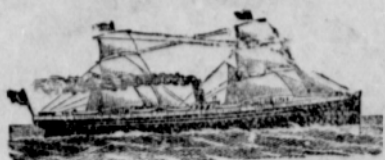

There were only two applicants for teachers' certificates at the examination held at Dairyville last week—Prof. J. C. Logan and Robert Goetz. Both received certificates.

Jacob Kampfer's will has been filed for probate in San Francisco. The estate of deceased amounts to several thousand dollars, including some valuable real estate in Floras Creek precinct, in this county.

Just north of Floras creek bridge the creek has cut into the bank so badly that the road is in danger of being destroyed, and if neglected will in time form a channel 200 yds. north of the present one—leaving the bridge where one would have to ford or swim to get to it.

Senator Mitchell has presented to the Senate a memorial of the legislature of Oregon praying for an appropriation of \$44,000 to relieve Curry County from indebtedness incurred in building a post road along the Pacific Coast from the northern to the southern boundary of the county.

The Republican County Committee will meet at Dairyville next Saturday, at which time dates will be fixed for holding precinct primaries, county convention, and apportionment of delegates to each precinct, and if the same rule is adopted as two years ago, and one delegate at large is allowed from each precinct, and one delegate for each 20 votes or fraction over half of 20, cast for the Republican candidate for Supreme Judge, the representation from the various precincts will remain about the same as two years ago.

Oscar Mathers, Deed Fitzhugh, Jas Haft and Charley Farrier had quite an adventure one day last week. They started to cross Sixes river, which was very high, in a canoe, for the purpose of going out hunting, and when out in the stream the canoe capsized. Mathers Fitzhugh and Haft, being good swimmers, started for shore, carrying their guns, but seeing Farrier struggling in the water, having gone down the second time, they dropped their guns and hurried to his rescue, reaching him just as he was sinking for the last time, and all succeeded in reaching shore, minus three guns and an overcoat.

## No Roadmaster.

Roseburg Plaindealer.

The matter of appointing a county roadmaster was to have come up before the county commissioners at the last term of court, but it has been deferred and the office which was created at the last session of the legislature will remain unfilled in Douglas county.

A Plaindealer reporter called on County Judge M. D. Thompson to ask about the matter. The judge stated that at first the court deemed it mandatory by the law to appoint a general roadmaster, but after carefully re-reading the law and consulting different attorneys about the matter, came to the conclusion that it was not required to make the appointment. The law reads that the commissioners' court MAY, at its first meeting after passing of the law, appoint a roadmaster. Further, it states that at the January, 1902, term of the court, they shall appoint a successor to fill the vacancy made by the expiration of the roadmaster's term. In the first place it seems that it is entirely optional with the court whether it appoints a roadmaster or not, and in the second place inasmuch as there is no vacancy to fill, it is not necessary to make an appointment.

There are several applicants for the position in this county and all have petitions largely signed by their friends. Judge Thompson, however, holds that the office is a useless expense and says that it is the general opinion among the taxpayers that a county roadmaster would be superfluous and it is considered that the district supervisors chosen by the people at the June elections are entirely capable of attending to the building and repairing of the roads throughout the county.

He says that the appointment of a county roadmaster would be a needless expenditure of the taxpayers' money, and that a much more sensible plan is to expend direct on road improvements, the salary of the proposed roadmaster. Judge Thompson further states that the court will continue to diligently look after and guard the county's road and bridge interests, Commissioner Nicols representing the southern portion of the county, Commissioner Young the northern and Judge Thompson the central part of the county, all road and bridge matters being carefully considered by the three officials, who constitute the county board, at their regular stated meetings. We consider the actions of Judge Thompson and the commissioners in disposing of the roadmaster question, wise and judicious and we think their disposition of the matter will be heartily commended by the county's road supervisors and taxpayers.

The Kansas supreme court has rendered a decision to the effect that where a man owns a home, and his wife dies and his children marry and establish homes of their own, his home ceases to be a home-stand and can be seized for the payment of debts. The same decision applies to bachelors, and the Kansas court seems to be working along the line that widowers and bachelors must pay their debts.

The mill will mean much for this section of the county.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

The Jackson county commissioner's court at their session, Wednesday, decided not to appoint a road overseer for this county. The new law in the matter is directory and not mandatory and the board decided that it was not for the best interest to establish the new position in this county at this time, hence their action, yesterday at Jacksonville.—Medford Enquirer.

Klamath Republican: The county clerk's office receives a daily average of between three and four hundred scalps, mostly those of rabbits. Last Saturday one thousand rabbit scalps came in, and on that day about \$500 worth of coyote and rabbit scalps, an accumulation of two weeks, were burned. Thirty-nine coyote scalps were received Tuesday. The bounty on coyotes is \$2, and on rabbits 5 cents.

E. Dyer & Shoemaker are experimenting upon cutting matches. They are preparing the wood for shipment in boxes. This product when it reaches its destination will be dried, separated into squares and dipped in the proper mixture, after which the finished article will be made up in packages ready to be placed on the market. Just what this experiment will amount to remains to be developed. This section can furnish an immense amount of matchwood, and if it can be worked up at home and shipped at a profit, it opens up possibilities for the employment of a large number of men.—Bandon Recorder.
