The Result in Curry.

Owing to the late arrival of a copy of the official count of the vote of Curry county, which reached us only last evening, we are unable to give the complete vote by precincts. Following, however, is the number of votes received by each candidate in this county according to the official count:

In the above the leading candidates are all Republicans, with the exception of Cunniff, for Surveyor, who had no opponent. R. D. Hume, for Joint Representative, leads the ticket.

The vote on Initiative and Referendum was, Yes, 355; No, 19.

The Republican State ticket is ahead in Coos county by majorities ranging from two to four hundred, and the Republican county ticket is elected with the exception of clerk, assessor and coroner. Hume's majority in Coos is 117. The Initiative and Referendum vote in that county stands, Yes, 1522; No, 83. Total vote of the county, 2220.

Republicans concede the election of Chamberlain by about 335. The Republicans carry everything else. Tongue's plurality in the district is over 6000.

The Boer Surrender.

Regardless of opinions upon the merits otherwise of the Boer contentions, the people of the world will learn gladly that peace comes at last in South Africa. It has been a bitter struggle, costly in human life and treasure. It has been a disturbing element in the civilized world. In countries not directly interested, it has been forcibly brought to the attention of statesmen, diplomats, administrators and rulers. There has been sympathy for the gallant fight of the Boers, and admiration for the loyal response of the young men of England who sprang to the defence of the nation's honor.

Yet there has been desire everywhere that the war end. It was not profitable for either the English or the Boers. It took rise in mistakes committed by British Ministers, and need never have begun. These mistakes committed, however, and war begun, it was beyond reason to expect the English people to withdraw from the contest without demonstrating their strength and making such fine showing as the valor of her young men and the empire could insure.

The ultimate status of the Boer people is a problem over which Americans will speculate with considerable earnestness. This nation faces a situation in the Philippines that is not entirely unlike that in which the British people were placed when they found the Boer war on their hands. There was a power in South Africa less than the British, who desired absolute independence. Circumstances wrought to cause England to dispute their right to have it. Auxiliary questions were left for the time unsettled, while battle was waged over the main proposition. The theory of England was that, first, her power must be demonstrated, then later questions of other import were to be taken up. She thought that it was a matter of self preservation that was at stake. She must fight the Boers.

In a degree, the United States is similarly situated with reference to the Eastern archipelago. Largely the same considerations are involved. While probably a majority of the Americans are sympathetic with the Boers, for the reason that in that case our people have to deal with the abstract proposition of justice to a people, and have no self-interest concerned; yet, in the case of the Philippines, it cannot be truthfully denied that a majority of this nation demand that first the flag shall be firmly established, its authority unquestioned, and then the auxiliary questions worked out as time may suggest.

The attitude of the English in the future toward the Boers will influence that of this country towards the Philippines. The Boer surrender ends the first stage in the later discussion of the Boer problem. Now will follow the contentions of peace, which will not be less strenuous than those of war, albeit they be not of the musket and cannon.—Portland Journal.

The Boer War

Now that peace has at last been declared in South Africa it may be interesting to note a few facts concerning the war. Here are a few figures, etc.

Began in October, 1899.

Total available fighting force of Boers (estimated), 50,000.

Total number of British troops engaged from first to last, 500,000.

Largest number of British troops in field at one time, 280,000.

British losses (official statistics to April 1, 1902):

Total deaths—Officers, 1,020; men, 20,031. Missing and prisoners—Officers, 384; men, 9,181.

Boers losses—Prisoners, 37,000; killed and wounded, no statistics available.

Cost of war to Great Britain to date, about \$1,250,000,000.

Cost of war to Boers—No statistics available.

Commander-in-chief of British forces in South Africa—Buller, Roberts and Kitchener.

Principal Boer commanders—Joubert, Botha, DeWet and De la Rey.

Regarding the Sixes Bridge.

EDITOR TRIBUNE—I see in the issue of the TRIBUNE of the 4th inst., an article calling for bids for rebuilding Sixes River Bridge. Now it does not state therein whether the new Bridge shall be erected on the present old, rotten and defective North Pier or whether a new one shall be made, but judging from the wording thereof the old Pier is to be used. The subscriber heretofore repaired Sixes River Bridge something over two years ago, under contract from the County to repair said Bridge only, and at that time the North Pier in every particular was very weak, and in bad condition, including Piling and the caps thereon. Said ad. reads "under same plans and specifications as the old bridge except the batter post to main pier on up stream side at the bottom is to be removed farther up stream." Now it reads "Batter post to main Pier." The Piers, as I understand it, is the structure on which the superstructure or main span rests, and in the case of the Sixes River Bridge consists of a Pile Pier on North side of River and a cylinder filled with concrete, resting on a rock, on South side. The man who directed the wording of the Bid and made the Report recommending repairs on said Bridge (Mr. Lindberg) evidently means the Batter Posts at end of Bridge or superstructure. Now to a person who knows the mechanism of a Pratt Truss, it sounds funny, a recommendation being made that foot of Batter Posts be moved up stream, by a person of Mr. Lindberg's knowledge (?) of Bridge work. A word of explanation to show the futility or impracticability of any such course.

The battion chord of the Sixes River Bridge is composed of iron bars or links fastened together or connected at every panel point with a large steel pin, the tie bars and truss rods for every panel are also fastened to these pins. Now to throw the foot of the Batter posts up stream would warp and bend the chord bars running between the first panel point and foot of Batter post, thereby weakening and possibly causing one or more of them to break, the first time a considerable weight went over the bridge, as it is contrary to the original plans and intent and principal of said Truss.

By giving the matter a thought one can see that the bottom chord of said Bridge will have a curve down stream while the down stream chord would be straight. Besides the above by throwing the foot of the up stream Batter posts up stream would give them a batter down stream, and unless the up stream Batter posts were framed proportionally longer, the up-stream side of said truss or bridge would not be as originally planned, and in consequence thereof all Tie Bars and Truss rods would be too short.

I would respectfully suggest that the court look into this matter and if it is advisable to change the plan of said structure (as suggested by Mr. Lindberg), that the court consult some competent person or civil engineer. Also that the matter of a new north pier be looked into. Also, that all timbers and planking in said Bridge be new, and that any old plank or timbers in said Bridge that may be fit for further use be turned over to the Road Supervisor to be used planking Crystal Creek, Summers Creek and various other small Bridges across small creeks and sloughs in vicinity of the Sixes River Bridge.

Brief Text of Boer Treaty.

Following is a synopsis of Balfour's statement in the house of commons of the terms of peace:

The burgher forces lay down their arms and hand over all their rifles, guns and munitions of war in their possession or under their control. All prisoners are to be brought back as soon as possible to South Africa, without loss of liberty or property.

No action to be taken against prisoners, except where they are guilty of violation of the rules of war.

Dutch is to be taught in the schools, if desired by the parents, and used in the courts, if necessary.

Rifles are allowed for protection. Military occupation is to be withdrawn as soon as possible and self-government substituted.

There is to be no tax on the Transvaal to pay the cost of war.

The sum of 3,000,000 pounds sterling is to be provided for restocking the Boer farms.

Rebels are liable to trial, according to the colony to which they belong. The rank and file will be disfranchised for life.

The "News of the World" says that Kruger has claimed \$250,000 compensation from the British government. He is now practically dependent upon the generosity of friends. He is said to have spent \$20,000,000 that he brought from Pretoria in subsidizing the continental press and paying the expenses of missions in foreign countries.
