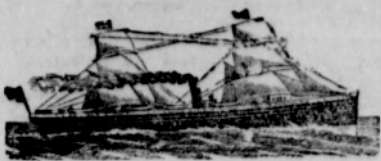

A. J. Marsh's Residence Burned.

The residence of County Assessor A. J. Marsh, situated on Elk River, about four miles from Port Orford, was totally destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon, together with all its contents, with the exception of a trunk and a few other small articles. The fire originated through a defective stovepipe, and had gained such headway, fanned by a strong northwest wind, that Mrs. Marsh and Grandma Marsh, who were alone with the little children, were helpless to save either the building or any of its contents. The fire was discovered by the men at the mill, about a quarter of a mile distant, but by the time they reached the scene the house was almost entirely consumed. Mr. Marsh had left Port Orford between one and two o'clock for the Eckley country, intending to go via Floras creek, and when the news reached here he had been gone nearly three hours, but a telephone message to Denmark caught him at that place.

The loss is a severe one to Mr. Marsh, as he is a hard working man with a large family, and it is certainly discouraging to see the accumulations of years of toil go up in smoke within a few minutes, to say nothing of the numerous family keepsakes, so highly prized for the memories which surround them.

Immediately after the fire a subscription paper was started at the mill and \$100 was subscribed by the boys within fifteen minutes. The paper will be circulated in Port Orford, and it is to be hoped that all who can will give something, for the cause is worthy. Mr. and Mrs. Marsh are old and highly esteemed residents of this place, and in their present misfortune they are entitled to the assistance as well as the sympathy of the community. By all uniting we can make their distress a little lighter without much inconvenience to ourselves.

Gold Beach Items.

Lost.

BIDS WANTED.

Sealed proposals or bids, for rebuilding Sixes River Bridge under same plans and specifications as the old bridge, except the batter post to the main pier on up stream side at the bottom is to be removed farther up stream, well braced, replanked and new caps to same; main span 160 feet; approach on the south bank 18 feet wide, 12 feet in the clear known as the "Pratt Combination Truss Bridge." All iron in the old bridge to be used in constructing the new bridge except eight turnbuckles, and all old planks to be used as far as practicable, and all new planks necessary to be furnished by the county.

Also to repair the Floras Creek Bridge of 101 feet span, the bottom chord of 101 feet span to be renewed and packed with iron packing keys, so the leaves will be one-half inch apart and all bolts to be replaced with new ones, new caps put on the main pier and bolsters under chords, and also three strings of joice the full length of said bridge (two spans) to keep planks off of chords, the south approach and bents to be renewed and all old planking to be replaced as far as practicable and all new planking necessary to be furnished by the county.

Bids will be received by the County Court of Curry county until Wednesday, the 24 day of July, 1902, or deposited with the Clerk, and marked "Bids for rebuilding Sixes River Bridge." Bids for repairing the Floras Creek Bridge.

The County Court reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

Said bids will be opened and considered by the County Court at the next regular July term, on said 24 day of July, 1902, and if a bid is accepted by the court the successful bidder must be prepared to enter into a contract with the court for the constructing and repairing of such bridge or bridges within the time required by law. Payment for building and repairing said bridges to be made out of the special bridge fund.

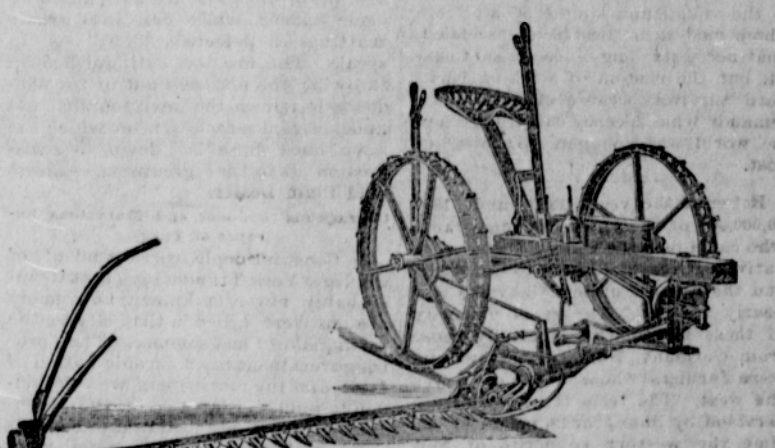

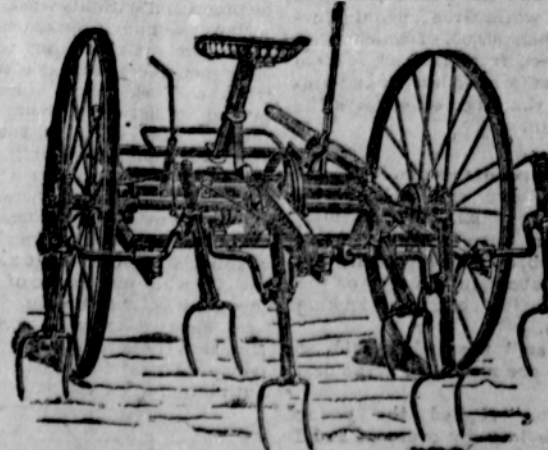
