## Hon. A. M. Crawford.

Roseburg Plaindealer.

Hon. A. M. Crawford, of Roseburg, who received the nomination for attorney general in the state republican convention last week, was born in Delaware county, New York, in 1853 and received his education at Walton Academy in the same county and state. He read law with N. C. and M. W. Marvin and was licensed and admitted to practice law by the Supreme Court of the state of New York in 1878. He came to Oregon in 1880 and commenced the practice of law at Marshfield, Coos county, where he is well known and highly esteemed. In 1885 he was married to Miss Florence Watson, youngest daughter of the late Jas. and Emily Watson, of this county, and they have one son about 13 years of age. Mr. Crawford resided at Marshfield, where he built up a very lucrative law business until 1890, when he came to this city to reside, that his wife might escape the severe coast climate which was very unfavorable to her health. In July, 1890, he was appointed Receiver in the U. S. Land Office at this place, and at the close of his term again resumed the practice of law. In 1896 he was elected a member of the legislature from this county and was a prominent factor in the hold-up session of 1897. He has always been an active, earnest, consistent republican and for the past two years has served the party very faithfully as chairman of the Douglas County Republican Central Committee. He is a gentleman of irreproachable character and possesses more than ordinary ability; a forceful, ready speaker, an able counselor, and withal a genial whole-souled gentleman. To know him is to esteem him which accounts for his great popularity wherever he is known, especially among the legal fraternity. His election in June is assured.

# THE REPUBLICAN PLATFORM.

Declaration of Principles for the State Campaign of 1902.

The Republican party of Oregon, in state convention assembled, proud of its record and past history, its devotion to the principles of human liberty and human rights, its great and imperishable names which lend lustre and glory to the American Nation at home and among the nations of the earth, and as an assurance of its continued fidelity to the great principles for which it has contended in the past in State and National affairs, does hereby make and affirm the following declaration of its principles:

The events of the late war with Spain carried us into the Philippine Islands. We hold it to be consistent with the principles of liberty and of our National life that the sovereignty of the United States should be maintained in the islands, under such local self-government as the people may be, or may be come, fitted to participate in. We therefore declare against all proposals looking to the retirement of the United States from the Philippine Islands.

That in the war which President Roosevelt has inaugurated against the gigantic combinations of the incorporated capital he has the united and enthusiastic support of the Republican party of Oregon.

We demand and insist upon the passage of the bill now pending in Congress for the exclusion of Chinese, known as the Mitchell-Kahn exclusion bill.

We reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of protection in necessary cases of industries still in their infancy or unable to compete with foreign productions.

We recognize the right of labor to organize and combine for mutual protection under the law, and we recommend that the Legislature enact all necessary legislation to protect labor in all its rights and privileges. In the interest of American labor and the upbuilding of the working man as the corner-stone of the prosperity of our country, we recommend that Congress create a Department of Labor in charge of a secretary, with a seat in the Cabinet.

We demand that a law be passed by the next Legislature placing all public officers of this state upon reasonable salaries, which shall not be increased during the incumbent's term of office, and beyond such salary they shall receive no compensation as fees or otherwise.

In order to promote the development of the mineral resources of the state, we are in favor of the creation and maintenance of a mining bureau by the state.

We declare our approval and support of the suggestions of President Roosevelt for the irrigation of the arid lands of the country. This work should be undertaken by the United States as soon as possible, and carried forward on a consistent plan, under direction of the General Government.

We urge our Representatives in Congress and Senators to use every effort to secure the speedy opening of the Columbia River between the Dalles and Celilo, and for clearing the river of obstructions to navigation from its mouth to the head of navigation. We urge also renewed and continued effort for improvement of our coast harbors and streams within the state, and the speedy construction of an isthmian canal.

That the public lands are the heritage of the common people and should be held in trust for the use and benefit of all the people under the homestead laws. We are therefore unalterably opposed to all plans, schemes or propositions for leasing public domains, either to corporations or individuals.

We favor a policy by the state and the United States which shall further foster and support our fisheries, and we request the Legislature to enact such further measures as may be found by experience necessary to obtain this result.

We demand and insist upon the immediate passage by Congress of the United States of the oleomargarine bill, known as the Groat bill, now pending in the Senate.

That we favor the proposed amendment to the state constitution providing for the initiative and referendum, and recommend its adoption by the people of the state.

We declare our approval of the principles of the primary law enacted by the Legislature at the session of 1901, and we ask the Legislature to extend this law so that in its main features it may apply to primary elections in all election precincts throughout the state. And we further recommend the election of United States Senators by popular vote.

In the matter of reorganizing school Dist. No. 21 of Coos and Curry counties: This matter having been continued at the last January term of court, for proof of posting notices, and no proof having been furnished as to the posting of said notices, it is ordered by the court that said petition be continued until the next regular term of this court. Also, that the petition for the division of district No. 3 be continued for proof of posting notices, as by law required.

In the matter of legalizing, laying out and establishing a county trail from Devil's Backbone to a point on county line near Nine-Mile Water through road district No. 11: Now at this time is presented the report of viewers heretofore appointed to view out and locate the above described trail, which report is hereby accepted and approved by the court; and the supervisor in and for said road district No. 11 is hereby ordered to order out and expend road labor on the trail above described, in the same manner as labor on other roads in the county.

Ordered by the court that M. S. Dorster, Geo. W. Billings and Claud Hall be paid the following amounts for services in viewing out a county trail in district No. 11:

In the matter of issuing a county warrant in lieu of one lost or destroyed: Now at this time comes N. C. Nielsen and files his affidavit, setting forth that he was the owner of county warrant No. 616, issued in his favor Sept. 8, 1900, and that said warrant has been lost or destroyed; and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that the clerk draw a warrant in lieu thereof for the sum of \$8, the face value of said warrant. And on the south as follows: Beginning at meander corner on ocean beach, corner to fractional sections 19, 20; thence east along section line to corner of sections 22, 23, 26, 27, Tp 34 S, R 14 W.

In the matter of establishing a new road district in Port Orford election precinct: Now comes on for consideration the above matter, and the court being fully advised in the premises, it is ordered that said district be established with boundaries as follows:

Commencing at a point on the road running northerly from Port Orford in section 16, Tp 32, 15 W, where the dividing ridge between Sixes and Elk river crosses county road; thence along said ridge through sections 15, 22, 23, 24 and 25 in Tp 32, 14 W; thence due east to county line; thence south 3 1/2 miles to section 24 in Tp 33, 13 W; thence west to section 19, Tp 33 14 W; thence northerly along county road to place of beginning, said district to be known as district No. 16.

Ordered by the court that J. R. Hall's report as road supervisor of district No. 11 be and the same is hereby accepted and approved, and that he be paid the sum of \$22.

Ordered by the court that the county commissioners be paid per diet, and mileage as follows:
