to the admiral and those who served under him.

Naturally, Senator Hale moved to refer the resolution to the naval committee, of which he is himself the chairman. Everybody understood that to be a proposition to strangle and entomb the resolutions.

Senator Mason, however, is not to be so easily sidetracked. He announces that he will wait for the usual ten days for a report from the naval committee and then, failing to get it, will move in open senate to discharge the committee from further consideration of the resolutions. That will be a privileged motion on which he can move a call of the roll and so develop before the whole nation who and how many of the senators are the enemies of Admiral Schley.

It is to be hoped that he will persist in his programme and, if necessary, force that revelation. That Admiral Schley has been grossly outraged, demeaned and persecuted by the naval department is believed by more than nine-tenths of the American people. They are not at all satisfied to let his case rest where it has been put by a truculent majority of the court of inquiry. They are determined that the wrongs perpetrated upon the battle-winner of Santiago shall be righted, and congress and presidents will be changed until that righteous end is accomplished and the nation's records tell the truth.

Senator Mason has gotten hold of an intensely popular question and will redeem the vagaries of his past and assure his future by pushing it to a successful conclusion. The public is behind him and justice is with him. He should use every weapon at his command to win this fight. It will make him famous with the people, and in the present temper of the patriots of Illinois should guarantee his re-election to the senate.

The American Wool and Cotton Reporter says wool has not been in so strong a position, statistically, for four or five years as it is today. There is much less wool in the market than there was a year ago and the consumption is unprecedented. The situation is regarded as a sound and healthy one. It also reports a number of sales of Eastern Oregon wool in Boston; 65,000 pounds of No. 1 sold at 15 cents, equal to 44 cents clean. Another lot of 20,000 pounds sold at 13 cents, equivalent to 44 cents clean. Some fine staple Oregon sold at 16 cents in the grease. Valley Oregon is quoted at 16 to 19 cents, but no sales is reported.

That there will be an enormous tide of immigration turned towards Oregon this Spring is evident from the many inquiries received daily from people all through the Eastern and Middle states. The secretary of the Chamber of Commerce has a stock of requests for descriptive literature about the state and its resources coming in now and then, and reading matter by the pound lot is forwarded to these requests. Farmers in particular seem interested in what this state has to offer, and hundreds of them have designated their intention of coming West with the passing of Winter. Most of them write that they have some means and will come with the intent to settle down for good. Some have heard of the bountiful crops produced on the prolific soil in the Willamette Valley, and are anxious to have a chance at seeing results from their toil to a better extent than their present conditions make possible. Others are impressed with the excellent climatic conditions of the Western Slope, and will be glad to take chances on the future as regards financial success.—Portland Telegram.

A Connecticut Yankee who had noticed that personal property easily succeeds in evading taxation, proposes a scheme to stop it. He would let each man go to the public authority and be permitted to estimate his own wealth. His estimate would be accepted as correct without a question. Then when a man dies only so much as he has paid taxes on should go the heirs, and any amount that has escaped taxation, goes to the state. The plan is ingenious and might prove more equitable than the present system, making personal property bear more of its just burden which now falls on real estate. How it would work in actual operation is a problem.

Another test of the respective merits of English and American locomotives on a railroad in Jamaica has resulted in a great victory for the American engine, which drew 126 tons over the heaviest part of the line in seven minutes under the schedule time. The English locomotive completely failed to pull the same load, and, when materially lightened, failed to make even regular time. English experts and the local railroad officials were present at the test, which was a great disappointment to the Englishmen.

It is generally supposed that kerosene is a sovereign cure for all microbes. But here comes the New York board of health and declares that a kerosene lamp half turned down is the worst breeder of diphtheria in the world and the board particularly warns all mothers against leaving such a light in the sleeping rooms of children. The fumes of the lamp not only poison the air, but fit it for the propagation of diphtheria germs.

A novelty in homesteading was presented last week at the Duluth (Minn.) Land Office. The land embraced in the application, which was made by Pearl H. Smith of Superior, was about ten rods wide and nearly five miles long, and contains a few acres less than a quarter section. There are four other claimants to the land, including one scrip location, and it gives promise of being a long drawn out controversy.

