Call for a Meeting of the Republican County Committee.

A meeting of the Republican Central Committee for Curry county will be held at Langlois, in said county, at 2 o'clock p. m., on Saturday, February 22d, 1902, for the purpose of organizing, fixing date for precinct primaries, naming time and place for holding the Republican County convention, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. It is desired that all members be present, either in person or by proxy.

Members of the committee, as named by the last Republican County Convention are as follows:

Republican State Convention.

Portland, Feb. 9.—The Republican State Central Committee, which met in this city this morning in pursuance of the call issued by Chairman George A. Steele fixed the apportionment of delegates to the state convention, set the date for the state convention, and recommended dates for the holding of primaries and county conventions.

Portland was selected as the convention city, and Wednesday, April 2nd, at 11 a. m., was fixed as the time. March 22d was recommended as the date for the republican primaries, and March 29 as the date for the Republican County Conventions.

The report of the committee on appointment of delegates to the state convention recommended that the apportionment be based upon the highest vote cast for presidential electors at the last general election, and that the rate of representation be fixed at one delegate for every 150 votes or major fraction thereof. This led to a protracted debate, some favoring the recommendation of the committee, and others advocating an appointment based upon the vote cast for Governor Geer or Judge Wolverton, of the supreme court, at the last state election. After several proposed amendments were defeated, the report of the committee was adopted. Under the apportionment agreed upon the convention will have 311 delegates and the several counties will be represented as follows:

President Roosevelt is reported in the dispatches from Washington as very much in earnest in his desire to have the duty on Cuban sugar reduced. He sees the path of plain duty before him, and the chances are that he will follow it, even to the extent of expressing very forcibly to Congress, if necessary, his views on the subject.

Paterson, N. J. Feb. 9.—A great fire swept through Paterson today and in its desolate wake are the embers and ashes of property valued at \$10,000,000. It burned its way through the business section of the city and claimed as its own a majority of the finer structures devoted to commercial, civic, educational and religious use, as well as scores of houses. There was but small tribute of life and injury to the conflagration, but thousands were left homeless and many thousands without employment.

The cost of a cable from Honolulu is put at \$3,000,000.

Political Gossip.

The Democratic party of this state must be pretty far gone to encourage the "citizen" movement. Possibly this is an attempt to catch the Socialists, who are not asleep.

Mr. Harvey W. Scott is not a candidate "actual or possible," for the seat occupied in the upper branch of congress by Senator Simon. In the article containing this announcement Mr. Scott declares that the senior senator does not own that senatorial seat, which belongs to Oregon.—Plaindealer.

Thos. H. Tongue is the latest named politician in the senatorship arena. He could hardly be spared as congressman from this district.

It seems to be hard for democrats and reform papers to live. In our neighboring county, Marion, the Independent of Salem, has turned republican. The Journal of Salem, which supported Bryan and silver, has been back into the fold for some time. This leaves Salem without reform or democratic sheet.—Herald.

The Socialists will hold a state convention in Portland March 19. The congressional district convention will be held the following day at Oregon City.

Hon. George C. Chamberlain, of Portland, will no doubt be nominated for governor on the democratic ticket and will give Governor Geer a good run for his money, and it wouldn't surprise us a bit if he beat him too.—Oregon City Herald. (Dem.)

Washington, Feb. 4.—Governor Taft to-day continued his narrative before the Senate Committee on the Philippines concerning conditions in the Philippine archipelago.

Referring to his testimony of yesterday, he said he feared that he had given a wrong impression concerning the part the army had played in bringing the insurrection to an end, but if so this was due to the fact that he could not present a correct impression of the whole situation from one point of view. Then, in order to give the army its just dues, he took up and analyzed its work in the islands. He recalled that as soon as General Otis had received reinforcements sufficient for his purposes the Philippine army had broken up and scattered into guerrilla bands. On this point Aguinaldo and Luna had differed. Luna advocating the continuance of the war on the old lines. So sharp was this difference, he said that Aguinaldo had directed and secured the assassination of Luna, thus leaving the way open for the carrying out of his own plans. He would not, he said, report the incident if it had not been positively reported to him by General Funston. Aguinaldo said that if he did not kill Luna, Luna would kill him. Indeed, the custom was to order a man's death in his absence and have him killed upon his return. The presence of these guerrilla bands rendered it necessary to place garrisons everywhere, there being at one time as many as 500 of them. This rendered the work before the army very arduous, and the activity the skill and the bravery of the American troops were such as to soon render the enemy tired of the warfare.

