Letter From S. A. Clark.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 20, '02.

While Oregon letters have told,

for two months past, of delightful

weather, and for a month back of

wild flowers in bloom, we have had

phenomenal winter, with mixture

of snow, rain, slush, and ice to di-

versify the climate, and colds ad-

libitum. Today there is sunshine,

with freezing temperature and a

north wind that attends strictly to

business and makes the world disa-

greeable. There is an occasional

day when sunshine encourages the

buds to swell and flowers to peep;

but these are sandwiched in few

and far between. This is told to

let your readers know what a good

climate they have.

It is a far cry from Oregon to

this city, but there are enough Ore-

gonians here to break the monotony,

and they occasionally make them-

selves apparent. Last week brought

an invitation to attend an elocu-

cutionary evening with Mrs.
