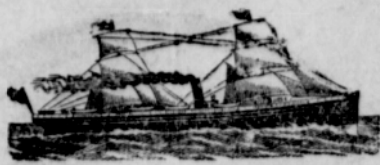

citizen of Rogue River, died at  
Corbin on Thursday of last week,  
Sept. 30, 1902, from inflammation of  
the stomach, after a short illness,  
aged 31 years. Deceased was a na-  
tive of Curry County, and a son of  
the late A. R. Miller, an early settler  
of the county. He leaves a widow,  
an aged mother, a sister, a number  
of brothers and other relatives, and  
a host of friends to mourn his loss.  
He was a member of the W. O.  
W., which order he joined on the  
13th of Sept.

friends who, together with his lov-

them through life's changing pil-

crushed weight of such a sorrow we
