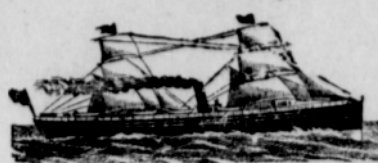

Public Hall commenced a term of public school in Port Orford, with a fair attendance, last Monday.

The haying season is about ended, although some ranchers have not yet housed all their hay.

It is evident that the real estate values of the county for purposes of taxation will be materially increased during the next year.

Mr. W. R. Hurst's mother, Mrs. Houghton, has purchased Mr. F. C. Champlin's valuable ranch on upper Elk River.

County Assessor Marsh is busily engaged in winding up his field work, and will next week begin making up the 1902 Assessment Roll.

Several wool buyers and timber cruisers have been circulating in this vicinity during the week. Most of the sheep men have sold their wool for 16 cents, that being the highest price offered.

An Indian woman, known as Mrs. Ben Smith, living near Wedderburn, died last Monday from injuries received by being thrown from a wagon while on the way to attend a dance at Bagnell Ferry.

We lost Monday had the misfortune to lose one of our team horses, a faithful and trusty animal as well as a valuable one. The horse had become tangled in a rope and when found had been dead several hours. One leg was broken, and also badly tangled in the halter.

Wedding on Floras Creek.

A very pretty wedding occurred last Sunday, the 20th, at the home of Mr. Jas. White, of Floras Creek, when Mr. Jonah H. Hoffness and Miss Katie White were united in marriage, Justice Geo. Chenoweth officiating. The bride, one of Northern Curry's most popular and accomplished young ladies, was beautifully attired in a cream colored silk. The young couple received the congratulations of about 40 invited guests, after which everyone repaired to the dining room, where they did full justice to a feast fit for the gods. A number of valuable presents were presented to the newly married couple. The groom, a prosperous young man from California, is now building a home on Floras Creek, where he has lately purchased a valuable tract of land. The happy couple carry to their new home the best wishes of a host of friends.

ANOTHER GREAT BATTLE WITH TRACY.
The Brave Little Posse of Only 580 Determined Men Meet the Outlaw Face to Face. The Great Battle Follows, in which
TRACY IS HARD HIT.

Kochawachajossun, Wash., July 22.—The most exciting and stubbornly contested battle yet fought with Tracy occurred early this morning, near Skookumtillakum, 3 miles from this place. Late yesterday afternoon information was brought to sheriff Kudysee, of Skinumpoose county, who was resting here, that Tracy was in a near-by farmhouse, engaged in eating pie and making love to the farmer's oldest daughter. Sheriff Kudysee held a hasty consultation with four other sheriffs, who were summoned from a nearby saloon. A posse was promptly organized, consisting of 213 deputy sheriffs and 376 picked Indians, from the Eatumgrasshopper tribe. The Indians were led by the famous old hunter, Scalpumpquick, an experienced man-hunter of pioneer days. The sheriff's posse and Indian allies were all heavily armed, each with a double-barreled shotgun, a long range repeating rifle, two army revolvers and a bowie knife. The Indians being also supplied with tomahawks. The farmhouse was soon surrounded, and all settled down behind such shelter as could be found, and waited for Tracy to finish his pie and come out. This he soon did. He walked out leisurely, with a rifle in one hand and a large piece of pie in the other. Here was the best chance ever offered for putting an end to his career, but unfortunately the guards were so thickly posted that no one dared to shoot, for fear of hitting several comrades, and Mr. Tracy was allowed to push his way through between the men. The officers, however, acted with incredible promptness, and scarcely gave Tracy time to disappear from view before the entire posse and their allies were on the trail, with seven bloodhounds in the lead. The trail was followed during the entire night, and at daylight, after having traveled one and three-fifths miles, they came suddenly upon the fugitive, standing facing them, with a large log at his back, as if to protect his rear. He was in the act of taking the last bite of pie. The dogs were taken by surprise, and tucking their tails between their legs started for some tall timber. Sixteen of the posse, who were in 30 feet of the outlaw, took deliberate aim and fired 16 heavy charges of buckshot directly at his stomach. Every shot hit the mark, but failed to penetrate his tough hide, and rolled harmlessly down his pants legs to the ground, although he was seen to visibly wince. Tracy then opened a galling fire, but at this time sheriff Kudysee, who is an experienced detective, decided that the outlaw had confederates concealed in a small grove of timber, 100 yards to the rear, and ordered the entire company to charge into the timber. This the men did with enthusiasm, though being subjected to a terrific storm of bullets from Tracy's gun as they made the charge. Sheriff Kudysee had his hat shot off three times in as many seconds. Sheriff Diegelsgewigler, from Huelclutgen county, was knocked prostrate by the wind from one of the outlaws bullets, and while a deputy was turning a summer-sault over the prostrate form of the sheriff he received a gaping wound 11 inches long in the seat of his pants; another deputy had the heel of his shoe shot away, while the old chief Scalpumpquick had his scalp knife shot from his hand. It is estimated that Tracy fired 217 shots within a period of 93 seconds while the charge was being made on the timber. The company bravely entered the timber, only to find that the confederates had escaped just 34 seconds before their arrival. A consultation was held and it was decided to make a dash and capture Tracy, but at this moment the convict was seen to climb over the log and walk off in a stooping position, with one hand on his stomach, going to prove that he was hard hit. A consultation was held and it was decided to follow his trail. The hounds were called from their retreat and started, but Tracy had sprinkled red pepper in his tracks, and within five minutes 3 of the hounds had sneezed their heads off and the others were placed hors du combat by reason of the sneezes. To add to this the Indian allies became superstitious, and declaring that Tracy was closely related to the devil, refused to go further. A consultation was held and various plans were proposed. Sheriff Ginglefiddle, of Squallawala county, stated that he had learned when a boy that salt, applied to the tail, would render the most ferocious of beasts easy of capture, and he believed it would work on Tracy. This was favorably received, and the trail was followed, and the criminal is sufficiently developed for the experiment. A deputy believed that all country housewives should be prohibited on pain of

death, from keeping pie in the house, or any material out of which pie could be manufactured, but as this would work a hardship on the sheriffs and their posses it was rejected. Another deputy proposed that each member of the posse be provided with a cow-bell to wear around his neck, so that each may be readily recognized by his comrades when on a still hunt, and thus avoid accidental shootings. Objected to for the reason that Tracy would drop on the game, secure a bell, and mix himself with the posse. Sheriff Kudysee then drew out his field glass and made a careful survey of the surrounding country, but seeing nothing of Tracy a consultation was held, and it was decided that the posse go in a body to Skinsquikamat, some 15 miles distant, dress their wounds, obtain refreshments, reorganize, obtain 13 fresh bloodhounds, and after resting until Tracy has exhausted his red pepper, obtain the latest information from some farmer's wife, find a fresh track and renew the chase. Although the outlaw has temporarily disappeared it will be hard for him to outwit sheriff Kudysee, who has already dropped on his weakness for pie. The sheriff is now practically certain that the outlaw will either continue leisurely on his present course, retrace his steps to Sampschoocherry Basin, renowned for its pretty girls and delicious pies, or else he will shear off in some other direction. Thus knowing now almost to a certainty where to find his man, the sheriff will spring his trap when the time is ripe. Mr. Kudysee has given out privately, for the information of the public, that he has decided not to turn Tracy over to the Oregon authorities until he is convinced beyond a doubt that the scoundrel has been killed or captured. Then he will deliver him gladly, and he don't care if he never comes back.
