

Indian War Veteran Bill Is Passed by House.

Washington, June 16.—The House today passed the Indian War veteran bill, for which the Oregon delegation has been struggling so many years. The bill is identical with that which passed the Senate on February 18 last, except for an unimportant verbal amendment. As passed, the bill makes immediately applicable the provisions of the Blackhawk pension act. Those who will be rewarded are the surviving officers and enlisted men, including marines, militia and volunteers of the military and naval service of the United States, who served for 30 days or more, and were honorably discharged under the United States military, state, territorial or provisional authorities in the Cayuse war of 1837, 1843-49, on the Pacific Coast, the Oregon and Washington Indian wars from 1851 to 1856, and numerous other Indian wars. The bill also makes provision for the widows of such officers and enlisted men, provided that such widows have not remarried, and provided further that where there is no record of enlistment or muster into the service of the United States, in any of the wars mentioned in the act, the record of pay by the United States shall be accepted as full and satisfactory proof of such enlistment and service; and provided, further, that all contracts heretofore made between the beneficiaries under this act and pension attorneys and claim agents are declared null and void.

The bill will now go back to the Senate, where the amendment of the House will be concurred in, and the measure will then go to the President for his signature. The fact that he has heretofore indorsed the bill insures his early approval.

The bill came up today under suspension of the rules, and had to secure a two-thirds vote for passage. This was obtained without any debate, and, after brief explanation of its provisions. This is the first time the bill has ever been allowed consideration in the House. Had it not been that Representative Tongue called on the President some time ago and induced him to use his influence with Speaker Henderson to have the bill considered, it would have probably slumbered on indefinitely on the calendar. The President's request was largely instrumental in securing consideration for the bill at this time.

The friends of the bill are highly elated at their success today. Senator Mitchell was particularly pleased. He declares this is the successful end of a hard struggle. "In my judgment," said he, "no more meritorious bill has passed this or any other recent Congress. It is an act of tardy justice to a most deserving class of men." Senator Mitchell not only secured the passage of the bill through the Senate, but has been an earnest worker in behalf before the house committee and with the speaker.

Representative Tongue, who has given much time to this measure since he first entered Congress, said today that this was among the first bills he introduced in the House, and he has labored constantly and persistently from that time on in every way that he believed would advance its interests. "Its adoption comes now," said he, "at a remarkably opportune time. The election is over. It cannot be charged that the bill has been passed for political purposes, or to procure political favors. Its passage today so that the news can be furnished to the Indian War veterans at their annual gathering tomorrow, makes it quite reasonable. The fact that this meeting would make a tremendous stimulus to me to make a special effort to get it up today. I cannot say how gratified I feel over it. There are no braver, more deserving veterans in the world, nor any to whom the country owes a deeper debt of gratitude than to these veterans."

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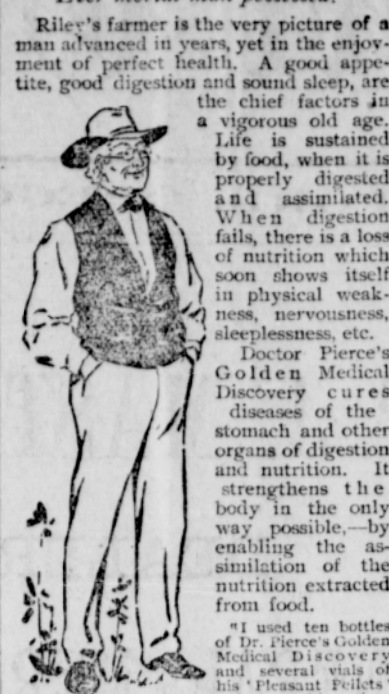
