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Timber Land Worth Gold.

Evening Telegram. "Woods are full of 'em." In the language of a timber cruiser, this sizes up the situation as regards activity of people in acquiring timber claims. Expert woodsmen, surveyors, timber agents, cruisers, and those who make a business of dealing in timber live on "the fat of the land." Their services are in great demand by large corporations of the East, private parties, speculators and many others who realize the worth of timber in the near future.

Most all of the available timber has already been "gobbled up." A great portion of it is controlled by large lumbering corporations of the Middle West, who have exhausted the supply in their own states and have turned to the West. Knowing the growing value of the timber and that the main supply of the world in a measure lies in the Northwest, they were quick to seize the opportunity, and have spared no expense to get hold of large tracts. The lumbermen of Oregon have been just as active, and so keen was the rivalry in some instances that the shedding of blood was narrowly averted. The subtleties and strategies and counter moves made by one and the other of the rival companies in outwitting one another to secure choice timber would read like a romance were they published in detail.

Some of these people work in the dark through shrewd agents. They don't go around telling people their business. John Jones or Henry Brown may file on a timber claim, and while everything is regular and straight at the land office, only the agents know of the methods used in obtaining the claims for their employers. Many people file on timber for the purpose of selling the right and title to big companies.

The activity shows most strongly the increasing value of timber lands. Those on the inside predict that lumber will rise another notch in price this Fall, and keep ascending the scale as the supply is being limited. The opening of South Africa and the increasing Oriental business will make bigger and bigger demand upon the supply until ships will be crowding each other in the harbor. There are plenty of signs showing the handwriting on the wall that all who run may read.

Washington, July 7.—Pension Commissioner Ware will this week issue blanks upon which Indian War veterans and their survivors, according to the recently enacted law, will make application for pensions. These blanks may be had on application to the department or from the members of the Oregon Congressional delegation. Each blank carries with it full instructions as to the course to be pursued, instructions being so explicit, both as to the evidence required and the manner in which claims shall be filed, that it will not be necessary for the pensioner to employ an attorney. If any claim is held up, no one better than a Senator or Representative can have the difficulty adjusted, for they have a standing and priority before the department that is not accorded attorneys. In fact, the attorneys are utterly without authority.