The Commissioners appointed by the Supreme Court of Nebraska to investigate the merits of the Torrence land system and to report on the advisability of its adoption by that State has visited Toronto, Canada; Boston, Chicago and other points where the system is in use. Two of the Commissioners are in favor of its adoption and one is opposed to it.

Extracts from the Election Laws

The judges of election, in determining the residence and qualifications of persons offering to vote, shall be governed by the following rules, so far as the same may be applicable:

1. The place shall be considered and held to be the residence of a person in which his habitation is fixed, and to which, whenever he is absent he has the intention of returning.

2. A person shall not be considered or held to have lost his residence who shall leave his home and go into another state or territory or county of this state for a temporary purpose only.

3. A person shall not be considered or held to have gained a residence in any county of this state into which he shall come for temporary purposes only, without the intention of making said county his home, but with the intention of leaving the same when he shall have accomplished the business which brought him into it.

4. If a person move to any other state, or to any of the territories, with the intention of making it his permanent home, he shall be considered and held to have lost his residence in this state.

5. The place where a married man's family resides shall be considered and held to be his residence.

6. The place where an unmarried man sleeps shall be considered and held to be his residence.

7. If a person shall go from this state into any other state or territory and there exercise the right of suffrage, he shall be considered and held to have lost his residence in this state.

8. All qualified electors shall vote in the election precinct in the county where they may reside for county officers, and in any county in the state for state officers, or in any county of a congressional district in which such electors may reside for members of congress.

In the canvas of votes only white ballots furnished under the provisions of this act shall be counted, and any ballot from which it is impossible to determine the elector's choice for any of the offices shall be void and shall not be counted.

An Act to instruct the senators and representatives of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon as to the election of Senators in congress:

Whereas, it is desirable that the people should have an opportunity to instruct their senators and representatives in the legislative assembly as to the election of a senator in congress, from Oregon; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. At all general elections next preceding the election of a senator in congress by the legislature of Oregon there shall be placed upon the official ballot by each of the county clerks and clerks of the county court the names of all candidates for the office of senator in congress that have been nominated in any of the methods now, or which may hereafter be provided by law for the nomination of state officers of the State of Oregon; the votes for which candidates shall be counted and certified to, by the election judges in the same manner as the votes for other candidates; and records of the vote for such candidates shall be made out and sworn to by the board of canvassers of each county of the state and returned to the Secretary of State, who shall transmit duplicate copies of such returns to the legislative assembly at its next ensuing session, one of which shall be addressed to the Senate and the other to the House of Representatives of the State of Oregon, one copy of which shall be delivered by him to the President of the Senate and the other to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, after the organization of such bodies, which officers shall open and lay the same before the separate houses when assembled to elect a senator in congress, as now required by law of congress; and it shall be the duty of each house to count the votes and announce the highest number, and thereupon the house shall proceed to the election of a senator as required by the act of congress and the constitution of this state.

Coos Bay News.

Work is progressing rapidly on the large vessel, being built in the Marshfield-shipyard. The keel for another vessel will be laid within a few days.

Archie Kruse has been canning clams at a lively rate, since starting up his cannery last week. He is putting up an excellent, clean pack, which is sure to command the highest price.

The Coos Bay Loggers' Protective Association was organized Saturday evening, with a membership of 45. Indications are that the membership will rapidly increase, and the organization will be a strong one.

The new schooner, being built at North Bend, is designed to carry 1,000,000 feet of lumber. Peter Loggie, who is in charge of the construction, is making the vessel one of the strongest and neatest finished vessels ever turned out at North Bend. She will be ready to launch early next month.

In answer to an inquiry, as to when the steamer Gussie Tel fair went ashore and was wrecked near Rocky Point, we looked over the old files of the News, and found that she went ashore, outward bound loaded with coal, on Sept. 21, 1880.

Some of our exchanges, in speaking of the output of the hatchery on South Coos river, state that the total number of chinook salmon eggs secured was 60,000. This is a mistake. The total number of salmon eggs secured last fall was 2,775,000, all of which were chinooks, with the exception of 60,000 silversides. The young fish will soon be turned loose, to look out for themselves, as no arrangements have been made for feeding them.