Speaking of the military policy in the Philippines, Governor Taft said: "The war has been all over in these islands and that which remains is crime against the Filipino people to keep up a state of war under the circumstances. They have worn out the right to any treatment but that which is severe and within the laws of war." Governor Taft also said that the great majority of the people of the islands desire peace and that the insurrectionists were by their acts preventing the mass of the people from settling down and earning a quiet living. Instead of being allowed to do this they were kept under a system of terrorism, which should be stopped.

San Francisco has another murder mystery; another Durrant-like case. A 16 year old girl named Nora Fuller was enticed away from home under promise of a position, and was found murdered, a few days ago. The suspect in the case is a man who has given his name as Bennett, Hawkins and Scott.

Nearly half the Chinese seeking admission to this country at San Francisco are refused.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Mr. Takahira, the Japanese Minister at Washington, today called at the State Department and notified Secretary Hay of the signature of the treaty between Great Britain and Japan, made public yesterday in England, binding the two nations to joint action to maintain the integrity of China and Korea. The assent of the United States is not necessary to this agreement, but if it were it would probably not have been withheld, for it pointed out that the treaty is precisely in line with the acts of the State Department, as fully disclosed in the notes published in it from time to time.

It is again stated that there has been no joint action as between the United States and the two powers named, yet it is a fact that the preamble to the new treaty might be regarded as almost a paraphrase of the position of the United States toward the Manchurian question, as enunciated in Secretary Hay's note to the Russian Ambassador here.

It is made very clear here by the statements that the purposes of the United States all relate to commercial and industrial phases of the Manchurian question. With the political phase we have little concern. In other words, the United States is contending for the "open door" in Manchuria, and it recognizes in this new treaty a valuable support in its contention.

Kansas City, Feb. 12.—Judge Teasdale, in the Circuit Court here today, granted the application of Frank James for an injunction to stop the production of "The James Boys in Missouri," a drama depicting the James boys as train robbers and bank robbers, which has been playing at a local theater. James' petition alleged that the play was harmful to the youth of the country in that it glorified outlawry and made heroes of outlaws and said that it unjustly revived a reputation that he had been trying to live down for 20 years.

The suit raised the question as to whether or not a private citizen can be portrayed on the stage without his consent, whether to his discredit or not. Judge Teasdale instructs that James furnish a bond of \$4000 to indemnify the theater people against loss in case the decision is overturned by a higher court, and until the bond is given the play will go on. It is believed James will produce the bond during the day. The piece has attracted big crowds here, the home of the James boys.

Constantinople, Feb. 14.—The ransom of Miss Ellen Stone and Madam Tselka, has been paid. Their delivery to the American agents is expected hourly.

New York, Feb. 15.—Robert Fitzsimmons and James J. Jeffries signed articles here today to meet in a 20-round glove contest on some day between May 10 and 29, for the championship of the world. The contest is to take place before the club offering the highest purse. The winner is to receive 60 per cent and the loser 40 per cent of the purse.

Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., eldest son of the President, has been dangerously sick with pneumonia, at Groton, Mass., where he is attending school. He is now recovering, and the President has returned to Washington.

The Oregonian's Salem correspondent of recent date says: "Judge J. C. Fullerton, of Douglas county, was in Salem early this week. His name has been mentioned in connection with the gubernatorial contest. In answer to questions he stated that he has not decided whether he will be a candidate and his course will be determined by the conditions which may exist as the date of the convention draws nigh. Judge Fullerton called on some of his political friends here, and, it is supposed, discussed the political situation with them.

For the first time since the United States began issuing money in the form of printed bank notes, the features of a suicide appear on one of these. The new \$10 bill, payable in either silver or gold, just issued at Washington and known as the "Buffalo Bill" because an immense bison is engraved in the left hand corner a picture of Meri vether Lewis, the famous explorer, who took his life in a fit of melancholy.

Lewis became private secretary to President Thomas Jefferson, who made him governor of a western territory. He was a moody genius, and in a fit of despondency at the age of 35, he killed himself. No other instance of the face of a suicide appearing on any of Uncle Sam's printed money is known.

Butte, Mont., Feb. 12.—A special to the Miner from Cinnabar gives further particulars of the breaking out of the geyser in the Yellowstone National Park. Soldiers yesterday carried news to Mammoth Hot Springs of a rumbling resembling distant thunder, a quivering of the earth as though by an earthquake, and the mighty leaping of a gigantic column of seething, surging, hot water high into the air, which killed the vegetation surrounding the formation, as it came in contact with the scalding waters from the bowels of the earth.

The new geyser is situated in the vicinity of Norris Basin, high up in the timber, about 45 yards from the Constant geyser. The geyser, which has been named "The Twentieth Century," plays in a manner similar to the Constant, but of many times greater volume. It also erupts more frequently than the Constant, spouting at intervals of one and a quarter to two hours.
