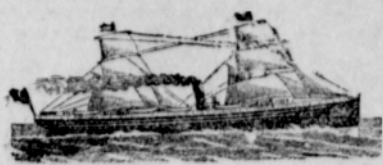

Mr. Hume on the Right Track.

At the last session of the legislature Hon. R. D. Hume introduced and had passed, a memorial, asking Congress to reimburse Curry county to the extent of \$44,000 on account of expenditure in building a post road through the county to the California State line. This memorial was taken in hand by Senator Mitchell, who introduced a bill accordingly in the Senate, and has not allowed it to go to sleep in the hands of the committee. The Oregonian's Washington correspondent, under date of May 1, says:

"Senator Mitchell today secured a favorable report on his bill appropriating \$44,000 to reimburse Curry county, for expenditures made in constructing a military and postal wagon road southward from the Coos-Curry county line across the entire county to the California line. The amount carried was cut down from \$50,000 by the committee."

While the bill was apparently cut down from \$50,000 to \$44,000 it still carries the full amount originally demanded by Mr. Hume, and a favorable report from the committee is almost an assurance that it will pass the Senate with little opposition, especially since it has an able and untiring champion on the floor of the Senate, and there is no opposition minority report to contend with.

It is quite probable that the bill will pass the Senate at the present session, and it is possible that it may reach the House in time for action at this session, but hardly probable, though it would come up early in next winter's session, and it would have an earnest, able and influential champion in the person of Mr. Tongue.

When the memorial passed the legislature most people doubted very strongly that Mr. Hume would ever realize his expectations; there were remarks that Mr. Hume himself expected nothing further than the passage of the memorial through the legislature; that no member of congress would introduce such a bill, or if they did it would soon be put to sleep in committee.

But Mr. Hume acted in sincere good faith, and has never wavered in his belief that success would follow his efforts. And now the prospects are rapidly growing more favorable right along.

It has been no uncommon thing for the government to build military and post roads in isolated sections; hence, it is not unreasonable to ask the government to assist an isolated county that has embarrassed itself in building such a road.

The question of good roads is a question that is rapidly gaining in importance throughout the entire United States, and is being agitated as one of the greatest needs of the masses today—not only for the farmers and producers, but for all classes of people. The sentiment in favor of the general government lending aid in the construction of wagon roads is becoming widespread and earnest. Only a few days ago Land Commissioner, Binger Hermann made an able speech at Charleston, in which he strongly advocated government aid in building wagon roads, and the cheering and hearty enthusiasm with which his remarks were received by his thousands of listeners from all parts of the United States, proved conclusively the trend of public sentiment in this regard.

The government has expended untold millions in aid of railroads. Aid for wagon roads would be far more meritorious, for while the former aid went toward enriching individuals and corporations, the latter would be of vast benefit and importance to the entire people of the country.

A Curry County Coyote.

Irma, Curry Co., Ogn., May 3, '02. Delmer Colgrove killed a large coyote on the Mountain Ranch yesterday. Del Norte Record.

Henry Westbrook has been elected President of the Del Norte Agricultural Association, D. W. Finch Secretary. The association will immediately commence preparation, so we are informed, for the fall fair at Smith River.

R. Scott of Mountain Ranch, in Curry county is gathering cattle on the Illinois River, and driving them to his home ranch for delivery about the 15th of next month to Isam Walker, who will make a cattle drive to Humboldt county. Mr. Walker has purchased the surplus stock of A. H. Crook, A. H. Gauntlett and other cattle growers in Curry county, which will be driven out at the same time the Scott cattle are taken.

Some men are being sent to Chetco to commence tanbark peeling by the Chetco syndicate. The bark will be scowed down Chetco river on scows and then towed over the bar and loaded on vessels for San Francisco. The intention also is to put up a sawmill this summer, so report says. The great obstacle in tanbark shipping from Chetco, will be shallowness of the river during the summer months when the shipments will be made.

Washington, April 28.—The conferees on the Chinese exclusion bill reached a complete agreement on the bill today. Their report was submitted to the Senate and House this afternoon, and in each instance adopted without debate. The bill now goes to the President for his approval, which is assured by the firm stand he has taken for the measure.

The bill strikes out that portion of the Senate bill limiting the extension of all existing laws to the life of the present treaty, and re-enacts them so far as is not inconsistent with the treaty obligations until otherwise provided by law, and extends the laws to our island territory so far as applicable. It allows Chinese to enter for exposition purposes and retains the provision regarding certification in the Philippines.

Waterville, N. Y., April 28.—It is expected here that the new 16-inch gun, to be placed at Fort Hamilton New York harbor, will be completed by June 1. The gun, which has been in course of construction about four years, will first be sent to Sandy Hook for proving. Last week the War Department decided to mount the gun on a disappearing carriage. Its first trial is eagerly awaited by all the gunmakers of the world. It is said that the gun will hurl a shell 2 miles. This is disputed by the Krupps, who assert it will not throw the shot more than 15 miles. In order to discharge the gun it will require 1000 pounds of powder and a 3000-pound projectile. The gun, when completed, will weigh 150 tons.

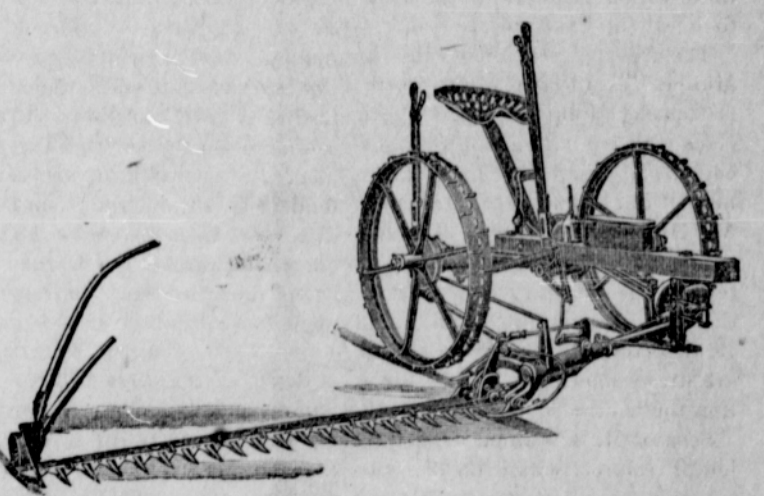

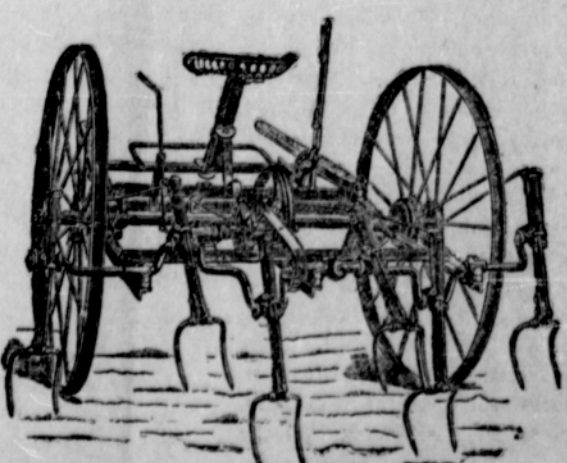
