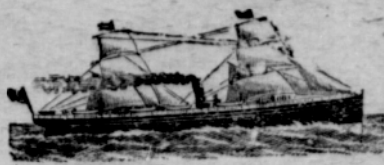

Mrs. August Miller has been very seriously ill for a week past, but is somewhat improved.

Geo. Forty and wife, of Corbin, made Port Orford a visit last Sunday, returning home Monday.

Numerous fires are raging in the mountains, and the atmosphere is becoming very smoky.

Geo. B. Miller, Justice of Ophir precinct, was doing business in Port Orford during the week.

Supt. Guerin has been a severe sufferer from his old affliction, cancer of the tongue, since adjournment of the Institute.

R. D. Jones, General, Supt. for the P. F. & L. Co., is expected to arrive here this week, coming overland via Roseburg.

Some mischievous persons have broken several of the windows in the Tichenor house, where the W. O. W. hold their meetings.

Miss Maggie Miller arrived from Marshfield Monday evening, being called home on account of the serious illness of her mother.

The gasoline boat Copper Queen, enroute from Rogue River to Coos Bay, lay in our harbor for two or three days during the week.

Last week Henry Ruscher sold his 160 acre stock ranch on Rogue River to Willis T. White. Mr. White will make his home on the place.

School was resumed in this district last Monday, after a two weeks vacation. The attendance, however, is small, on account of whooping cough.

Mrs. Alice Zumwalt last week purchased the "Zahner" property, out at W. Dowville, from P. J. Masterson, and will make it her future home.

Fay Jones, who left here some weeks ago to make his home at Trinidad, returned last week, and says Curry County is good enough for him.

The schooner Renton will finish loading lumber today, and will sail for Los Angeles, with a cargo of 550 thousand feet—the largest shipment of lumber ever going out of Port Orford harbor.

Miss Anna J. Carey has rented the Johnson cottage, opposite Mr. Masterson's, and will engage in dressmaking. She will no doubt receive a liberal patronage from the ladies of Port Orford and vicinity.

F. E. Hicks, the photographer, will remain at Wedderburn during Court week. Parties wishing to have their pictures taken while at Gold Beach will do well to cross the river and visit Mr. Hicks.

Ex-County Clerk C. V. Woodruff came up during the week and passed on up to Coos Bay overland, where he will take the steamer for Portland, from whence he will go to San Francisco for a visit.

The Arcata arrived from the city last Sunday, but the schooner Renton being engaged in loading lumber and refusing to pull out from the wharf, she passed on up without landing the freight for this place.

Geo. W. Miller, an old resident of Rogue River, having recently sold his farm to R. D. Hume, passed through Port Orford with his family last week, enroute to the Willamette valley, in search of a new location.

W. A. Bishel, who has been employed at the Elk River mill as engineer, gave up his job and returned with his family to Ophir, a few days ago. Geo. B. Miller came up with his team and moved him down.

There has been more sickness in this vicinity during the past few weeks than was ever known before. The disease called smallpox seems to have about disappeared, but is followed by whooping cough and stomach troubles, with which many are now severely afflicted.

J. H. Upton's article in this issue will be found of interest to every citizen. Mr. Upton shows up in a plain, truthful manner, the deplorable policy that has been pursued in the management of our state school funds.

Oregonian: Preparations are under way for a new steamer line between Portland and Coos Bay. The basis for this move is that the Gray Steamship Line, now operating the steamer Alliance on this route, does not accommodate the traffic now offering in view of the development operations that have been started in the Coos Bay country. On the last two trips of the steamer from Portland, she was fully laden with freight and passengers of the Belt Line Railway Company and its allied interests, and she could not carry all that was offered. And the shippers declare that the officers of the steamer manifested not only a lack of friendship but positive animosity toward them, which, added to the lack of accommodations could not be borne. Therefore the Great Central S. S. ship Company with an authorized capital of \$1,000,000, will be incorporated next Wednesday to own and operate a line of steamers between Portland and Coos Bay. Purchasing agent McDonald left last night for Puget Sound to negotiate for the purchase or lease of a vessel suitable for the Coos Bay service, and it is expected that the new line will be in operation within a week. Later it may extend its operations to other ports, domestic and foreign.

Hon. Binger Hermann, United States Land Commissioner, arrived at this place Thursday for a visit with his son, S. B. Hermann and other relatives. Commissioner Hermann is enjoying his annual vacation which always spends in Oregon and it is an event which he always looks forward to each year with a great deal of pleasurable expectations. It is much pleasure for Mr. Hermann to greet old time friends in this county, many of whom are pioneer settlers of this valley and have been acquainted intimately with him since early manhood. Mr. Hermann has always taken a deep interest in Southern Oregon and has worked untiringly for its advancement.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

A steamship line to Coos Bay, with a steamer every five days for that port, is projected, and if it becomes a reality will be a distinct gain to Portland's commercial life. Coos Bay, especially since the recent railroad activity there and with reference to that terminus, has become an important locality, and will become more so; and there ought to be close business relations between Coos Bay ports and Portland. The Coos Bay trade, that hitherto has gone entirely to San Francisco, ought to come largely to this city.—Portland Journal.

Astoria, Aug. 24.—Sixty millions of young salmon of all varieties will be placed in the Columbia River and its tributaries during the present year. This is the estimate that Fish Warden Van Dusen makes of the output of the Oregon, Washington and United States Fish Commission plants of the Columbia River district. In addition, 14,500,000 or more fry will be turned out at the hatcheries located on the coast streams.

J. G. Simmons, delegate to the late session of the Head Camp Pacific Jurisdiction of W. O. W., from this place, returned yesterday and reports a very interesting session of the camp, but says there was considerable complaint of members who came from lower altitudes than Cripple Creek, many falling off in weight from four to fifteen pounds. The next session will be held at Los Angeles, Calif.—Coquille Herald.

C. J. Bruschke leaves for the Coquille Wednesday, to make arrangements for procuring a supply of hardwood. He is also endeavoring to secure fir logs, and contemplating purchasing more timber land and opening logging camps in the near future.

The four-masted schooner Alumna finished loading from the North Bend mill last week, and sailed Sunday for Cape Town, South Africa. Her cargo consisted of 942,000 feet of lumber. The Marconi is loading at North Bend for the same port, and will be ready for sea in a few days.

M. Doyle, Wedderburn, accompanied by his daughter Miss Anna and son Charles, and Willie Bailey, arrived in town last week, to catch the Alliance, the two boys being on their way to Mount Angel, Marion county, to attend school. Mr. Doyle met several old acquaintances in town, who enjoyed a chat with him about pioneer days on the Coquille, when Bear creek was a wilderness and settlers were few and far between. Time has dealt kindly with "Dorby," he looks almost as young and is as full of fun as he was 30 years ago.

Salem, Or., Aug. 19.—The eagerness with which idle capital is seeking investment in real property that promises to advance in value is shown by the sales of state school land in Coos county which have followed the announcement that a railroad will be built to Coos Bay. Immediately after the report was published showing that the railroad will probably be constructed there was a rush for cheap land in that vicinity. Within a few days every acre of vacant school land within 35 miles and more of Coos Bay had been purchased. Some of the land may prove to be of no value as a means of income, but in the desire to get what there was of value, men took all there was to be had. The land cost them but \$1.25 per acre, so the loss could not be great in any event.

Buying has also been active in Curry county, and practically all the vacant school land has been taken.

New York, Aug. 23.—Word reached this city from Dunbrook, Oneida County, this state, that Hiram Cron, the only soldier of the War of 1812 upon the Government pension rolls, is dying at his home there. Cron is in his 103d year, and he has had the distinction of having lived in three centuries.

About three months ago his health began to fail, and for some time he has been confined to his bed and growing weak. He spends much of the time sleeping. Last week he slept for three days and two nights. Until about two years ago the Government allowed him \$8 a month, but Congressman Sherman secured the passage of a special act increasing the pension to \$25.

The towns of Oregon are all taking a deep interest in the Harriman scheme and are interested in securing immigration. Millions of pieces of illustrated literature descriptive of the resources of every nook and corner of Oregon will be sent East. These will be in the hands of the Harriman immigration agents and will be by them placed in the hands of people who are seeking new homes in the far west. This is no idle project. It is systematic and is calculated to work wonders in Oregon. Already people who know the East and the West are saying that in eight years Oregon will be the home of 3,000,000 happy, prosperous and contented people. This is a far cry—from 400,000 to 3,000,000. It means seven and a half persons for every one. It means tilled acres where the land is now unbroken. It means small holdings. The big farms will all be cut up and improved and agriculture will be diversified. There is room in Oregon for millions more and it is good to know that they are coming.—Ex.

The Teachers Annual Institute.

The Annual Institute of Curry County, was called to order August 11, 1902, at 9 o'clock, a. m., at the school house in Port Orford, by Supt. W. S. Guerin.

The following teachers were reported present:—Misses Maud Walker, Letta Cooper, Pearl Fetter, Eva Hall, Mrs. Wootton, Messrs. Hardy Stewart, Robt. Goetz, J. S. Capps and Ames S. Johnston. Absent, Misses Clara Merriman, Lurena Merriman and Mr. Guy Merriman.

After the song "America," by the choir, Supt. Guerin began his address, and in substance said that though few in number, yet we were here for a common good, and that each should devote his individual attention to all the discussions that tend to increase our knowledge of a teacher's duty, and that all should take part in the discussions to make our gathering both instructive and interesting. We must not think that because we are teaching in the rural districts that we have but little responsibility, for, from the rural district in times past and to the present day came and come the minds which have been and will be potent factors in the world's history. Therefore it is our duty to do our utmost to start the child that he cannot look back in the years to come and lay blame to the early teachers negligence.

This able address was followed by singing by the choir.

