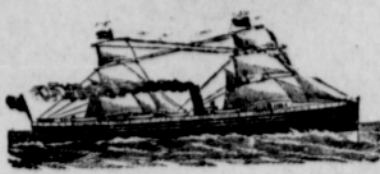

Joseph Russell, of Grants Pass, is in the county, buying mutton sheep. He expects to drive out between three and four thousand.

There is considerable sickness in this vicinity, the complaint being stomach trouble, similar to cholera morbus. A few cases of whooping cough are also reported.

State Supt. Ackerman and Supt. Robinson, of Multnomah county, will attend the Coos county Teachers' Institute, which will be held at Myrtle Point on August 4.

John R. Miller, returned Sunday, from Rogue River, where he has been spending a month, gathering up and shearing his sheep. He has sold his two years' clip of wool, some 13,000 pounds, at 16 cents.

The celebrated German and English specialists spent a couple of days in Port Orford on their return down the coast. They announce that they will hereafter make regular trips through the county.

Isam Walker, of Northern Curry, was in town yesterday, on his way to the Mountain Ranch, where he has purchased a flock of 500 sheep. Mr. Walker has disposed of his butcher business in Humboldt county, and will spend the summer in Curry. Mrs. Walker will arrive up from Eureka soon.

Numerous strangers are seen on our streets these days. They include druggists, land cruisers, speculators, prospectors, hunters, visitors, immigrants and homeseekers, peddlers, traveling agents and people bent on sport and recreation. A genuine hobo is seldom met with, and there are few men looking for work—in fact, during the past month there has not been sufficient labor to supply the demand.

Uncle Joe Haines and wife, and son, Lib Haines, of Eckley, and Mrs. Robertson, of Yamhill county, a cousin to Mr. Haines, arrived in Port Orford a few days ago, for a visit with friends. This is the first visit we have received from Uncle Joe for some years, and his old friends were glad to meet him once more. He is looking hale and hearty, and is just as unwavering in his adherence to the principles of the Republican party as of yore.

P. J. Masterson has opened up business in his large warehouse, and is selling at reduced rates the goods which were saved from the recent fire which destroyed his store building. He authorizes us to say that he will sell all dry goods and gent's furnishing goods saved from the fire at cost. He will hereafter receive new goods by every steamer, and will take orders for anything not kept in stock. Since our last issue we have had numerous inquiries for information regarding the chase after Tracy, which we have been unable to supply. We no more than had time to get our last week's report in type when several miles of our wireless telegraph was prostrated by a cloudburst in the State of Washington, and the wireless linemen having joined Sheriff Kudysh's posse, the line has not been repaired. From the Associated Press dispatches, however, we glean the following facts regarding latest developments: Tracy and two confederates were seen on bicycles near Salem, heavily armed, and making a rapid march toward the penitentiary. The greatest excitement prevailed. Supt. Lee had doubled the guards, mounted several bamboo cannons, captured in the Philippines, on the outside walls, and was prepared to make a stubborn defense; the Sheriff of Marion county had also organized a strong company to assist in the defense of the pen, where an attack was momentarily expected. On the same day Tracy was seen to board an East bound train in northeastern Washington, and stated to bystanders that he was going to visit his mother in the East. On the same day Tracy took dinner with a party of gentlemen at a logging camp in western Washington. The dispatches also say that Sheriff Kudysh has completely disappeared, and it is believed he is out on a still hunt. It is not known how long he will still hunt for the outlaw.

San Francisco parties are making an effort to secure certain timber lands on Hubbard's creek, with a view to building a mill.

Max Muller, a prominent pioneer citizen of Jacksonville, Oregon, died at his home at that place on July 20th. He has resided in Jacksonville continuously since 1855.

An investigation by the Coroner into the death of Cecilia M. Sullivan from bullet wounds, self inflicted, at Baltimore, show that she lived 18 hours, part of which time she was conscious, with a bullet wound through the heart, another that penetrated the stomach, liver and spleen, and one that grazed her heart.

Some of the boys attending school probably thinking that they are demonstrating their smartness, are breeding trouble for themselves. Such acts as entering the schoolhouse through the window and doing malicious mischief, hoisting the school house flag at half mast, upside down, and hoisting a dirty cloth on the flag pole, are not smart jokes, but acts that place the perpetrators in contempt before the community. Such meanness, if continued will result in expulsion from school by the directors.

Timber cruisers are said to be quite numerous in the southern part of the county. It is only a question of a short time when all the available timber land of the county will be located, and citizens of the county should secure claims while they have an opportunity. The length of time that will elapse before all the valuable timber is taken will depend of course upon the time taken by the government in making surveys, as large areas of the most valuable timber lands are unsurveyed.

He is perhaps scheduled to "go out," but not from causes incident to the Tracy-Merrill incident. Sheriff Cuddehe, of Seattle, is the only man thus far reported whose political prospects have been ruined, and whose sleep has been greatly disturbed by this incident. The numerous vein in which Superintendent Lee meets rally is commended to Sheriff Cuddehe as a tonic to his drooping official spirits.—Oregonian.

Oregonian: Rival canneries at Astoria, in a race for records, are packing over 2000 cases of fish per day, and the cold storage plants are getting all the fish they can handle. It is apparent from this interesting situation that the 1902 salmon run is hardly fulfilling the lugubrious predictions made by an interested newspaper at Astoria early in the season. The pack for the season now promises to be at least 100,000 cases larger than that of last year, while all the cold storage plants are far ahead of last year's record at a corresponding date. The July salmon run of last year, and the excellent run of the past few days, are pretty strong arguments for a continuation of artificial propagation on a most extended scale. The result shows that the work has progressed beyond the experimental stage, and the yearly expenditure of a few thousand dollars for hatcheries maintenance will add millions to the wealth of the state.
