Washington, June 12.—Representative Foss, of Illinois, chairman of the committee on naval affairs, today introduced in the House a bill to authorize the President to nominate Captain Charles E. Clark to be an Admiral of the senior grade on the active list.

Washington, June 12.—Gonzales De Quezada, the Cuban minister to the United States, arrived here this afternoon with his family. He will call at the State Department tomorrow to arrange for the presentation of his credentials to the President.

Washington, June 14.—The general deficiency bill, reported today, carries \$3000 for road construction and the general improvement of Creater Lake National Park, and \$463 to pay H. A. Rends for surveys in Oregon.

New York June 13.—All the documents Civil Governor Taft presented to the Vatican have been carefully printed, with explanatory notes by Bishop O'Gorman, says a Rome dispatch to the Tribune. Mayor Porter has distributed them to the cardinals appointed to negotiate with Judge Taft will meet privately on Monday.

The House passed the irrigation bill by a vote of 145 to 55. Many amendments were offered, but only one, except those offered by the committee, was adopted. It was of a minor character. The bill has already passed the Senate. The friends of the measure greeted the announcement of its passage with a round of applause.

London, June 12.—At the Corona Club last night Joseph Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, in an optimistic speech on the future of South Africa, said that in concluding peace the government had done nothing to prejudice the ultimate solution of the South African questions, to which they were all looking as a justification for the war. The loyalty the Boers had displayed in accepting the altered conditions was most encouraging and if this spirit continued as he believed it would, "there is no doubt we are beginning an era of prosperity such as South Africa has never previously known."

We are a wealthy and powerful Nation; Cuba is a young republic, still weak, who owes to her birth, whose whole future, whose very life, must depend on our attitude toward her. I ask that we help her as she struggles upward along the painful and difficult road of self-government and independence. I ask this aid for her because she is weak, because she needs it, because we have already aided her. I ask that open-handed help, of a kind which a self-respecting people can accept, be given to Cuba for the very reason that we have given her such help in the past. Our soldiers fought to give her freedom, and for three years our representatives, civil and military, have toiled unceasingly, facing disease of a peculiarly sinister and fatal type with patient and uncomplaining fortitude, to teach her how to use aright her new freedom. Never in history has any alien country been thus administered with such high integrity of purpose, such wise judgment and such a single-hearted devotion to the country's interest. Now I ask that the Cubans be given all possible chance to use to the best advantage the freedom of which Americans have such right to be proud and for which so many American lives have been sacrificed.
