If Mr. Labouchere continues with his average assiduity to search for the origin of customs that have come down to these days from prehistoric times, his successors in that interesting line of inquiry will have nothing to do but to pore over the pages of his unique publication, 'London Truth.' Whence came this custom of walking backward before royalty? is one of the questions of the solution of which Truth has recently addressed itself with characteristic energy. We do not know that the prosperity or happiness of mankind or the advancement of civilization is involved in this inquiry. We could imagine the nations of the earth going on for ages to come, growing wiser and better in the future, as they have done in the past, and not caring a continental year or when or how that old habit got its start. Indeed, it requires no great stretch of the imagination or of the probabilities to picture a time when all royalties shall have walked or been walked off the stage, backward, or forward, never to return. Humanity has but to go on as it has been going on for some centuries in order to arrive at the end of the monarchical institutions. But, inasmuch as Truth considers this inquiry worthy of consideration, we must conclude that it possesses some importance, some claim to human interest, even though that claim is not within our visual range.

One of Truth's correspondents gravely suggested not long ago that the custom of walking backward before royalty was due to an instinct in man implanted by Providence. In other words, nature is responsible for the habit. In a certain sense this is true. Nature endowed the earliest specimens of the human race with power to walk, and it must have given them that veneration for superiors which prompted them to make backward before kings and queens. We suppose nature is, to some extent, responsible for toadyism in all countries. It is nature that makes the English people 'dearly love a lord,' and it is nature that causes a great many Americans to make fools of themselves and burlesque their own democratic government whenever they get a chance to pay homage to a titled aristocrat, real or bogus, from the old world. But it is a perverted nature, and the growing democratic spirit of the age is getting the better of it.

Another correspondent of Truth, writing from the far east where he is supposed to have seen much of savage life, makes a philosophical suggestion that seems to us to throw a great flood of light on this question. His notion is that the custom of always turning the face toward royalty originated in the stern necessities of rude and poor people who had little skill in tailoring. He says the first kings were rulers of savage tribes, whose clothing was extremely limited, and rarely consisted of more than a scanty garment modeled on the primitive fig leaf. He respectfully submits that when a subject was appeared had to present himself before royalty, courtiers, not to say deacons, would suggest that he should present to the sovereign only that portion of his anatomy which was concealed by clothing. He therefore kept his back averted in approaching and retiring.

This explanation is highly creditable to the rough and simple people from whom modern notions have descended. That necessity long since ceased to exist, but the custom of walking backward survives because etiquette now demands what decency etiquette when the world was younger.—Washington Post.

Between the years 1830 and 1890 10,000,000 of the 13,000,000 immigrants who came into the United States were natives of Great Britain or of Germany, and the number of Scandinavians was nearly 1,000,000. The great majority of these newcomers, especially those from Germany, Norway and Sweden, were farmers whose destination was the west. The term the west, as understood by immigrants, meant at one time the western countries of New York and Pennsylvania, later the states of what is now called the midland west, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois; then the trans-Mississippi states of Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas and, finally, the northwestern states, to which, prior to 1865, most of the new immigrants went.

In the last few years, notwithstanding the prosperous condition of American manufactures, the large harvests and liberal prices for cereals and live stocks, there has been a marked falling off in the immigration of farmers to the United States and a decided increase in the number of immigrants seeking homes in the large cities and manufacturing towns. The official figures of the calendar year of 1900 have not yet made their appearance, but the total number of immigrants will not be far from 475,000, and of this number more than 100,000 were from Austria-Hungary, another 100,000 from Russia and the Polish provinces of Germany, while Great Britain furnished less than 50,000, of which number 40,000 were from Ireland. These new immigrants seek homes and employment in the large cities, says the New York Sun.

Gold has been discovered near Apia, Samoa.

For some years there have been no brook trout in Colorado waters. Last year nearly 5,000,000 brook trout eggs were placed in them.

At the beginning of the new century there were 57,000 army and navy pensioners in New England, drawing their pay through the agency in Boston.

Much indignation is expressed in Munich papers because the state did not interfere with the sale to a lumberman of the largest linden tree in Bavaria.

In Salt Lake City, Utah, a number of street cars are being provided with letter mailing boxes. These cars will stop at certain points and letters placed in the boxes are removed by messengers in time to catch the mails.

A Florida man has purchased 300 acres of swamp land near Swan Bridge, and will turn it into a breeding place for alligators. These reptiles are becoming scarce, owing to the activity of northern hunters, and, as there is a steady demand for alligator skins, the speculator hopes to do well.

It will cost 62 cents per swear if you swear in Portland, a little town below the Water Gap, says a Stroudsburg (Pa.) correspondent in the Philadelphia Record. Swearing has become so obnoxious to some of the inhabitants that they have determined to enforce the old law against profanity.

Chickens are now plucked in a wholesale manner by the use of pneumatic machinery. There is a receptacle in which the bird is placed after being killed, and into this are turned several cross currents of air from electrical fans revolving at the rate of 5,000 turns per minute. In the twinkling of an eye the bird is stripped of its feathers, even to the tiniest particle of down, and the machine is ready for another.

How Great a Commotion a Fire Maketh in a Little Town.