The subject of Geography was taken up by Miss Maud Walker and Mr. Hardy Stewart, and the papers read showed that this subject had been carefully prepared, and were as well read. After the reading remarks by almost all the teachers present were given, presenting their views and experience in the matter. Miss Lurena Merriman not being present the subject of History was passed until this afternoon session.

A selection by the choir was then rendered, and the noon recess taken.

The afternoon session was called to order at 1:30 p. m., by Supt. Guerin. After a song by the subject of Orthography, by Miss Pearl Fetter was introduced by a very able and interesting paper with numerous illustrations of misspelled words.

Supt. Guerin then introduced a number of common words that were generally misspelled.

Physiology was next introduced by Miss Letta Cooper, in a well prepared paper. And Dr. T. C. Green gave a very instructive address upon the subject from a medical standpoint as applicable to the use of Teachers. Time not permitting the subject of the Nervous System, by Dr. T. C. Green, was deferred until this evening session, and this afternoon was closed by singing by the choir.

"Dawn of the 20th Century," March, instrumental, rendered by Miss Eva Hall, guitar, Mrs. Caldwell, organ, and Mr. Otto Neumann, cello, brought forth great applause and was a musical treat. Dr. Green was then introduced and gave a popular address upon the Nervous System, which was well appreciated by all present. Next on the program was a recitation by Miss Letta Cooper, entitled "Caught Fair and Square."

Mr. A. S. Johnston followed by singing a tenor solo, "There is no North or South."

Mr. Robt. Goetz then recited "Little Britches," written by Ex-Secretary of State, John Hay.

"Dreaming of Mother's Angel Face," soprano solo, sung by Mrs. E. W. Jensen. The concluding number was sung by Mr. Otto Neumann, "The Song I heard last night."

The Institute called to order at 9 o'clock by Supt. Guerin.

By special request Dr. Green was called upon to continue his subject of the Nervous System, and illustrated by diagram upon the blackboard how teachers should try to develop the different latent faculties in children, as some are deficient in some and normal in others.

After a song by the choir Supt. Guerin introduced the subject of School Law and impressed upon the teachers the necessity of adhering to the same at all times.

Mr. Robt. Goetz then introduced the subject of Mental Arithmetic by a carefully prepared paper and the reading was followed by some able and instructive remarks by a number.

In the absence of Guy Merriman, Dr. Green consented to take up the subject of Civil Government, and proceeded to illustrate upon the black-board the fundamental principles and laid great stress upon the importance of instruction on this branch of study.

After singing by the choir an adjournment was had until 1:30 p. m.

Afternoon session called to order at 1:30 p. m. by Supt. Guerin.

After a song by the choir, Supt. Guerin, in the absence of Miss Clara Merriman, took up the subject of English Grammar, and held the attention of his hearers for over half an hour in an able presentation of this subject.

Mrs. Wootton followed on the subject of Elocution, and in her opening remarks stated that Elocution was simply reading with expression, and gave a protracted illustration of the application and instruction on the correct pose and method of breathing during reading; also as to gestures, not to have too many only such as will emphasize the remarks, and let them be graceful and full of curves and not angular and awkward.

Written Arithmetic was then introduced by Mr. J. S. Capps, in a well prepared paper, and Supt. Guerin proceeded to the blackboard and gave a number of simple methods of performing difficult problems.

After singing by the choir an adjournment until this evening was had.

Evening session called to order 7:30 p. m. by Supt. Guerin by a short address, followed by Miss Pearl Fetter recitation, "The Fairies" from Hiawatha, by Longfellow. The quartet composed of A. S. Johnston, F. C. Champlin, Otto Neumann, Al. Marsh, sang "The Moonlight on the Lake" and was heartily encored. Miss Maud Walker read an essay on reading in which she presented the subject in an able manner.

Miss Agnes Hughes sang a solo and was followed by her little sister, also in a solo, the little girls sang beautifully for little tots neither being old enough to attend school. Mrs. T. Lane then recited "Cerberus must not Ring." Mr. Al. Marsh followed by singing a solo "The Old Sexton." Mr. A. S. Johnston, assisted by Messrs Neumann and Marsh, sang "My old New Hampshire Home." A recitation was then given by Miss Elva Kerr, entitled "Nelly McGuire," followed by a comic French song sang by Supt. Guerin. Miss Eva Hall, alto, and Mrs. Edna Jensen soprano, sang a duet, "Merry Birds of Spring."

Mrs. Knapp recited a comic recitation, "That Hired Girl." Mr. F. C. Champlin then entertained the audience with the humorous character sketch "The Mother-in-Law."

A solo followed by Mrs. E. W. Jensen "Good bye Sweet Day." A recitation by Miss Letta Cooper.

Adjourned until Wednesday evening.

The last feature of the evenings program deserved the well merited applause which they received. Each feature of the evening's entertainment received the hearty approval of the audience, and taken as a whole it proved a fitting and enjoyable close to the Institute of 1902.
