The Salt Lake-Cos Bay Railroad.

EDITOR TRIBUNE:—All signs now seem to point to good faith of the above undertaking.

It will be remembered that when the project was first discussed the Oregonian stated that the completion of such a road would have the effect to more or less injure Portland, but later on, and when it became apparent that such a road would be built, that paper switched off to the expedient of whistling to keep its courage up, and now insists that the Southern Oregon enterprise will help Portland.

In its maps accompanying its annual immigration editions and in its much-vaunted "Hand Book" it studiously ignores Port Orford harbor. In connection with its fling at Cos Bay, the Oregonian says: "A marked deficiency of the Pacific coast is its relative lack of harbors. Whereas the coast from Maine to Florida is broken at a score or more places with fine ports and at a hundred other places by fairly good secondary harbors, we have only three or four of the former and half a score of the latter."

The Oregonian made and still makes an open fight against our Port Orford harbor improvement.

In its maps accompanying its annual immigration editions and in its much-vaunted "Hand Book" it studiously ignores Port Orford harbor. In connection with its fling at Cos Bay, the Oregonian says: "A marked deficiency of the Pacific coast is its relative lack of harbors. Whereas the coast from Maine to Florida is broken at a score or more places with fine ports and at a hundred other places by fairly good secondary harbors, we have only three or four of the former and half a score of the latter."

Now when the above is read in the light of numerous reports of army engineers, that when Port Orford harbor shall be protected against the southwest gales it will have no superior as a deep water harbor on the whole Pacific coast, what shall be said of the position above outlined by the Oregonian, the traditional enemy of our harbor improvement?

The Woodmen's Celebration.

The Grand Log Rolling given under the auspices of the three Camps of Woodmen of the World of Curry county was held at Port Orford Saturday, August 9, 1902, and proved a success in every particular.

At 10 o'clock the procession was formed at Knapp's Hotel, headed by Neighbor's Home and Base. Escorts of Port Orford and Dairyville Camps respectively, bearing the American Flag and The Ax, while directly behind them came Neighbors bearing a log and a huge crosscut saw, each design being characteristic emblems of the Order.

Following them came the members representing the three different Camps, about thirty in all. The procession, followed by a large concourse of people, proceeded to the beautiful picnic grounds on the Heads, where the following exercises were carried out:

1st. Address of welcome by Dr. J. J. Caldwell, of Port Orford Camp. The Dr's address was very appropriate, and the sincerity with which he spoke his words of welcome made every one present doubly sure that his welcome was cordial.

Second on the program was a duet, "The Minute Gun at Sea," by Messrs Marsh and Johnston, and seemed to meet the approval of all. Miss Elva Kerr recited very beautifully "Paul Revere's Ride," and received hearty applause from the audience.

Mr. Marsh sang a very pretty solo, which proved one of the most interesting features of the program.

Mrs. Wooten, the talented elocutionist, now residing in Port Orford, recited a selection entitled, "The Jiner," and brought forth more hearty laughter from the audience than any other part of the program.

Mrs. Wooten is certainly an elocutionist of rare ability. Mr. Williams sang a Woodman's song of his own composition, setting forth in song some of the benevolent objects of Woodcraft.

After a recitation by Miss Winnie Hall and Miss Lillie Fahy, of the Coquille, both of which were exceedingly well rendered, the Hon. J. Silas Williams, a prominent member and an organizer of the W. O. W., was introduced and held the audience attentive listeners for an hour or more to a masterful discourse upon the aims and objects of Woodcraft.

Mr. Williams is an able and fluent speaker, and being well versed in the order for which he was speaking, gave the people an address which will undoubtedly prove of great benefit to the Camps in our county. At the conclusion of Mr. Williams' address, and after the closing ode by the Neighbors of the different Camps, the crowd assembled around the dining tables, bountifully supplied by the ladies of Port Orford and vicinity with all the good things that a hearty appetite could suggest, and proceeded to satisfy the "inner man."

After lunch the greater part of the crowd repaired to the base-ball ground where a very short but amusing game was played between the Mother Hubbards and Dairyville nine. The score of this game was lost, but the unique feature of Mother Hubbard gowns in a base-ball game occasioned considerable merriment.

Seven innings were played the score being 22 to 8 in favor of Port Orford.

The Grand Ball given in the evening was a great success, and was undoubtedly the largest gathering of its kind held in Port Orford in many years. The Woodmen went to a great expense in laying out fitting up a large platform 40x90 feet, as a dance floor, and though the night was somewhat damp, the floor was crowded to the utmost and dancing was kept up until about 3 o'clock in the morning.

Mrs. Noygren furnished the supper, and all seemed well pleased with the spread. While the affair was not a success from a financial standpoint, yet from a social point of view it proved the greatest event that has taken place in Port Orford for years, and the Woodmen are certainly entitled to great praise for their efforts in breaking the monotony of our isolated burg by their efforts, and we hope their efforts will not go unappreciated.

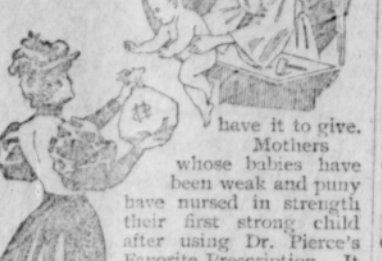