My most amusing experience—from a retrospective point of view—occurred upon my first visit to Lorain, O., some two years ago. I arrived at night, and the proprietor of the only hotel in the place put me to bed with a man who inhaled with a basso-profundo snore, and exhaled as near as I could judge, through a tin whistle. I did not sleep well, and in the still night, when the landlord put his head in the door and remarked: "Fire!" in a tone of voice which made the furniture jump up and down, I nearly awoke. A few minutes later, the landlord repeated the remark with so much emphasis that my bedfellows arose with alacrity, and pointing momentarily with one ample but solitary foot upon my thoughtful countenance, he stepped lightly into the street, taking part of the window-sash with him.

As the room began filling with smoke it suddenly occurred to me that the fire department consisted for the most part of four buckets of water and a chorus of hoarse shouts. I therefore decided to retire from the room. The other guests seemed to feel the same way about it, and as I reached the hall I noticed a dignified, elderly lady from Sandusky going swiftly down the stairs seated upon a sample trunk of a young man from Toledo. Outside all was commotion. Strong, brave men were ringing the town bell, while noble-hearted women were wringing their hands. A young lady from Berea, clothed in a Gainsborough hat and an air of deep concern, was galloping madly up and down the street with a pillow under her arm. An investigation disclosed that a large amount of excitement was being wasted over a small amount of fire. The fire was caused by cigar sparks, which flew into a hair mattress—a defective "flew," so to speak. The fire was extinguished by throwing the mattress out of the window. It fell on the town marshal and knocked him senseless, after which the town once more lay down to sweet dreams of future greatness.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Courageous Conduct and Marvellous Escapes of Turks.

A Constantinople correspondent of the New York Tribune says that it will probably never be known how many persons were killed in that city by the earthquake of last summer. The Turkish government has a chronic hatred of facts, and the newspapers were forbidden to publish statistics of the earthquake. What are believed to be moderate estimates place the number of deaths at about one hundred and fifty, and the number of the wounded at about six hundred.

The correspondent cannot help praising the courage of the firemen stationed on watch at the top of a tower more than two hundred feet high. They stuck to their post, although the tower swayed like a flagstaff, and when the fires broke out after the overthrow of dwellings, they gave the signals as usual.

Another case of a similar sort was that of a minaret builder who had gone up to the top of a minaret to remove a conical cap which the first shoos had thrown away. While he was there another shock occurred, and there was another panic in the streets.

His assistants, who were in one of the galleries of the minaret, began to run downstairs, and the mosque servants below shouted to him to come down, but he stayed where he was. "If this is going to fall," he said, "I will fall before I can get out of it," and he proceeded with his work.

Many wonderful escapes occurred. Two men were walking together. A Turk met them, and, as is not unusual when a Turk meets foreigners, he pushed in between them, instead of turning to one side. At that instant a stone fell from the building above them, and hit the Turk, who fell dead between the two horrified foreigners.

But the most marvelous escape was that of a boy three years old. He was running along the street at the base of the city wall just as one of the ancient towers was overthrown. When the dust cleared away he was discovered pinned to the ground by great stones lying on his skirts on each side of him, but himself quite unharmed.

The fertility and productiveness of American farms are as great as in some cases greater than they were many years ago. The means of transportation have been vastly improved and the market of demand is decided largely than it ever was before. But the conditions for the purchase of land are no longer so favorable. The most eligible government lands for free homesteads have been disposed of. The railroad grants which included alternate parcels along the line of the roads have been sold in most cases occupied. No state, except in the southwest, where the climatic conditions are not generally such as to attract European farmers, is under the necessity of offering inducements to immigrants, and the latter no longer recruited from the farming classes of the European continent and in Ireland, come chiefly from large European cities in which the population has become congested or in which the rate of pay to mechanics has been forced down by competition or the use of new mechanical appliances.

There is a constant and increasing demand for mill hands and artisans throughout the United States, and it is to some extent supplied by new immigration. The three countries which now furnish the largest share of immigration, Austria, Russia and Italy, have comparatively little in common with the United States in the way of language, customs, historical tradition or the forms of government. There are no longer in Russia or Austria persecutions which would explain a wholesale exodus of the inhabitants of various districts, as was the case 10 and 15 years ago. The economic condition of Italy is rather better now than it was at the time when Italian immigration to the United States began to be large, and the increase of the immigration from these countries can, therefore, be explained only upon the ground that the demand for such labor as their immigrants have to offer is growing in the United States. The falling off of German immigration is explained by the fact that Germany is ceasing to be an agricultural and is becoming a manufacturing country. The total immigration to the United States last year was larger than in any previous year since 1893.

SAVED BY A GLOVE BUTTON.

Moments That Were Full of Peril and Seemed Like Hours.

How much may depend upon a glove fastening was illustrated at one of the Monday state quarries in an adventure with the person concerned would not care to repeat, says the Lewistown Journal. He was a derick man, who stood on the brink of one of the great chasms from which the slate rock is hoisted. His duty was to catch hold of the big hook depending from the end of the boom as it swung over the bank and attach it to the crate to be sent back into the pit. Standing upon the very edge he reached out to catch the hook which dangled near him. It was winter and he wore thick buckskin gloves. The hook slipped from him as he leaned over, but caught into the fastening of the glove. The swing of the great boom took him off his feet in an instant and carried him out into the giddy space with his life depending on the glove's holding fast. His whole weight was hung on that button, and there was a clear 175 feet of space between him and the floor of rock below. The moments that passed before the boom could be swung back over the bank seemed like hours to him, but he got there at last, safe and sound.

A Kick for Each Name.

The boy replied: "I am Charles Stuart Vease, Viscount Seaham, and I whereupon Rogers kicked him three times, once for Vease, once for Seaham, and once for Londonderry.
