Call

For Democratic Primaries and Conventions.

Pursuant to the call of George Fitzhugh, Secretary of the Democratic Central Committee, the Committee met at Gold Beach, Curry county, Oregon, Feb. 15, 1902.

And in absence of chairman and secretary, Dennis Cunniff, Sr., committee man for Gold Beach precinct, took the chair, and B. Guthridge, by R. E. Guthridge, proxy, secretary.

On motion, it was decided that the Democratic primary elections be held in each precinct of the county, at 1 o'clock P. M., on Thursday the 27th day of March, and that the Democratic County Convention be held at 10 o'clock, A. M., on Thursday, the 3d day of April, 1902, at the court house in Gold Beach.

It was decided that the apportionment of delegates to the Convention be as follows: One delegate at large from each precinct, and one delegate for each ten votes, or fraction over half of ten votes, cast for Thomas G. Green for Supreme Judge at the State election held in June, 1900, to-wit:

Chetco, 3; Mountain, 1; Pistol River, 2; Gold Beach, 2; Wedderburn, 2; Ophir, 1; Port Orford, 3; Sixes, 3; Floras Creek, 5; Eckley, 3; Mule Creek, 2; Big Bend, 3; Quosaten, 1; Jerry's Flat, 2.

On motion, meeting adjourned.

There was not very much comment in the Senate about the matter, but Senator Mitchell was felicitated upon the result.

The Republican County Convention.

The Republican County Convention for Curry county, met at the Court House in Gold Beach at 10 o'clock, A. M., on March 22, 1902. Convention called to order by Hon. Raleigh Scott.

W. O. Cook was elected temporary chairman, and Guy R. Merriman temporary secretary.

The chair appointed the following committees:

On motion, convention adjourned until one o'clock, P. M.

Convention met pursuant to adjournment.

Committee on permanent organization recommended that the temporary officers be made the permanent officers of the convention, which, on motion was adopted.

Messrs Capps and Gauntlett were appointed tellers.

Nominations for delegates to State and District Conventions were made, the ballot resulting in the election of E. A. Hughes, of Port Orford, S. P. Peirce, of Sixes and Wm. R. Miller, of Quosaten.

The following resolutions were introduced and unanimously adopted:

[By some oversight, we failed to receive for publication a resolution which was unanimously adopted, heartily endorsing Hon. Thos. H. Tongue, and favoring his renomination as a candidate for Congress, another paper having been substituted by mistake—Ed.]

Resolved—That the Republican Convention of Curry county favor the nomination of Hon. J. C. Fulton for the office of Governor.

Resolved—That the Republicans of Curry county favor the nomination of Hon. A. M. Crawford for Attorney General.

The following County Central Committee was appointed:

C. W. Haines for County Commissioner, Sandy Owens for Surveyor, and Dr. J. J. Caldwell for Coroner, were nominated by acclamation.

The County Central Committee met and organized immediately after the adjournment of the Convention, by electing J. Huntley, of Gold Beach, chairman, and E. A. Bailey, of Wedderburn, secretary.

A Good Road Scheme.

Senator Earle, of Detroit, Mich., has a good scheme that if put into practice would soon bring the millennium dawn of good roads. In explaining it Senator Earle says:

"First, I would have the government make good road maps of each county in the United States, showing all the public highways. I would have bad roads printed in red, fairly good ones in blue, and the improved roads in black. These would be published in pocket form and sold for 5 cents each at all post offices. This would in effect compel every farmer to see to it that his road was improved, for he would soon see the advantage of having his farm located on one of the improved roads.

"Second I would levy a tax of 50 cents a year on every vehicle in the land. This alone would yield an annual revenue of several millions. It would furnish all the necessary funds for the purpose. The tax would be a trifle and would be cheerfully paid by the people, so long as it was devoted to the betterment of the highways."

Socialist Convention.

A Socialist Mass Convention was held at Portland on March 19th with some 200 electors present. A state ticket was nominated and platform adopted, as follows:

For Governor—R. R. Ryan, of Marion County.

For Secretary of State—C. W. Barzee, of Wasco County.

For State Treasurer—W. W. Myerson, of Clakamas County.

For Justice of the Supreme Court—C. P. Rutherford, of Harney County.

For Superintendent of Public Instruction, Attorney-General and State Printer—To be filled by the State Central Committee.

For Congressman, Second District—D. T. Gerdes, of Clatsop County.

The committee on platform and resolutions submitted the following report, which was adopted:

We, the Socialist party of the state of Oregon, in mass convention assembled, proclaim our allegiance to the Socialist party of America, and we affirm our unflinching allegiance to the principles and programme of international Socialism, and as all wealth is the product of labor, the full compensation for labor is the entire product of that labor, and that as the present system is responsible for all the poverty and distress known to civilization, we wage our warfare against the system, and not against the individual.

First—We are unalterably opposed to making property a qualification to the right of franchise, and demand the repeal of all such laws now in existence.

Second—We are in favor of placing all state officials on a flat salary of not to exceed in any case the sum of \$2000 per annum, and all fees, appropriations, perquisites, etc., shall revert to the treasury and be paid out on warrants as they may be presented for payment.

Third—We are opposed to any officers loaning any of the public funds, except those of the public schools.

Fourth—We are in favor of equal civil and political rights for both men and women. Therefore, be it Resolved, That we favor the election of all officers by a direct vote of the people, and demand that our United States Senators use every effort to secure the passage of the proposed Constitutional amendment providing for election of the United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

Resolved, That we call special attention to the proposed amendment to the state constitution, viz: the initiative and referendum, as the only feature of true self-government ever submitted to the voters of this state, and

Resolved, That until Socialism is adopted, we are in favor of exclusion of the Chinese and Japanese laborers from our shores, in order that the American may not be further enslaved by our present condition; and be it further

Resolved, That this convention calls upon all good citizens of the United States to unite for independent political action in a party having as its avowed object the overthrow of the capitalistic system and the establishment of the co-operative commonwealth; that is, the public ownership and operation of the means of production and distribution for public service, instead of private profit, and for the good of all the people.
